pastor's letter from Pastor Jane

Dear Brothers & Sisters in Christ,

In this busy and scary world, I wish you **Grace and Peace** from God our father and our Lord Jesus Christ. If we listen to the **news**, on the national and international level, we may feel very discouraged. Where is the Grace or Peace?

If we listen to the **weather** report, nationally and locally, we may feel very discouraged. Where is the Grace or Peace?

If we see what **our kids are up against** in the future, we may feel very discouraged. Where is the Grace or Peace?

Jesus says He offers a peace that passes all(human) understanding. Can you think of someone that has that kind of peace? A spiritual mentor who remains calm enough to act and help in the face of tragedy, disaster, or difficulty no matter how large or small?

I had the chance to visit my former Sunday School teacher last weekend who was that mentoring person for me. Mrs. Schmidt is now 97!

Jesus calls us to be like Him. To be His calming presence in the midst of the World. How do we develop grace and Peace that comes naturally? It is never natural. It goes against our first reaction. We start out small and gradually become adept at grace and peace in bigger situations. Make it a habit to think or pray, "Lord, help me to be calm, like Jesus would be in this situation."

We start small, with everyday things as practice helps us improve, like self-discipline in developing muscles for sporting events, vocal chords for singing, dexterity for playing instruments or typing or texting. When we can be Jesus' presence in small things, it prepares us to be gracious and peaceful in the big things.

Paul advises, "Be not conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewal of your mind" (Romans 12:2) You see, we are all in the process of becoming our best selves. If we aren't doing this we are in the process of being self-indulgent and becoming our worst selves. Make no mistake, we are always "in process" of becoming one or the other.

Grace and Peace is not magically conferred on us. It is a process that is implemented in our everyday lives as we seek Him. "Seek and you will find." (Matthew 7:7). A process that God works in us as we seek Him. This spiritual work of seeking him, actually produces more than grace and peace.

God's work is a process that produces the fruit of the Spirit. "But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, self-control; against such things there is no law. Now those who belong to Christ Jesus have crucified the flesh with its passions and desires. If we live by the Spirit, let us also walk by the Spirit." (Galatians 5:22-26)

Scripture Reading: Mark 6:1-13

To be free is not merely to cast off one's chains, but to live in a way that respects and enhances the freedom of others. —Nelson Mandela oday, Americans all over the world are waving the flag of the United States of America. Our country is 245 years old! The flag is a symbol of our freedom. But it is not the same flag that the signers of the Declaration of Independence flew on July 4, 1776. When the flag was officially adopted on June 14, 1777 (June 14 is now known as Flag Day), Congress accepted the colors of red, white and blue, not because they had any special meaning, but because they were familiar colors. The flag of Great Britain from whence most of the colonists had emigrated was also of red, white and blue. It was not until the Great Seal of the United States was established five years later (in 1782) that Congress assigned clear meaning to the colors of red, white and blue. Charles Thomson, Secretary of the Continental Congress, explained the symbolism of the colors: "White signifies purity and innocence, Red, hardiness and valor, and Blue, vigilance, perseverance and justice." This is an impressive set of virtues toward which all patriotic Americans should aspire. But they are not just secular virtues; they are sacred ones as well, because they dovetail with our aspirations as Christians, especially the last three: vigilance, perseverance and justice. Here is a Bible verse about each of these virtues: Vigilance: "Be sober, be vigilant; because your adversary the devil, as a roaring lion, walketh about, seeking whom he may devour" (1 Peter 5:8, KJV). Perseverance: "We also glory in our sufferings, because we know that suffering produces perseverance; perseverance, character; and character, hope" (Romans 5:3-4, NIV). Justice: "He has told you, O mortal, what is good; and what does the LORD require of you but to do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God?" (Micah 6:8). As we wave our flag today to celebrate liberty and freedom, let's remember the meaning of the colors assigned by our country's founders. Even better, rather than just remembering, let's express these virtues every day of our lives. —Timothy Merrill Prayer: O God, we thank you for our freedom. Thank you for those who gave their lives that we might enjoy liberty. Help me today to live out the virtues symbolized in the colors of our flag.

Amen.
