PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE



I hope this past summer has been a good one for all our members. The main highlight for this year was the Clan MacLeod Parliament that was held July 19-25th in Dunvegan. Over 200 participants attended, with 60 individuals from the USA. This was a very nice showing for our

Society, and a chance to reconnect with our overseas members.

All three Chiefs and their wives were there for the opening of Parliament. ACMS President John Davidson Kelly presided and Chief Hugh welcomed us to Dunvegan. The Chief explained the many positive changes occurring at the Castle, including new windows, a new roof, as well as on-going remodeling, painting, and decorating. Tours of the castle and grounds confirmed the improvements, such as new displays within, and beautiful garden attractions outside, thanks to head gardener David MacLean and his staff.

The week of activities included morning teas and coffee, hosted each day by a different Clan society. Workshops, evening ceilidhs at the Village Hall, and a great beer and bratwurst cookout hosted by the German Society were well attended. In between, we did manage to meet for Clan and ACMS business. There was also a day trip to the Isle of Raasay to visit the newly restored Raasay House.

Chief John of the MacLeods of Raasay met our group when we arrived on the ferry, and gave a brief talk about the building's most recent and past history. A formal tour of the grounds and house also included a delightful lunch.

On Thursday the 24th, HRH Anne, The Princess Royal, arrived at Dunvegan to officially open the new gazebo installed in the Walled Garden to honor the memory of the late Chief John MacLeod of MacLeod. It was a wonderful event, with over 150 MacLeods attending, as Chief Hugh guided the Royal party around the grounds and Castle.

On Friday, a new ACMS President was elected. John Davidson Kelly turned over his office to Dr. Don McLeod of Canada. The Vice President is now David MacLeod of

England, and the ACMS Honorary Treasurer will be Alasdair Duncan ("Al") McLeod of England. Dorna Caskie of the USA was re-elected ACMS Honorary Secretary.

Later Friday evening, we held our closing Parliament Ceilidh in the Village Hall. During the ceilidh, it was my very great pleasure to make some USA award presentations. The first was given to William (Bill) McLeod of Texas for his dedication to Clan MacLeod and his tireless work for many years as ACMS Business Manager. The second award, presented annually by the Clan MacLeod USA, was Clansperson of the Year, given to past CMS USA President John B. MacLeod. John has devoted many years of service to both Clan MacLeod and the Dunvegan Foundation. Congratulations to Bill and John!!

And, speaking of the Dunvegan Foundation, I would like to call on our members to consider making a donation to the Foundation before the end of the year. Donations are essential to the Foundation's operations and allow it to provide the many grants we provide to programs supporting our Scottish Heritage. Please make a difference today, no matter how small or large, as it helps support our goals for the Society.

Don't forget our next CMS USA mid-year AGM, which will take place in Alexandria, Virginia on December 5th. And also please begin to think about the next AGM that will be held in Milwaukee, Wisconsin in June 2015.

Finally, as I write this message the referendum for Scottish Independence has just taken place. The early polls indicated the NO vote was slightly ahead, and that was the way the election ended (favoring NO for independence, with 55% of the vote). However, there are also a series of governing changes that were promised via the "Edinburgh Agreement," in the event of a NO vote. So one way or another, things have changed in Scotland, forever.

He is a truly unstoppable person, leading the French "archery team" on Raasay to its crushing victory over Scotland (although finishing second to Canada), and representing Clan MacLeod France in the Walled Garden when we were presented to HRH Princess Anne. Through his presence and actions, he made me feel very proud to be a MacLeod, something special if you are a collector of people - or perhaps even a "collectee."

Where is Cnoc Chusbaig?

In 1990 my husband Dale and I made our first trip to the Isle of Lewis, to attend the Clan MacLeod Pre-Parliament Historical Seminar in Stornoway and to visit my third cousins, Willie Macleod of Barvas and his sister, Chrissie Maclean of Cross, for the first time. Each trip to Parliament and Scotland thereafter included a trip to Lewis to visit them.

One of the outings during the Clan seminar was a trip to the Church at Ui, the site where several MacLeod of Lewis chiefs are buried. It was a memorable and touching visit with Chief Torquil Roderick and his wife Mary returning to the last resting place of his ancestors. So began my journey to learn more about the home and language of my Gaelic-speaking cousins and ancestors.

Fast-forward to 2007, after several years of studying Gaelic and learning to sing Gaelic songs: noted Lewis Gaelic singer Donnie Murdo MacLeod came to Vancouver, BC to adjudicate the Gaelic singing competition known as Mòd Vancouver. Much to my delight, he taught a class on the Gaelic songs of Lewis. One song in particular caught my attention because of the catchy tune and the poignant story behind it. *An till mi tuilleadh a Leòdhas? (Will I ever return to Lewis?)* was written by William MacKenzie (1857 – 1908), known as the Cnoc Chùsbaig Bard.

