When my son, Thomas, and I were 'tapped out', I was honored to be nominated to the Order of the Arrow. While aware of the need to undertake my Ordeal, exactly what I would encounter was a bit of a mystery. I later learned that mystery plays an important part of the Ordeal.

My Ordeal began with a cold, wet Friday evening outdoors, where about half-way through the night, it felt better to sleep standing up. It ended with a heart filled with gratitude and appreciation for the shared experience that I had with my son and 30 other candidates that only cheerful service can provide.

The Ordeal is a combination of physical exertion, self-deprivation, and acts of good that creates a strong bond. It's called brotherhood. When that happens, much can be accomplished because it brings about cooperation, empathy, and a sense of purpose.

In my case, my Ordeal had me persevere through an uncomfortable night only to greet morning's first light, through a narrow slit in my blanket at a fog-shrouded landscape, while listening to wild turkeys calling out in the distance.

The fire I needed for breakfast got an assist when a fellow candidate, a brother, handed me some dry twigs that breathed new life into dying flames.

My work assignment took me to Chapel, where I joined my son and others to replace the posts and rails that encircle this special place. It was hard work digging those post holes. It's all rock, but the view is amazing. Add to that a warm breeze and the occasional eagle riding a thermal just overheard, made it perfect, working shoulder to shoulder with my brothers.

Not wanting to reveal too much about Saturday evening's ceremony, I can only say that it was an amazing, once-ina-lifetime experience that I shared with my son and will cherish forever.

Never did I expect to have such an experience, yet, I did, and therein lies, the mystery of the Ordeal.

Update Youth Protection Training (YPT)

Everyone Needs to Update Youth Protection Training

The BSA has recently introduced newly updated youth protection training that is **required for all registered adults and volunteers by September 30th, 2018**. Anyone who took the old training prior to the February 2018 rollout is required to be re-certified again.

The updated training includes three modules and a test that takes a little over an hour to complete. Once completed, this training will cover Chester County Council volunteers through the end of 2019.

To get started, go to http://my.scouting.org and sign in using your Username and Password. Click on the 'Begins with Youth Protection' symbol or click on 'Menu' in upper left corner and select 'My Dashboard'. I recommend you read the 'How to Guide for Taking Youth Protection Training' PDF for detailed instructions. There seems to be a delay between 'Add Plan' and the 'Launch Course' button appearing. Based on my experience with the new training you should plan on at least 90 minutes to complete the training.

Winter has ended and it's time to think about summer camp!

There are only 11 weeks and 5 days left until Troop 78 will arrive at the Dan Beard Campsite at Camp Horseshoe for two weeks:

- Week One starts on Sunday, June 24th and ends on July 1st
- Week Two begins on Sunday, July 1st and ends on July 8th

Final payment is due by April 20th (cost this year is \$405.00 per week if paid in full by April 20th, \$465 per week after April 20th).

Please include final payment slip with payment (slip is available on the Troop website).

Do not forget about the Multi-Scout Family Discount. Families with more than one scout attending camp with the troop pays the entire fee for Scout one; the entire fee less \$50 for each additional scout.

Medical forms are due May 31st. The health form is on the troop website and must be less than one calendar year old for the entire time you are at camp. Please make sure the completed medical form includes parts A, B & C with a front and back copy of your medical insurance card.

You will receive a free troop T-shirt if you pay in full by April 20th and turn in your completed medical form to the troop by May 31st.

Troop 78 Scouts learn many skills for rank advancement, hundreds of merit badges, and display their teamwork, skills, and Scout spirit in the many games and contests at camp. The basis for our Scouting program is camping, and this two-week period is always the highlight of our Scouting year.

Your troop committee and leadership would like to have 100% of the troop in camp this summer. We are encouraging 2nd year and up campers to stay for two weeks.
