

Fasting:



What do you think about bringing some "Hope" to children experiencing abuse and neglect?

As you know our State Project will change at our upcoming convention and a new one voted for by our members attending. So, lets send a message of "Hope" to Project Ignite Light by showering them with items for their backpacks to help children being seen for neglect or abuse. We will collect items at the convention in Williston again and drop off the items on our way home.

What can you bring?

- New loose fitting 2-piece pajama sets 2T-5T, girls/ boys 4-18, men's S-XL and women's S-XL (for the older sizes a pajama pant paired with a solid color tshirt works well)
- Blanket (see instruction on website: ignitelight.org) 1 ½ yd tied fleece blankets using a print with matching solid color
- Book (Hardcover only) "You are Special" by Max Lucado
- 4) Flashlights Everbrite 18-pack assorted colors
- 5) Socks multi-pack, no-show or low-cut socks size infant through adult colors black, white or gray with small accents of color

These are the top items but there are more on the website (<u>ignitelight.org</u>) following the brands they list so the bags are all the same. As we get ready to start our Lenten journeys, may we be a part of providing the "Hope" for a child in need, sharing the "Light of Christ" where we can. You have already been so generous with your support but as you know working together we can make big things happen.

Dear CDA Sisters in Christ,

I am hoping many of you will come to the State CDA Convention in Williston this May. It is a wonderful time to get to meet new friends, old friends, be with likeminded women (Sisters in Christ) and learn more about your CDA organization.

I would like to share with you the dress attire for the convention. It is **business casual** which means you can choose from dress pants or a knee-length or longer skirt and a blouse to a dress that comes at least to the knee. We ask that you do not wear jeans, t-shirts, or sweatshirts. Appropriate shoes include sandals, flats and boots, but you should avoid flip-flops and tennis shoes (unless required or needed). It is a good idea to dress in layers, so if you are cold, you can add a layer or if you're too warm you can take a layer off.

- Friday is red, white, and blue day in honor of those who have and continue to fight for our many freedoms we have. So please wear something red, white, and blue on Friday.
- Saturday will be CDA day so wear CDA attire or CDA colors of purple, white, or gold.
- We usually dress up for the banquet on Saturday night, some like to wear long dresses, but regular length dresses are great too, skirts/dress pants and tops work also.
- For those of you that are officers, this is the Ceremonial Dress Code: We recognize that personal appearance is an important element of self-expression and strive not to control or dictate, but to ensure that the respect of the ORDER is upheld. When participating in a ceremony or a procession, please adhere to the following dress code.
- White Dress Blouses: Simple, all white blouse. No visible cleavage or sheer fabric. No sleeveless blouses. No tank tops. No crop tops. No t-shirts. Please remember your white shirt must be plain white, NO emblem on it.
- Dress Skirt: Simple, all black to the knee or longer.
 Dress Pants: All black dress pants. No capri pants. No exercise pants. No leggings. No black jeans.
- ♦ **Shoes:** All black shoes. No flip flops. No boots.
- Wearing stockings is optional, but if you choose to, they must be nude or skin tone color. No colored stockings.
- Jewelry: Officer Medallions on Ribbons are to be worn at all ceremonials (to be ordered from CDA store). All jewelry should be small and simple.

State Project Proposal by Ct. Fr. Tracy # 2121 **Stepping Stone Ministries**

The Sisters at Annunciation Monastery of Bismarck have always strived to respond to the needs of the day. They recognize where people are struggling, where basic needs are not met.

A very apparent need is for the homeless who go to the hospital for care but have no home to return to for a safe recovery. Without a clean home, nourishing food, and people to care for them and take them to and from appointments, their chance of recovery is very small.

The Sisters have been working for the past 3 years in refurbishing their former convent and turning it into a place of medical respite, called Stepping Stones Ministries. They were to open last November 2024. Earlier in the year the building endured frozen water pipes which burst and flooded the building. After this situation, as the building was moving forward with renovation, a fire started and caused major damage. Through grants and donations, Stepping Stones Ministries was well on its way to start blessing our civic community. Diverse business professionals stepped forward to assist in getting this important project off the ground. With this loss, the sisters believe God still has a plan, something even better will emerge. The dream is not gone, and they are not starting from square one, because knowledge and experience are never lost.

Ct. Fr. Tracy # 2121 is proposing "Stepping Stones Ministries" for your consideration to be the State Project for 2025-2027. Let's help in making their dream come true. Let's help the most vulnerable among us, the homeless.

State Project Proposal by the State Board. St. Mary Sisters

The State Board is proposing the St. Mary Sisters as the State Project for 2025-2027. Help the St. Mary Sisters build a convent for future academic and faith educators. Build it and they will come. Will the ND CDA be a part of helping the St. Mary Sisters build a convent in Bismarck?

In 2020 Sister Mary Joseph Campbell was endorsed by Bishop David Kagan in bringing the Dominican religious faith community to our state. From 1 sister to 4, they have outgrown their space. Three young women in postulancy will profess their first vows in July of 2025. Mother Mary Joseph states, "The new community is progressing as she would like but space is limited for existing novices much less those interested in visiting and discerning." We hope the North Dakota Catholic Daughters will be a part of building the Lepanto Convent that will house 12 sisters when finished, which is the first phase of a long-term building plan. As each one has received a gift, use it to serve one another as good stewards of God's varied grace. (1 Peter 4:10)

Dear Catholic Daughter Sisters,

We prepare together for the Season of Lent and even more so for the Truth of our Easter Season. To me, Easter has always been my favorite church season. From a child setting out my shoes for the "Easter Bunny", to picking out a new Easter dress, bonnet, and shoes for the Sunday celebration, I always experienced deep joy in my faith. Our deep joy of the Easter Season is most present and true as we celebrate the Tridium.

Bishop Donald Hying, of Madison Wisconsin, reminds us "The shocking, strange and powerful events of Holy Week should lead us to tears and laughter, gratitude and praise, humble awareness of our weakness and joyful acclamation of God's victory. The Tridium is a time for God to break open our hearts, so that the gracious torrent of Divine Mercy that flows from the side of the crucified Christ will wash us clean, forgive our sins and fashion us ever more deeply in the new creation of the Lord's saving death and resurrection."

Now might be a prefect time to read Peter Kreeft's book The Mystery of Joy and the Wisdom He Shares: "Joy we look for it, long for it, and spend our lives chasing it. Yet, do we really know what it is? Is it a feeling, a state of mind, or a reward for success? Do we know where to find it? The more we seek it, the more it eludes us." Yet joy is real, "Joy", writes philosopher Peter Kreeft, "is a mystery. It is bigger than we are." Joy's secret, however, is that it cannot be reached or found but only given. True joy is God Himself, who, giving Himself, takes us outside ourselves across valleys of loss and mountains of triumph. This lucid, witty reflection on the true nature of joy convinces us, page after page, that while sorrow is inevitable, joy is very, very near at hand. "It's scandalously simple," Kreeft reveals. "There's no method, you just do it." To "do" joy, we must let go of all fake happiness, all false gods. We must return, over and over, to the one true Joy, who is the Way, the Truth and the Life.

Drawing from the wisdom of C.S. Lewis and Saint Thomas Aquinas, this instant classic by self-proclaimed curmudgeon Peter Kreeft walks us through the long, beautiful task of surrendering to deep joy, the chief work of any life worth living.

May you each deeply surrender to joy, and our Easter miracles, as you continue to live a life worth living.


