WHY HONOR COMMUNITY CHAMPIONS?

4 Characteristics of an Everyday Hero:

1. Awareness.

Be aware of how your actions impact those around you. Dare to share at a deeper level than just your material successes, job promotions, or athletic/academic achievements.

2. Authenticity.

In the world of role modeling, heroes walk their talk. Heroes live up to their own values. When you make a mistake (and you will), the bravest, most inspiring, and potentially the most helpful course of action is to admit your mistakes.

3. Recognizing Your Power.

Everything you do has the ability to influence others. Just think of how many times in your life your own decisions were shaped by someone else's opinion or influence. Be the one who gives courage to others.

4. Service.

Being a volunteer and serving others is only one of the many ways heroism manifests itself, but it is an enriching, important, and rewarding way to live your life and leave a legacy.
