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From the Pastor

There is so much happening that I want to make sure you all know, so I decided to do a summary of things that are coming up.

- * Donations can be made to St. Paul's for "Parktown Food Hub" this Christmas Season. We would like to have the donations in by December 15 so that we can send the donations to Pastor Sharon Schulze at the Parktown Food Hub. She and her congregation, the South Durham Connection, will be distributing gift cards to the needy among the 2,000 they serve on a monthly basis. None of our usual giving tree organizations have reached out to us this year and Pastor Sharon called me just prior to this newsletter to ask for our help. Because we are not meeting in person and contactless giving is the best giving this year, Parktown's giving program offers us the best opportunity to share at this time.
- Damascus House sale to Wildflower Cottage will close on December 2, 2020. The sale price approved by the congregation was \$485,000. Tina Bessias will sign the documents on our behalf. Wildflower has submitted a rezoning application to the city and has also submitted drawings for their renovation. They anticipate completion by the end of June, 2021.
- Christmas Eve Worship: We will have a recorded service available before Christmas Eve. On Christmas Eve we will hold a children's service at 3 pm in the back parking lot, limited to 50 people in person and overflow can listen on the local FM channel 87.9 fm. We will offer communion to those in attendance as well as those in cars (they can drive thru immediately after the service). We will also offer a live outdoor worship limited to 50 people at 7 pm. I hope to have several fire pits in the parking lot to offer some warmth and the snuggies will still be available for use or purchase (\$20). Overflow can also listen on car radio on 87.9 FM. If it should rain, we will not move indoors unless the indoor worship numbers increase from the current 10.
- ► The Chrismon Tree is up and the church is decorated for Advent. Stop by for prayer and meditation.
- ► The CCG has placed Advent and Christmas decorations in the Atrium and Sanctuary. Another good reason to visit.
- Marcia Redman has moved the Lending
 Library from above the coat closets in the back

- hall to rolling library racks near the front door. Come borrow a book.
- Continued thanks go out to those editing our worship services: Jackie Nappi, Megan Mauriello, Tim Hoke, Dean Redman, Tom Kraska, Jonathan Maine. Your work is greatly appreciated.

Prayers go out daily for you all, may you have a blessed Advent and Christmas.

Hope and Expectation

On Sunday night, November 22, Duke Lutherans met for our last (virtual) Evening Prayer of the semester (and of 2020 for that matter). Advent came a little early for us this year, since Duke students are not returning for classes after Thanksgiving. But more significantly, in the face of our fatigue and the stress of finals, we knew we needed Advent this year, and the hope and expectation that come with the season. Therefore we sang beloved Advent hymns; shared in Thanksgiving for Baptism (tracing crosses on our foreheads with water from our homes); heard the angel tell Joseph in a dream in Matthew's Gospel to name the child Jesus; joined in the ancient contemplative prayer practice Lectio Divina; and prayed the Lord's Prayer in different languages, including English, Spanish, Malagasy, Swahili, Italian, and Javanese. Our service ended with this benediction:

> The God of hope, Through Christ our peace, In the power of the Holy Spirit, ♣ bless you now and forever. Amen.

God's hope, Christ's peace, the Holy Spirit's power. These three have sustained our Duke Lutherans community this semester, and we trust they will continue to do so in the new year. But one additional

blessing has made all the difference for us: the self-giving love of *all* our supporters: our faithful partner congregations St. Paul's and Grace, the dedicated members of our Duke Lutheran Committee, our gracious alumni, and our many friends scattered through the country. You've prayed for us, assembled care packages, joined us for worship, mailed messages of encouragement, studied the Bible with us, engaged with us in the work of racial reconciliation, and even provided rides to the airport. We are so grateful.

This August we also announced our 2020 Matching Campaign, mindful of the financial challenges so many have faced because of the pandemic. But because of our donors' exceeding generosity, we raised \$25,000! Fifty-eight different people donated sixty-nine gifts! Words are not enough to express our deep appreciation for your partnership in ministry. Thank you for making our 2020 Campaign such a success and thank you for believing in the essential work we do with our students.

Lastly, please know I count it a great blessing to serve as the Duke Lutherans Campus Pastor. Indeed, even though I've now been here since June, it still feels a bit surreal to me, as I've long dreamed of being a campus pastor. Our students are compassionate, thoughtful, and resilient followers of Jesus. What a joy it is to take this journey with them!

Council Corner

In recent weeks, the level of activity in our building has increased significantly. Our staff and occasional volunteers have been in the office while following protocols for hygiene, distancing, and mask wearing. The Preschool and Wildflower Cottage have adapted to the weather and moved more of their activities indoors. They have found ingenious ways to use nooks and crannies to maintain social distance and keep children safely engaged. It is remarkable to see our building and grounds being used in such new and varied ways! And it is fortunate that their needs for indoor space will decrease as the weather gets warmer and – we hope! – physical gatherings of the congregation will begin to be safe and feasible.

To enhance the health and safety of all who use our building, the congregation council has decided to purchase an iWave air purification system. Our HVAC Contractor, Comfort Mechanical, will install it at a cost of \$9,883.00. It is promised to dramatically reduce both bacterial and viral pathogens as well as allergens. The Council did its homework to investigate these claims and was satisfied that the system is a wise investment. Among our findings are that Yates Baptist, Aldersgate, and a number of other churches and daycares have chosen to install similar systems.

Our budget does not have a spare \$9,883, of course. Families who have had donations made to the memorials fund in memory of their loved ones, have agreed that memorial gifts in their honor could be used for this purpose. We also invite all of you to make a contribution to this effort. If you write an extra check or make a donation online, please indicate "air purifier system" as the purpose.

The other major piece of news is that the closing on Damascus House is set for December 2. Wildflower Cottage will purchase it for \$485,000 in fulfillment of the agreement approved by the congregation last December. We will be able to pay off the mortgage on that property, pay off the loan from our Endowment and Memorial Garden funds, and bank a significant portion of the money in our capital reserve fund. We are also applying to refinance the much bigger mortgage on our main building. We will provide an update when there is news on that front.



Fortunately, not all the news of the congregation council is financial. We approved an idea put forward by the Continuing Conversation Group to set up nativity scenes and clusters of angels with varied ethnic and racial characteristics. They have done a beautiful job! Watch for chances to view these scenes in real life or in

pictorial form; Curtis Chi has taken a beautiful set of photos that will be shared in the month of December. As we contemplate these scenes, might we expand our sense of God's presence in our human community?

Potential leaders have stepped up to serve on the Congregation Council: Maria Chi, Barbara Ellertson, Tim Hoke, and Aaron Klink will be on the ballot for the three seats that will open up as Tony Perrotte, Lisa Lewis, and I step down. You will receive information about them and about the budget before the December 13 congregational meeting. The "meeting" will be virtual, with minimal opportunity for interaction, but the Zoom information sessions will give you a chance to ask questions and find out anything you want about the operations of the church. I hope to see you at 12:00

on December 6 or 9;00 on December 13. If you don't "do Zoom," please feel free to call me with questions or ideas. We want everyone to know what's going on at St. Paul's!

In our finances, our reunions, our opportunities to worship together and pursue long-delayed initiatives, 2021 has the potential to be a wonderful year in the life of St. Paul's. Please join the information sessions and meeting to help launch it!
