She served as the Deputy President and President of the South African Research Association for Early Childhood Education. Her research focuses on early childhood at the margins with special reference to practice, policy and teacher development. As such she has been extensively involved in the development of the South African and Seychelles early childhood curriculum, teacher development policies and alternative models to centre-based provision in the early years. She has numerous national and international publications.
