Page 1

Concerns:

1. Need to recognize and accommodate overlap while focusing on specific area/block.
2. Too many meetings
 - a. Suggestion – talk about it all instead of one block
 - b. Need to get conversation beyond traffic and open space
 - c. Avoid cut & paste approach
 - d. Simple table to make materials understandable

Page 2

- e. Combine listening session with open house + get GPAC to help bring people
- f. Combine meetings in more than one block
- g. Maybe too many meetings, but good to flexible about how many meeting occur
- h. Build meetings on each other so more blocks are included in later meetings
- i. Offer opportunity for GPAC to see materials before hand
- j. Loop back to participants and build on previous meetings

3. How to keep it fair? Get all voices.
 - a. Sessions at houses can leave people out.
 - b. Pick a park or similar.
 - i. Set-up site
 - ii. Outreach w/email + flyers
 - iii. Use personal invitation to every household (neutral place)
 - iv. Also have a presence at scheduled community events.
 - c. Library worked as a model for this
 - d. Consider a Survey out to all households
 - e. Go to Senior locations + Meeting places for Latinos community members

- f. Move about tours – great idea
 - i. Walking, buses, biking
- g. Go to youth
- h. Bike tour from Brian's neighborhood to experience challenges of routes to downtown.
- i. Provide Examples from other communities that have resolved issues in materials
- j. End the process with culminating meeting
- k. 4 Listening Sessions at 4 parks broad notification at different times.
