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


creative outfits come in! We got to spend our Buddy Reading time outside in the sun and got to meet a famous children's book author too! It was certainly a fun filled week!

Sixth Grade News

The sixth grade **Math** class has recently finished a section on Problem-Solving Strategy. They will begin a review of the chapter to prepare for testing.

In **Religion**, the class is studying a chapter that explains the distinction between Jesus's roles Redeemer and Savior.

In sixth grade **Science**, the students have finished a small unit on owls and dissected owl pellets during this time. The students researched a particular owl and presented their findings to the class in a power point presentation. We just started a new chapter on the interactions of living things.

In **Vocabulary**, students have finished the unit review test on chapters 10, 11 and 12. We finished unit 13 and will have a quiz on this unit on Wednesday 5/2. All unit tests and reviews are on line along with their scores for each quiz, simply log onto sadlier.com and punch in your child's user name and password.

In grade 6 **Social Studies**, we have examined the fall of Rome. Next, we will be exploring the exciting Dark Ages.

In Grade 6 **Literature**, we are continuing forward with the exciting novel, <u>The</u> Runaway King.

Seventh Grade News

In **Math**, solving two-step equations with decimals will be the focus of the seventh grade class followed by a study of the Metric System. In **Religion**, the last two sacraments have been explored, discussed, and we will finish the unit on the sacraments. Testing on the chapter will occur next week.

In seventh grade **Science**, the students have finished chapter 9, which dealt with the human population, and had a chapter test. They have researched a particular country or territory and presented their findings to the class in a power point presentation. We have just started a new chapter which deals with the dynamic Earth.

In **Vocabulary**, the students have finished unit 13, and had a test on this unit on Wednesday 4/25. All unit tests and reviews are on line along with their scores for each quiz, simply log onto sadlier.com and punch in your child's user name and password.

In Grade 7 **Social Studies**, we are putting ourselves into the shoes of the founding fathers as we ask ourselves: How can an ideal government be organized? How can we keep power in the hands of the people? We are analyzing the Articles of Confederation in relation to its failures, and calling to mind issues which will arise in the drafting of the Constitution.

In Grade 7 **Literature**, we have been wrapping up our independent reading unit. Students are currently presenting their book reviews. Next, we will be beginning our final novel of the year.

Eighth Grade News

In **Math**, the eighth grade class has finished an interesting section dedicated to an explanation of the method by which a repeating decimal is converted to a Rational Number.

In their **Religion** class, the impact of the French Revolution on the Catholic Church will be studied along with the Catholic Church's response to that impact.

In eighth grade **Science**, the students have finished chapter 13. We had our chapter test and will begin a new chapter this week. We began a new chapter which deals with electricity and had our first section quiz on Friday 4/27.

In **Vocabulary**, the students have finished the unit review test on chapters 10,11 and 12. They also took the unit 13 quiz this week. In addition, we read a play on Anne Frank and the students had two take home tests during this time. All unit

tests and reviews are on line along with their scores for each quiz, simply log onto <u>sadlier.com</u> and punch in your child's user name and password.

In Grade 8 **Social Studies**, we have looked at the social problems espoused by urbanization and industrialization. We have looked at the conflicting views of the Social Darwinist as well as the Progressives. Our essential question is, what is the role of government for individuals, and what is the role of individuals within a government?

In Grade 8 Literature, we have shifted our focus to poetry, addresses, and short stories which all represent what it means to be an American. Perspectives represented are immigrants, first generation, Native Americans, African Americans, and native born people.

Just a Reminder to the middle school students that their Community Services must be completed by May 15th.

ART NEWS

To celebrate Earth Day, Grades 1 and 2 completed their works on paper titled. "Fields of Flowers." The students had to use their imagination and create flowers like no others; big and small, tall and short, using only recycled colored paper that was collected throughout the school year. We talked about environment, specifically addressing how we can minimize waste materials in our art room.

Grade 3, has been learning how scientists conduct experiments. Since we were learning how and why things sink or float, they experimented with objects found in our schoolyard. For this project, they had to follow these steps: First, ask the question "Does it sink or float?" Then, give their hypothesis. Next, test their hypothesis and observe the results. Finally, record their observations.

They will face a tough challenge next week. They will have to figure out if a small ball of clay that immediately sank in water could be changed in such a way that it would float. They will sculpt the ball into a boat, which will in fact float.... The magic of science and art! They have enjoyed

being artists who use science to make art!
Previously, we designed games and made prototypes, invented robots with special powers, and now we are ready to make boats that can float!

Grade 4, has been working on stage decorations for the upcoming show, Aladdin. This week students began working on vendor's stations. Grade 4 has been learning how to sculpt paper mache fruits in 1:1 scale. Next week is painting and assembly! Also, the students finished painting landscapes on canvas. They learned how to paint with dots using melted down wax crayon technique. Inspired by French artist, Georges-Pierre Seurat, the inventor of pointillism, students created outstanding works of art!

Grade 5, has been studying geometry, learning about lines, rays, segments and angles. They spent a class tracing, drawing geometric and organic shapes, while listening to music. We continue working on abstract art, inspired by W. Kandinsky's artwork. Using watercolor pencils for detail for positive spaces, and watercolor paint for negative spaces, the art works have evolved nicely. Grade 5, continues working on stage decoration for Aladdin, and

last week we made beaded jewelry.

Grade 6, finished sculpting Egyptian Amulets out of magic clay. This week they have been studying colors and their symbolic meaning, as we begin working on Fiber Arts. Using colored yarn for symbolic association, like red for love, green for hope, blue for purity and so on, students will learn how to make personalized crosses.

Grade 7, finished working on a collaborative project, Street Art. Students learned the difference between vandalism and street art, while creating their own version of public art. Working in groups, they addressed issues related to gender inequality.

This week they have been learning the skills required for reading maps. This includes understanding keys, grids, directions, and symbols. Working in pairs, they were able to find monuments, restaurants and streets in varied cities in the USA.

Next week, they will make their own maps, titled, "My daily commute to school from home". We will look at artists who use maps for inspiration, like Jasper Johns, Alighiero Boetti, and more. Grade 8, has been working on the grid, portrait. Students learned about techniques the Old Masters used to make drawings. Students have been exploring and learning about grids, how they can be used to understand detail and space and to make realistic portraits. As we continue to learn about the human figure in art, students' use of observational and technical skills develop.