The last line of the chorus and each verse of the song fondly describe Cnoc Chùsbaig (pronounced Crock HOOSbick), a hillock on the family croft of William MacKenzie. Widowed after 20 years of marriage, the Bard mourned the loss of his wife, Màiri, and the happy times they shared together at Cnoc Chùsbaig. After much urging by his family already living there, he reluctantly emigrated to Canada. He bid a sad farewell to his neighbors and lifelong friends in Cnoc Chùsbaig, knowing in all likelihood he'd never see them again. Before he left, he is reputed to have buried a tooth in Màiri's grave so that part of him could be with her forever. He

died three years later of tuberculosis in Canada.

Ever since Donnie Murdo shared the song, I've wondered where Cnoc Chùsbaig was located. I couldn't find it on any of the maps of Lewis I've checked over the past seven years, even

those in Gaelic. When I asked Chrissie and Willie, neither of

them knew where it was, other than it was in the Point district.
Will I ever return to Lewis? I've often wondered that

myself whenever I've sung the song. Little did I know when I was last there in 2002 that it was the last time I would see my beloved cousins, Willie and Chrissie. I didn't know if I could return to Lewis without them there.

However, Willie's widow, Christina, and Margaret Joan, another cousin in Barvas, welcomed me back for a visit this summer prior to Parliament. They asked me what I wanted to see and I told them Cnoc Chùsbaig! They weren't sure where it was, but knew that our cousin Iain "Tonkan" MacDonald who lives in Point near Cnoc Chùsbaig would know.

Indeed, Tonkan did know and graciously volunteered to show us where it was. Turns out we had unknowingly passed it on the way to his house. There are quite a few structures on top of the hill with houses and fences surrounding it, so it was easy to miss without any signs.

When we got there, Tonkan drove back and forth, unsuccessfully looking for the path to the top amongst all the houses and fences. We stopped at the base of the hill and sang *An Till Mi Tuilleadh a Lèodhas* together. What a thrill! Tonkan, a Mòd Traditional Gold Medalist, is well known throughout Lewis for playing accordion and traditional Gaelic singing.

Tonkan was insistent that I climb to the top, but I wasn't too keen on traipsing through someone's yard or crawling over a barbed wire fence to get there. He knew a descendant of the Bard, whose husband Seònaidh confirmed there was a path to the top, but he couldn't tell us exactly where to find it. Finally we found a woman at home who showed us a fence and said I could walk in the ditch along the fence all the way to the top without having to crawl over any fences. Fortunately, the ditch was dry that day.

My three cousins weren't up for the climb, so I went by myself to take in the beautiful view that had meant so much to William MacKenzie. I've climbed taller hills, but seeing the glorious view of Broad Bay to the West and the peaks of Assynt to the East, I could certainly understand his deep love for Cnoc Chùsbaig.

I was very surprised to learn from Seònaidh that the Bard's wife Màiri was buried at the Ui cemetery, right next to the Church where the MacLeod of Lewis chiefs are buried! I was very pleased to see that restoration work has been done on the Church since my first visit in 1990. I was also pleased to see that the Bard's descendants have erected a large headstone commemorating the Bard, Màiri, and their children as a way to fulfill his wish to someday unite his family in their homeland.

As we left the cemetery, we turned on the radio to listen to a popular call-in request program on Radio nan Gaidheal. Talk about serendipity: without any prompting from us, they played *An Till Mi Tuilleadh a Leòdhas* and gave us the perfect conclusion to our day of finally finding Cnoc Chùsbaig!

Over the years, the Clan MacLeod Society of the USA has been fortunate to have capable, professional leadership to guide our organization in its effort to fulfill our mission. Few people who have held the office of President have served us better than John B. MacLeod.

While "John B." occasionally jokes that he "joined CMS USA way too early," we have certainly benefitted from his energy and insight through the years. He has been a member of the USA Society since 1980, following in his father's footsteps. Most recently he served as President from 2007-2011. John has been a tireless worker and has taken on several leadership roles in the clan. He has even led dancing workshops. He always

makes those of us with two left feet feel hopeful!

John's "big picture vision" has guided us through many discussions about ACMS and other changes. He is a constant presence at Parliament, our AGMs, and the North American Gatherings, always joined by family members who have also made great contributions to Clan events.

For many years John B. MacLeod has also served as both a trustee and an officer of the Dunvegan Foundation, which is the charitable arm of the Clan MacLeod Society USA. He has been an important factor in keeping the Foundation focused on its mission to preserve, protect, and promote the unique heritage of the Highlands and Islands of Scotland. During his six years as Chairman he helped the Foundation achieve impressive results:

- John oversaw the payment of 136 regular grants totaling \$111,300, setting a high standard that is the envy of many other clan organizations,
- He acted as the Foundation's point man in dealing with special ACMS projects such as the migration volume and endowment challenge grant,
- He has consistently set an example of professionalism in the administrative side of the Foundation's business, and
- He completely revised the Foundation's Sourcebook, a collection of documents and information used as a resource and guide by the trustees.

John has unswervingly striven to ensure that the Foundation stayed well within the rigorous legal parameters which constrain its operation. His service to the Foundation continues today through his active participation as a Trustee.

