## From the Pastor's Study

Dear Friends,

We are certainly living in a strange time. It is not quite accurate to describe it as a unique time, but certainly strange. It is not unique in that many deadly pestilences have come upon humanity throughout history. However, it is unique to us, as few people alive today can remember the events of the 1918-1919 Influenza pandemic.

When the Influenza pandemic hit in 1918, Rev. Theodore Bretscher was the pastor here at St. John's. The congregation history simply recalls that he served from 1909 through 1922 and that he retired from physical exhaustion after many years of service. Of note during his time at St. John's was the introduction of Divine Services in the English language - although German services continued to be held until 1947. Perhaps it seems surprising that there is no mention in the congregational history about the congregation's experiences during the 1918-1919 pandemic. This deadly pestilence claimed the lives of 675,000 Americans and so it is unlikely that St. John's was unaffected.

As Americans now reflect on what they heard about this pandemic from older relatives over the years, many have come to realize that they weren't told much. That's the way it often is with experiences that are unbelievably painful, people don't talk much about them in the years which follow and they are forgotten. Go into nearly any cemetery in the United States which existed in 1918 and you will be surprised by how many gravestones you find that bear the death years of 1918 and 1919. I majored in history in college and learned very little about the pandemic - just some passing references as World War I was discussed. It was later when I was cataloging cemetery stones for a county historical society that I discovered how pervasive this deadly disease was. I marveled at family plots that contained the graves of multiple loved ones who died during this period. An elderly man who had been alive at the time of the pandemic told me of a family plot in one of those rural Pennsylvania cemeteries in which a large grave was dug in the churchyard for multiple family members who had died within days of one another. Their memory is marked by a long gravestone (erected in later years) that lists each of their names under the surname of the family.

It will be interesting to see whether or not we speak freely in later years about our experiences during this pandemic. I am just as interested in what will be remembered as I am how much will be remembered and spoken of. In years to come, I pray that our reflections on this time will contribute to our Christian witness, as people remember how God upheld and cared for those who were suffering, how He renewed the Church's generosity in showing mercy to those in need, and how He provided opportunities for people to worship through the vocations of those who develop and operate technology. There, of course, will be those who mostly speak of their discomforts during this time, but I pray that many Christians will speak confidently about our Lord's gracious provisions during a very difficult time.

God's grace and mercy are seen everywhere. A man who is homeless told me last week about a doctor here in Beloit who came and picked him up in his car after he was bitten by something in the night. The doctor took him to his office/clinic and treated this man's wound and began the regiment of treatments he is undergoing. There must be thousands of stories like this circulating right now. God is certainly providing abundantly, even in a time like this. Do we see His hand? Can our neighbor?



All other items, of course, will be gratefully accepted as visits to the food banks are rising, and expected to continue to do so in the coming months.


