"Admitted to God, to ourselves and to another human, being the exact nature of our wrongs."

He said: After my first Fifth Step my sponsor took me out back behind his house and we shot guns at a pizza box set up on a tree stump.

Today I look back and laugh. Here was a guy brave enough to hear all my deepest, darkest secrets and then hand me a gun in the middle of nowhere.

I guess they weren't as bad as I thought they were.

But doing a Fifth Step brought out an even bigger Boogeyman – someone was actually going to know me, know how I think, know why I react the way I do, and know what was really going on in my head. Sometimes sponsors know better than I do why I'm doing what I'm doing.

And that's a terrifying proposition for me. I've always thought that if someone knew exactly what I was thinking, I'd end up back in the nut ward. They definitely wouldn't want to be my friend after that, either.

I can say that, since I've done a few Fifths with a few sponsors, not one has called the shrink to get me locked up, and every one has taken my calls afterwards.

There are few people I trust enough to know what's really going on in my head. But, with a sponsor, here's a guy who knows everything, and, not only that, can show me patterns of behavior, the road map in my head. And he's got the directions for a more peaceful journey up there.

When I get a new sponsor, I try and sit down and do a Fifth pretty quickly. I have to be honest though. I've had a number of sponsors where that wasn't the case. They did not last long, and I rarely used them. How could I? I didn't give them any information except the current problem.

She said: How hard is it to admit that I am wrong? It's pretty damn hard! Yet

'admission' is the very first action we are called to take in the very first step of this program. It returns in Step Five to free us from the past, and then again in Step Ten, as an instruction for living. Apparently we are supposed to get pretty good at it! It's all about breaking free from the oppression of false pride and the nightmare of our terrified ego.

We alcoholics carry around our secrets like a bag full of rocks and the burden is killing us. In Step Four we take a good look at these rocks, examining every nook and cranny. Then, in Step Five, we are allowed to throw them away, if only we will.

A lot of work had been done by the time I got to this Step. I had admitted that "I can't but God can," and then in Step Four took a good look at the evidence of just how badly "I can't".

Control was only an illusion after all. Once the illusion was stripped bare, admission of my wrongs was vital to staying sober, in fact to staying alive. Never mind that much of the human race could use these steps to improve their lives and the lives of those around them, If an alcoholic doesn't use these steps they will drink again, and that is the truth of it.

It wasn't easy for me. It isn't easy for any of us. Doing Step Five was my second chance in sobriety to practice turning my will and my life over to the care of God. He is in charge now. I just have to suit up and show up, do the next indicated thing. So that is what I did, in spite of a desire to turn and run.

I was tired of dying, day after day, in the hellish haze of alcohol, and I'd decided I wanted to live. So I took this step, like the ones before it, because I was willing to go to any lengths.

He Said: (cont I've found that the easiest way to allow your sponsor to work his magic is to do a Fifth. He's got the evidence and now can throw your past back at you. It makes for a much more effective sponsor/sponsee relationship.

After doing my first fifth and taking out the tree stump, I remember driving home, and for the first time in my sobriety, I felt the loneliness vanish. I truly felt a part of AA after doing that step.

Here are some of the other gifts of the Fifth, as outlined in the Big Book: "Once we have taken this step, withholding nothing, we are delighted. We can look the world in the eye. We can be alone at perfect peace and ease. Our fears fall from us. We begin to feel the nearness of the Creator." Those are some pretty great by-products of doing this step, no? It seems pretty worth it to tell a guy exactly who you are.

May in Our History:

May 1901: Professor William James gave a series of lectures at the University of Endinburg, Scotland. The following year he will publish them in book form under the name, "Varieties of Religious Experience." This book was required reading for early AA members before our 'Big Book' was written. Bill W called Professor William James "A founder of AA."

May 1934: Book: "Sermon on the Mount" by Emmet Fox goes to print. It is one of eleven books that influenced how the Big Book will be written.

May 1, 1935: Bill W. goes to Akron, Ohio on a business trip that failed, but it's on this trip that he will meet Dr. Bob!

May 1939: AA's first Intergroup office opens. It will be located in Cleveland, Ohio.

May 1940: A Washington DC newspaper reports the first AA Group in our nation's capitol will be meeting every Tuesday night at 8:00^{pm}.

May 1946: The legal incorporation of our AA Grapevine takes place as one of two publishing arms of the then "Alcoholic Foundation."

May 8, 1971: Bill W. is buried in a private ceremony at his home town of East Dorset, Vermont.

May 1974: First "World Service Meeting of AA" outside North America is held in London.

May 1988: Book: "Language of the Heart" goes to print. This book brings together all the articles Bill W. wrote to us through the Grapevine. A book that in my opinion was years overdue!


