- 1) Light bulbs in the church have finally arrived and are installed for the hanging lights.
- 2) The church elevator has been serviced, and waiting for an inspection.
- 3) It was decided to have the church and Geiger Hall pressure washed, due to a heavy build up of mold and mildew on the back roof, and concrete surfaces. The total cost for the project will be approximately \$4,450.00. Payment for this has been approved through special funds.

It's now the time of year for grass cutting to start. If anyone wants to help with this, please call Rex Rosebrock or myself to set this up.

There always is a need for some raking, weeding, trimming, etc. to be done. If someone has the urge to get out in the fresh air, this would be a perfect opportunity.

Evangelism - at a Distance?

We find ourselves in a strange new world, one in which we must change the way we meet and share the gospel. Sure, fellowship is more difficult. But God's plans are still in place, as are the tasks that he has given us. Do we put evangelism on hold until we can re-engage face to face? No way. There is no better time to share, as people everywhere look for a message of hope and purpose. So what are some things that we as Christians can do right now?

Pray and be a calm presence to others.

Pray for an end to the pandemic, to give governing authorities wisdom in their management of the crisis, to bring healing and comfort to those who are sick. Pray for the protection of health care workers, essential workers at all levels and for open hearts and minds to the gospel as we witness and serve others.

Keep in touch with the people around you, particularly the vulnerable, isolated or needy.

Reaching out to others is one of the greatest things we can give right now. By phone, email, video or through social media. And remember, everyone does not have access to technology but usually has access to a phone or U.S. mail.

Look for ways to show kindness.

Reach out at any level you are comfortable with and in ways that are safe. Prepare meals, run errands, support local businesses and donate to charities. Be a good listener – people are going through difficult times –financial struggles, health issues, feelings of increased isolation and anxiety about the future. Sometimes the best way to help someone is to listen.

Point one another to God and His promises to us through Jesus.

Encourage one another to look to God first and depend on him in all circumstances. Circumstances will change, but God and his love for us will continue.

Know your limits and care in ways that are sustainable and safe.

Care for yourself physically, emotionally and spiritually so you can care for others. Engage in fellowship. Adhere to government health directives. Get adequate sleep and rest. Balance news with time spent in prayer and God's word.

Let's not waste the time God has given us. Let's use it to be creative and compassionate, to appreciate friends and family and the beauty of the natural world. Let us learn lessons and develop habits that will benefit us in years to come!

Fathers in the Family: Teach Children about Christ

There are many important fathers in the Bible, some that trusted God fully and others that fell short. A father's role is to bring up his children in faith and to do so with love and patience, not with anger or provocation. Deuteronomy 6:5–7 says it this way: "You shall love the LORD your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your might. And these words that I command you today shall be on your heart. You shall teach them diligently to your children, and shall talk of them when you sit in your house, and when you walk by the way, and when you lie down, and when you rise."

<u>Noah</u> is one of the biblical patriarchs that really understood this verse. In a world that was so corrupted that God felt the need to wipe it out with a flood, Noah trusted God to keep him and his family safe. He loved God and taught his children about God's saving grace through it all. Abraham trusted God so much that he was willing to sacrifice his son, Isaac.

Another great Bible verse about the role of fathers comes from Proverbs 22:6: "Train up a child in the way he should go; even when he is old he will not depart from it." The Word of the Lord endures forever, especially in the heart of a child who has come to know and love Christ with the help of a wonderful father who leads by example.

Mothers in the Family: Supporters and Nurturers

The very first mother, Eve, is described as being created to be a helper to Adam, which is one major role that mothers have. Although fathers are meant to discipline children, moms are meant to nurture and care for them, while also stepping back and allowing a child to learn lessons on their own. Moms help dads to raise children in Christ while also reflecting God's love for them in parenthood. <u>Proverbs 31:10-31</u> has frequently been

used as a biblical example of the role of a mother, both as a helper to the father in the household and as her own individual person.

Look at all the different mothers recounted in the Bible. Hannah waited patiently for the Lord to send her a son; Mary trusted that God would provide for her, Joseph, and baby Jesus. Many biblical mothers had the same struggles that today's mothers do, but they show that following God's plan for them is ultimately what's best.


