#### **OPERATIONS**

Once again, the Christmas season has flown by. Our second annual tree lighting was a huge success. Thank you to the Fundraising Committee, who covered the expense of the refreshments. Thank you to Joyce Wilson who provided the Christmas music outside. Last but not least, thank you to Santa for taking time out of his busy schedule to be with us again this year. Now we can set our sights on a new year.

Winter is a slower season for maintenance, except for the snowstorms that always seem to happen on the weekend. Thank you to Jon Gunn and Ray Pelletier who helped with this last storm by keeping the clubhouses and mail houses clear and salted. As with the leaves, if you have a drain near your home and you are physically capable, we would appreciate your help in keeping it clear of snow. Besides the plowing, there's a lot of work that needs to be done with each storm.

Jeff completed the installation of the carpet tiles on the lower level of Partridge clubhouse. It looks much cleaner and brighter. He still has to replace the insulation and the ceiling tiles that were damaged over the bar from the sewer line backup. Discussion is ongoing as to what type of bar is needed to replace the one that had to be taken down.

A few rules reminders. Rubbish (bagged with bags securely tied) and recyclables are to be kept in containers designed for that purpose. Rubbish bags that are left out of a container are subjected to the crows picking through them and when it's windy, the bags sometimes roll down the street creating an obstacle course for vehicles. Please keep your trash bags in a trash container.

Vehicle parking: Parking on the streets must not interfere with snow removal. No overnight parking is allowed on the streets and no street parking is allowed from November 15th to April 15th. Please do not park your vehicle on Constitution Drive during a storm. This area needs to be kept clear in order to plow and push snow.

Jeff and I will soon be meeting with Don Dubois of Dubois Tree Service to put a plan together for this year's tree program. As you know, the budget this year is substantial. The plan is to be sure all the outstanding resident Work Orders will be completed providing the request is justified. We will then address the trees in our common areas that have not been addressed for quite some time. As soon as I have a schedule, I will post it at the mail houses with a start date and the addresses we will be concentrating on. Like years past, please keep in mind that the schedule is always subject to change due to unforeseen circumstances. Also, this program is to address dead or diseased trees or trees that are damaging to your roof, shed, driveway or sidewalk. We will not be taking down healthy trees because of too many acorns or leaves.

We are looking forward to year 2023 and what challenges it will bring. With the support of the residents, I have no doubt it will be a good year! As always, thank you, Jeff, for all your hard work in maintaining our community.

The winner receives half of the proceeds. If all numbers are played the winner receives \$250.



#### **TASTY TIDBITS** by Cat Pragoff

Brrrrr! Baby, it's cold outside! And when it's cold outside, what's better than something warm from the kitchen? Here are a few recipes for perfect warmer-uppers that are easy to make, and delicious, too.

#### **Tuscan Vegetable Soup**

(makes 3-4 servings)



Ingredients:

1/4 cup olive oil

1 medium onion, peeled and thinly sliced

2 tablespoons fresh celery leaves, chopped (may substitute fresh flatleaf parsley or basil

leaves for the celery leaves, if you prefer)
4 large Swiss chard leaves, ribs removed, roughly chopped (may substitute Savoy cabbage, if you prefer)

1/4 cup red wine

1-1/2 cups tomato puree

4 cups water (may substitute vegetable broth for a richer soup)

3 teaspoons fine sea salt, to taste Freshly ground pepper, to taste 3-4 slices country bread, toasted 1 clove garlic, peeled and sliced in half

For serving: freshly grated Parmigiano-Reggiano cheese—or omit the cheese to make this soup recipe vegan

#### Directions:

- In a large stockpot, heat the olive oil over medium heat. Add the sliced onion and sauté until soft and slightly golden, about 5-8 minutes.
- Add the celery leaves and Swiss chard leaves. Sauté until the greens are wilted, about 2 minutes.
- Add the wine and cook until the alcohol smell has dissipated, about 1 minute.
- Add the tomato puree and water (or broth) and stir to combine. Season to taste with salt and pepper.
- Bring to a simmer, then cover and continue to simmer over low heat for 15-20 minutes.
- While the soup is cooking, toast the bread. Then rub each slice with 1/2 clove of garlic. Place a slice of toast in the bottom of each soup bowl.
- Ladle soup over the bread and let sit for 1-2 minutes to allow the bread to soften. Top each serving with a generous portion of grated cheese, if desired.

## **Creamy Chicken Noodle Soup Using Rotisserie Chicken**

(makes 4-6 servings)

Ingredients:



2 Tablespoonsunsalted butter1 Tablespoon olive oil2 cups onion, chopped

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1 cup carrots, chopped

- 1 cup celery, chopped
- 1-3/4 teaspoons kosher salt
- 3 Tablespoons all-purpose flour
- 4 cups unsalted chicken stock
- 2 cups whole milk
- 4 ounces uncooked whole wheat egg noodles
- 3 cups coarsely chopped chicken breast (from 2 rotisserie chickens)
- 1 cup frozen peas

#### Directions:

- In a large stockpot, melt butter with olive oil over medium-high heat. Add onion, carrots, celery and salt, and cook, stirring often, until the vegetables are slightly softened, about 6-8 minutes.
- Add the flour and stir to coat. Stir in the broth and milk and let the mixture come to a boil. Add the uncooked egg noodles to the boiling mixture. Cover and cook until the noodles are al dente, about 8 minutes.
- Stir in the chicken and frozen peas. Cook until the noodles reach your preferred doneness and the chicken and peas are warmed through, about 1-2 minutes more. Serve immediately.



**Tomato Basil Soup** (*Makes 3-4 servings*)

Ingredients: 2 teaspoons olive oil, plus more for drizzling

1 small onion, finely chopped
1 stalk celery, finely chopped
1 clove garlic, minced
1/2 cup fresh basil, chopped
1 teaspoon fresh thyme leaves, chopped
2 (14 ounce) cans diced tomatoes
2 cups vegetable broth (may substitute chicken broth if you prefer)

#### Directions:

• In a medium saucepan, heat the olive oil over medium heat. Add the onions, celery and garlic and gently sauté until softened, about 5-6 minutes. Don't allow the garlic to brown.

- Add the basil, thyme, tomatoes and broth. Bring to a boil.
- Reduce the heat and simmer for 10 minutes. Remove from the heat and allow to cool a little. Use an immersion blender to purée the soup. Alternatively, purée the soup in batches in either a blender or food processor.
- Purée lightly for a chunky consistency; otherwise, purée it fully for a velvety texture.
- Serve hot, drizzled with olive oil, accompanied by Italian bread or a celery stalk stirrer.

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