GLENCANISP LODGE, IN ASSYNT

Recommended by Dorna Caskie (this is <u>so</u> on my bucket list...)



The pre-Parliament trip in 2010 took the Clan MacLeod to the Assynt area in Sutherland. Part of our visit was originally to include a tour of the recently refurbished Glencanisp Lodge. The Lodge is run for the benefit of the Assynt Foundation, a community-owned, social enterprise which also owns the surrounding 44,000 acres. (We met some of the Foundation's leaders during our pre-Parliament trip.) It is a splendid example of a Victorian hunting lodge, sleeps up to 30, and offers perfect group accommodation for families, friends, groups, and work colleagues.

The Lodge has a new website (http://www.glencanisp-lodge.co.uk/) where you can see a selection of events and retreats for which you can either book and pay, or just register if they are free. Activities range from hunting and stalking packages, to creative writing retreats, hill walking activities and open air theatre performances. The Lodge is open year-round, and while during the high season they rent only on an exclusive weekly basis, from 21 October to Easter (excluding Christmas and New Year) you can book a short break or nightly self-catering by-the-room for as little as £60. All-abilities accommodation is available.

itself, a popular diner and bar with reasonable prices. The business has branches in several major European cities. So next time you arrive a little early for your train, you might drop around the corner and see if Michael is at the helm.

For his day job, Rory McLeod (current President of the

Clan MacLeod Society of Scotland and future Coordinator of Parliament 2018) works as the "factor" or grounds manager for Doune Castle in Stirlingshire. The Castle, owned by Historic Scotland, is a picturesque 14th century structure that has been featured in many films, perhaps most famously in *Monty Python and the Holy Grail*.



Of more current interest perhaps is the fact that part of the estate has been leased to the US television network Starz, and is being used as the set and backdrop for Castle Leoch in the new fantasy/drama series *Outlander*. (Rory says he hasn't read the *Outlander* books.)

DID YOU KNOW?

In 1897 the town of McCloud, California was established. G. Scott and W. Van Arsdale purchased lumber mills in the area of Mt. Shasta on the Southern slope and formed the McCloud River Lumber Company. Things may not have been going all that well because in 1909 seven hundred Italian workers at the mill went on strike. The strikers seized the power plant and gained access to a ton of dynamite owned by the company. As confrontation escalated, the Governor, the California state militia, and the Italian Consul got involved and eventually the strike was settled.

Over the years, the McCloud River Lumber Company improved relationships with its workers. This positive change earned it the nick name "Mother McCloud."

The McCloud town is small today, with no McCloud residents, but there is a McCloud River Park, and it is very scenic with lovely waterfalls.

Janet W. Norman was a past officer of Mid Ohio Scottish Heritage Association, Daughters of Eastern Star, past president of Worthington Hills Garden Club, officer of Jaguar Club of Columbus, member of MORPCA, District Director of Ohio Garden Clubs and the matriarch of 928 Buckeye Land Sharks.

Janet is survived by her husband, The Reverend Canon Peter M. Norman, whom she married on September 6,

1952; children, Susan (Michael) Slade, Paula (Brian) Neroni, Christa (Kevin) Collins, Peter Norman II; and several grandchildren.

Richard Harvey McLeod July 8, 1920 - March 20, 2013



Richard H. McLeod of Bloomfield, CT and Weekapaug, RI, died peacefully after a short illness at Hartford Hospital. He leaves his children Suzanne, Doug, and Andy. His beloved wife Barbara, to whom he was married in 1954, was missed deeply by Dick and her children since her death in 2011. Known as Dick to his family and many friends,

he will be affectionately remembered for his wisdom, humor, gentle manner, warmth, and humility.

Dick graduated from the University of Virginia in 1943 with a B.A. in government and immediately enlisted in the U.S. Army. He shipped out to England in early 1944, crossed into Normandy days after D-Day, and spent most of the next two years in Europe with the 129th Signal, Radio, and Intelligence Company, attached to General George Patton's 7th Army. Dick returned to New York and began teaching at the Trinity School in Manhattan, marrying fellow teacher Barbara Price Birmingham in 1954. They celebrated with a six-week honeymoon to Scotland (and several lesser European countries) in the summer of 1955.

Dick's great-great-grandfather, Murdock McLeod, came from Scotland to America in 1778 to fight on behalf of King George III and remained here.

Dick himself had first travelled to the Isle of Skye while stationed in England during the war. In 1954 he was present when the Chief of the Clan, Dame Flora MacLeod of MacLeod, visited the USA for the first time. At a dinner at the Waldorf Astoria, he witnessed the creation of the Clan MacLeod Society of America. Dick and his brother Andy would both later serve as President of the USA Society, Dick from 1961-1963 and Andy from 1970-1973.

Dick and Barbara and their children attended several Clan MacLeod Parliaments in Scotland, the last in 1994. He honored his Scottish heritage by serving more than 20 years as "Chief of the Clan" at the annual Boar's Head Festival at Asylum Hill Congregational Church.
