## The Acmar Community Quilt

Sometimes we receive letters or notes of family stories from Acmar. The following information was provided by Billy Coupland, providing another perspective on life in Acmar based on information from his mother, Jewel.

My grandparents, James Crethes Mayfield and Pearl White Mayfield were married in May of 1913. My grandfather was an electrician and mechanic for Alabama Fuel & Iron, so he moved often. They lived in Acmar when my mother, Jewel, was born. She was the oldest of seven children, four girls and three boys. They moved to Overton when Mother was seven years old. They moved into a new house. In fact, the doors were hung the day they moved in. Mother started school there at a one room church with grades 1-8. The desks were church pews. The new school was ready by Christmas so they left the church and went into the new school. They moved from Overton to Acton when she was about 8 years old and then moved back to Acmar two years later. They only lived there a year before moving back to Acton. They stayed in Acton about 18 months and then moved back to Acmar in the Washer Camp where the coal was washed and loaded onto railroad cars.

Mother started to Moody Jr. High while she lived there. She had to walk about a mile to catch the bus. She told me one time they had to get off the bus so the bus could climb the hill by the Cahaba River, (the only way the driver was able to climb the hill was to back up the hill.) Sometimes she was able to ride the work train which carried miners to different mines. She went to St. Clair County High School. She didn't need to walk as they had moved again to another house in what was called #3 Camp. She graduated in 1933 in a class of 28. The State of Alabama had closed the schools in the spring of that year because of the Depression. The only students who could go to school were the seniors, who had to pay tuition in order to graduate. The Depression was getting bad in 1933. Alabama Fuel & Iron was a non-union company so the Union was trying to organize the men. They were having meetings at different places. My grandfather was a salary person, so he wasn't eligible to join the union. Some of his friends came to his house and wanted him to drive them to a Union meeting, so he took them. One of his neighbors reported this to the Superintendent, so my grandfather was fired.

My grandfather had bought some land and built a house in White's Chapel so they had a place to move to. Times were really hard. My grandfather bought an old truck and hauled lumber to make a few dollars. Grandmother made all their clothes and canned stuff from their garden. My grandfather bought a mule and planted a garden. He had a sorghum patch and carried the cane to a place where they made sorghum syrup. They had corn meal and made a grist mill, they had to work hard to make a living. Mother's cousin opened a small store nearby and she worked there for a few months. This added a few dollars to help. She met my father, James Coupland, in the summer of 1933. He lived on a farm near Bethel Church and worked in the mines.

United Mine Workers were still trying to organize the miners, so it was a tough time. The St. Chair Times had an article, "The Battle of White's Chapel" I read on the Internet. The tragic happenings of October 28, were not, as many think, an isolated incident. They were the climax to a long series of attempts by organized gangs of armed men to invade the homes and menace the lives of employees and their families in an unsuccessful effort to compel them, by threats and violence, to join the United Mine Workers of America. My father's car was parked in front of the store where my mother worked. My grandfather went to see what was going on as the Union men were coming up the hill near the Cahaba River. Shots were exchanged and one union man was killed. My father was in the group of six Acmar men there. They were arrested, tried, and released. Their lawyer was named Borden Burr. My father told him he would name his first son after him. (James Borden Coupland) My dad left the mines when World War II started. He worked at Goslins where they made shells for the Army; therefore he was exempt from the draft as he was too old at that time and had three kids.

The incident at White's Chapel bothered my dad so much. A few days before he died 24 years later, he said it was the worst thing he had ever done and to pray for God to forgive him.
