ACTING CHAIR - ROBERTA EALES roberta@abbeydale21.plus.com Being new to this slot in the newsletter, I was wracking my brain for something that I could write about that was vaguely interesting and engaging, so I looked to the month of March for inspiration! Of course I came across International Women's Day (IWD) held in March and what could be more relevant to members of the WI, as the largest voluntary women's organisation in the UK. IWD has been around for over 100 years, as have many of the issues still impacting on women's lives and their quest for gender parity. It grew from the women's labour and suffrage movements. The first IWD gathering occurred in



1911 but did you know that it was Lenin (leader of the Bolshevik party) that declared March 8th as the day it would be celebrated? This was to honour the role of Russian women in the 1917 revolution, as on the 8th March that year, women workers started a strike for "bread & peace", which ultimately forced the Czar to abdicate and a provisional government, led by Lenin, to take over. As a result, Lenin granted the women the right to vote.

This year the IWD social media hashtag is #Accelerate Action – let's speed up the rate of gender equality worldwide, as significant barriers remain. Collectively, we can accelerate action for change.

Usurping this strap line, "accelerate action", by working together as a Federation, we can accelerate the action needed to get us back on a surer financial footing but we need your help to do this. Again I ask you to please consider joining our sub-teams and the Board of Trustees.

On a very icy cold evening in January our members enjoyed a talk from Kate about Dadesley Crafting, a local community enterprise which offers a wide variety of crafting workshops and courses. Dadesley Crafting was set up to create a welcoming place to bring people together to help overcome some of the isolation felt during Covid by providing a welcoming and warm meeting place where you can leave the day to day behind and discover (or remember) just how positive the impact of crafting can be whatever form it takes, as you have some "you time". Several of our WI members already participate in some of the activities at Dadesley Crafting and thoroughly enjoy our time there. It is truly amazing just how quickly two hours can whizz by whilst you are there! Kate brought examples of some of the many activities that are on offer. They are very varied and the programme is updated weekly on their website. It can range from metal embossing, wreath making, watercolour painting, embroidery, flower arranging and model railway crafting. All courses are very reasonably priced and include all that is needed along with light refreshments. There is also a free craft and chat session daily where you can take a craft of your own choice and enjoy meeting others whilst crafting. The group are based at St Catherine's House in Woodfield Park in Balby. All activities are suitable for beginners.

Kate followed her talk by providing a mini workshop on how to create



Suffolk puff brooches which proved very popular. Kate then went on to show us examples of how this activity could be taken further to create for example: earrings, little dolls or Christmas decorations including a gorgeous light up festive tree created with silk Suffolk puffs. It was noted that these could all be created as possible fund raising items.

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Heat Pump - to have or have not? One member's experience

Our gas boiler was showing signs of age, so I grasped the nettle and started the ball rolling. Three quotes, three surveys and an energy performance certificate later we chose our installer and signed the forms, thereby enabling our supplier to claim the Government grant in part payment.

People were eager to share their views, mainly forebodings it must be said, the majority of which were anecdotal. There was the question of the noise it would make. Ours stands at the back door and we can't hear it at all when the door is shut, but you can check the noise level for yourself online using one of several demonstration videos. I lost count of the number of times I was told I would be cold. I did some research and learned that Scandinavian countries have amongst the highest uptake of heat pumps in Europe, so was reassured. If a Finnish family finds they keep the cold at bay, it seemed to me we would be fine in Doncaster's microclimate.

Nevertheless, I was still apprehensive and signed the contract with my fingers crossed for a positive experience and outcome. The technology may have been around for a surprisingly long time, but it is new to me and so poses a threat, I suppose. It does seem though, that for the time being at least, heat pumps are an effective way of reducing my carbon footprint, thereby improving the environment for my grandchildren. Not to mention going some way to offsetting my guilt at not always choosing the greenest mode of transport when we visit them.

The installation took 5 days during a very cold snap in November, and did cause disruption in the home. With a three-man team going in and out, upstairs and down, this was inevitable. Did we need redecorating afterwards as people had warned? Were all my radiators changed? Despite having 50% of the radiators replaced and an additional one installed no redecorating was required.

We now have the house to ourselves once more. It is warm and we have plenty of hot water (something else several people had told me would be a thing of the past). Yes, the radiators don't get as hot as they used to, which could account for people saying they feel cold postinstallation, but our house is warmer than previously. There is a thermostat in the hallway just like before, the radiators still have thermostatic valves, and we can adjust the temperature. Naturally, there is also an app for our phones, giving remote access for ease and convenience, although I do appreciate that "apps" and "ease and convenience" are not necessarily synonymous for everyone.

People now want to know what reduction there has been in our bills, even though in all my research and the quotation process I don't recall any claims of heat pumps saving you money. So far, the temperature in the house is much more constant, without any appreciable change in cost. In addition, the monthly cost of the service plan for the heat pump is a fifth of that for the old gas boiler, and we have no standing charge for the gas, as the supply was capped and the meter removed. What happens to prices in the future is anyone's guess, of course, but that is the same for all of us.

Was it worth changing to the heat pump? So far, yes. It was a big investment, literally and figuratively, but I am hoping it is one that will have a positive impact on the world my grandchildren inherit. I miss my airing cupboard (which as it is now wouldn't look amiss among the installations in a museum of modern art), but I love my grandchildren more, and the environment we leave them really matters.

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
