# The Message for January 3, 2021 "One Starry Night" Pastor Ray Eck

Epiphany, January 6, is a Christian celebration of the day which celebrates the revelation of God, incarnate as Jesus Christ. In Western Christianity, the feast commemorates the visit of the Magi to the Christ Child, and thus Jesus' physical manifestation to the Gentiles. I wonder what they saw in the sky that first night? What was it that got them thinking? What was it that motivated them to pack and begin a journey to who knew where? Something had been revealed to them, but what was it? Was it in the sky, in their mind, in their heart?

We don't have much historical information about these magi or wise men and their journey. Matthew says they came from the East. Some have speculated they were from Persia in present day Iran. We like to think that there were three of them, but Matthew does not say that, and the number has varied throughout the history of Christianity. We call them Caspar, Melchior, traditionally called the oldest of the wisemen, and Balthazar but those names were not mentioned until the seventh century. And what about "the star"? It has been viewed as a supernational phenomenon, just a regular star, a comet, or sometimes a conjunction or grouping of planets. In fact, on December 21<sup>st</sup> and 22<sup>nd</sup> of 2020, the star that shown over Bethlehem appeared once again. It had not been seen since it last appeared in 1200 A.D. The star, some say, is a grouping of two planets, Saturn and Neptune, that align themselves in the sky every 800 years or so. Did you see it on December 21<sup>st</sup>/22<sup>nd</sup>? I did! This Epiphany journey is not just the wise men's journey; it's our journey too. The truth of scripture is never limited to the past but is lived out in our lives every day.

I don't know what was in the sky that they saw that first night. I don't know what was in their minds, what they thought, or what they talked about, but these were learned men who studied the stars and their meaning, and they must have known that "this star" was important. So important that they spent, some say, 2 years following it until they reached the end of their journey.

I don't know what was in their hearts, what they felt, dreamed, or longed for. But I do know that there have been times when each one of us have experienced an Epiphany. Times when our night's star has been lit brightly and our hearts have been strangely warmed. Those times have revealed to us a life and world larger than before. They have been moments that gave us courage to travel outside our comfort box, and beyond the borders and boundaries that usually define our lives. Epiphanies are those times when someone calls us or moves us to a new place, and we see the face of God in a new way; so human, so beautiful.

I think that's what happened to the wise men. They began to see and hear the stories of their own lives. Something stirred within them and they began to wonder and imagine that their lives were part of a much bigger story. Could it be that the one who created life and hung the stars in the sky noticed them, and was he calling them to come to Bethlehem and see him for themselves? Could it be that the light they saw in the sky was a reflection of the divine light that burned within them? Perhaps it was the same light that started to burn within you and within me the moment that we first believed.

We are all on the same journey, the journey to see the Christ Child. But when we find him, each Christmas night, we cannot leave him in the manger, for he is not there any longer. The Christ child lives within us today as a light of hope in this troubled world. A light we are asked to carry to others so that they can find their way too. Each of us may travel a different route to find God's Son, but when we find him the answer is always the same. It is a journey of Love. He loves each of us more then he loved himself, and he died so that we might live. Yes, God notices us, he knows us, and he lives within us, and he calls us to live for him caring for those who need a helping hand; those who may have lost their way and need to come home. That's why he left us his love letter; we call it the Bible.

When did he first reveal himself to you? Maybe when you saw your first baby and counted his fingers and toes and said... wow! Maybe it was when you saw the beauty of God's creation and the love of God in all things. Or was it the day you said, "I love you" to that certain someone and knew that it was more than a physical attraction. It was meant to be. Maybe it was the time you sat at the bed of someone who was dying and you experienced the joy in knowing that death is not the end. These are indeed the days of our lives. The Epiphanies we have change our lives forever, and change how we live and the road we travel. They are moments of everyday life in which the glory of God is revealed in humanity, and we look into the face of God.

Jeremiah 29:11 tells us this:

"For I know the plans I have for you," declares the Lord,
"plans to prosper you and not to harm you,
plans to give you hope and a future."

Thanks be to God.

So Be it... Amen.

With this week's music, we celebrate the visit by the Magi. As Pastor Ray has told us, there is no mention of "three" visitors in the scriptures, but there is the description of "three gifts." The tradition of three magi and their names, Balthasar, Melchior, and Gaspar, originated in the eighth century; the "Adoration of the Magi" is one of the of most popular themes in Christian art, dating from the second century; and in our hymnal, references can be found in:

- #219, What Child is This "So bring him incense, gold, and myrrh, come, peasant, king, to own him; the King of kings salvation brings, let loving hearts enthrone him."
- #237, Sing We Now of Christmas "From the eastern country came the kings afar, bearing gifts to Bethlehem, guided by a star."
- #245, The First Noel "And by the light of that same star three Wise Men came from country far; to seek for a king was their intent, and to follow the star wherever it went... Then entered in those Wise Men three, full reverently upon the knee, and offered there, in his presence, gold and myrrh and frankincense."
- #248, On This Day Earth Shall Ring God's bright star, o'er his head, Wise Men three to him led; kneel they low by his bed, lay their gifts before him, praise him and adore him."
- And, of course, #254, We Three Kings with its trio of singers on verses 1 and 5, and the individual soloists singing the verses that refer to the gifts.
