## **Programs** - High School ACT/SAT Preparation Award

#### SIGP HIGH SCHOOL ACT/SAT COURSE PREPARATION AWARD

Soroptimist International of Grosse Pointe has decided to create an award to assist a local high school student with her dreams of higher education. Since free high school education is a right for all Americans, assisting with tuition, as SIGP has been doing for Ghana girls, was not feasible. After several months of discussion and brainstorming the High School Award committee proposed the SAT/ACT Preparation Course Award.

Most low-income students do not have the funds to enroll in a SAT/ACT preparation course, which can greatly increase a student's score. Since these tests, as well as grade point averages, are both considered by college admissions departments, they can become the determining factor in going to college.

The New York Times on Sunday, July 16, 2017 published an article (see link at the end of the article) titled "Make Everyone Take the SAT or ACT. And Make It Free" by Susan Dynarski, a professor of education, public policy and economics at the University of Michigan. Here are some of her thoughts from the article:

- "A child born into a high-income family is six times as likely to earn a college degree as one who is poor."
- ACT and SAT college entrance exams require students to "register and pay for these tests and travel to an exam center on a weekend to take them. This requires internet access, a computer, a credit card, and maybe, a car."
- "Michigan began requiring public school juniors to take the ACT in 2007, and the share of high school graduates taking a college entrance exam rose immediately

to nearly 99 percent from 54 percent. That growth was even sharper among low income students; only 35 percent had been taking the test."

- "Universal exams cannot, by themselves, close gaps between poor and rich students in college attendance. But in Michigan, it has produced small increases, especially at four-year colleges and particularly among disadvantaged students."
- "Disadvantaged students who do not take the tests are out of the running for selective colleges.
   While we may wish for a better approach, these tests are a gateway to selective schools."
- "Universal testing has been shown to reduce racial, ethnic and income disparities".
- "Evidence shows that if talented low-income students are mentored and coached, they are more likely to go to college, especially to a selective one. But we need to identify these students first. Universal free testing will help put more smart disadvantaged students on the radar of schools, mentors and advocacy groups that can help them."

SAT and ACT tests are important criteria for getting into college. In addition, students who take a preparation course have a greater chance to achieve a high score. These preparation courses can be expensive, and out of the reach of low -income students. These courses may make a difference on whether or not a student attends college, especially low-income students.

While the need for financial assistance for an SAT/ACT college preparation course is great among the entire metropolitan Detroit area, SIGP decided to focus this award on local girls in our community for the first year. Many of our members were surprised to find out that 20% of students at Grosse Pointe North High School are eligible for free or reduced lunch. To put this number in perspective, to be eligible for free lunch, a family of four would have an income under \$32,000 per year. According to Jennifer Sherman, a counselor at Grosse Pointe North High School, this number under-represents the true need since some families are too embarrassed to admit the need for financial assistance in an affluent community.

Potential applicants will be identified by the counseling staff at Grosse Pointe North High School, based on financial need (eligibility for free or reduced lunch) as well as personal and professional knowledge of the students. Those students who are interested in applying for the award will complete an application which will be judged by the high school award committee. The criteria used will include hardship, motivation, and initiative. Up to \$1,000 will be awarded, starting with the top ranked score until the award is spent. The amount awarded to each student will depend on the course selected as needs of the students vary and courses differ in what they offer and cost.

SIGP is proud to launch this new initiative to help a low-income female high school student or students take a SAT/ACT preparation course. This may provide her with an opportunity of attending college and realize her goal of obtaining higher education.

The SIGP Human Trafficking committee met on Wednesday, July 26th at the Grosse Pointe Woods library to discuss ideas for future Human Trafficking awareness activities for our club to host or participate in. The following Human Trafficking awareness activities were discussed:

- Helping with a SOAP project (Dream Cruise, Car show, etc)
- Helping with a Human Shelter for Human Trafficking victims (Eli's House?)
- Helping Salvation Army Human Trafficking team with basic needs back packs (toiletries, socks, underwear, sweats) to give to rescued victims.

- Helping to promote "Stuck In Traffic" movie to colleges and High Schools in our area
- Plan a 5K Walk/Run as a fundraiser for Human Trafficking and to raise awareness
- Plan a letter writing campaign to schools endorsing the movie, "Stuck in Traffic" and see if they want help with an event to show movie and discuss




