

A Note from Pastor Toni

This is my favorite church season of all! Starting with Palm Sunday, we are invited to be a part of the story. We welcome Jesus into Jerusalem, waving our palm branches and shouting, "Hosanna to the Son of David!" A day later, our shouts change to "Crucify him! Crucify him!" On Maundy Thursday, we break bread and share the cup, remembering the Last Supper and joining Jesus at the Table of forgiveness with the mystery of bread becoming His body and wine becoming His blood. Body and blood become our salvation.

Good Friday finds us at the foot of the cross, looking upon the agony and the death of our Savior and remembering our role in placing Jesus on the cross.

worship. On Maundy Thursday I couldn't wait for the tenderness of a stranger washing my feet and then sharing in Holy Communion around a table. I watched in awe as the altar was cleared of everything on Good Friday, the lights were turned off and a candle was lit for the Easter vigil that would last until early Sunday morning. During the singing of that first Easter hymn, the shouts of "Alleluia!" the altar is dressed with candles and gorgeous flowers, the cross is bloomed with every color of spring and a beautiful, flowing silvery white fabric is draped over the cross behind the altar. He is Risen Indeed!


In my years of observing Holy Week, I can't remember a single sermon, or what a priest said from the pulpit, but I do remember the experience of Maundy Thursday and Good Friday: that stranger washing my feet, my forehead against

the hard wood of the cross. This is a huge part of how I have come to know grace — that I have betrayed Jesus just as much as Judas, that I have denied Jesus just as much as Peter, but that I too am beloved and forgiven and saved.

Given the distressing times in our nation and in our world, I enter this year's Holy Week with a very real sense of the sin and depravity in humankind. Yes, there is darkness and death, but I believe in a God who overcame death and the grave. I believe and follow Christ who processed into Jerusalem on a donkey, celebrated and cheered and then was crucified by the same crowds who shouted praise and Alleluia's! Our God washed feet and broke bread and suffered Growing up, I never wanted to miss Holy Week violence and betraval all for a love deeper and wider and higher and greater than we can comprehend.

> The experience of Holy Week and Easter reminds us that it is not enough to talk about death and resurrection; we have to live it! And for Jesus followers, that is the most challenging part of all. Seriously consider inviting someone to our celebration of Easter Sunday Worship this year. Give them the gift of Hope





The #1 *New York Times* bestselling author of *A Man Called Ove* returns with *Beartown* an instant *New York Times* bestseller—about a forgotten town fractured by scandal, and the amateur hockey team that might just change everything.

People say Beartown is finished. A tiny community nestled deep in the forest, it is slowly losing ground to the ever encroaching trees. But down by the lake stands an old ice rink, built generations ago by the working men who founded this town. And in that ice rink is the reason people in Beartown believe tomorrow will be better than today. Their junior ice hockey team is about to compete in the national semi-finals, and they actually have a shot at winning. All the dreams of this place now rest on the shoulders of a handful of teenage boys.

Being responsible for the hopes of an entire town is a heavy burden, and the semi-final



an entire town is a heavy burden, and the semi-final match is the catalyst for a violent act that will leave a young girl traumatized and a town in turmoil. Accusations are made and, like ripples on a pond, they travel through all of Beartown, leaving no resident unaffected.

Beartown explores the hopes that bring a small community together, the secrets that tear it apart, and the courage it takes for an individual to go against the grain. In this story of a small forest town, Fredrik Backman has found the entire world. "Like *Friday Night Lights*, this is about more than youth sports; it's part coming-of-age novel, part study of moral failure, and finally a chronicle of groupthink in which an unlikely hero steps forward to save more than one person from self-destruction" (*Kirkus Reviews*).

August Pullman was born with a facial difference that, up until now, has prevented him from going to a mainstream school. Starting 5th grade at Beecher Prep, he wants nothing more than to be treated as an ordinary kid– but his new classmates can't get past Auggie's extraordinary face. *Wonder*, a *#1 New York Times* bestseller, begins from Auggie's point of view, but soon switches to include his classmates, his sister, her boyfriend, and others. These perspectives converge in a portrait of one community's struggle with empathy, compassion, and acceptance.

In a world where bullying among young people is an epidemic, this is a refreshing new narrative full of heart and hope. R.J. Palacio has called her debut novel "a meditation on kindness" -indeed, every reader will come away with a greater appreciation for the simple courage of friendship. Auggie is a hero to root for, who proves that you can't blend in when you were born to stand out.

We saw this vulnerability last October, when one of our youth gave their testimony of transparency in front of the congregation, after IMPACT visited a youth conference. This was a courageous act on behalf of that youth. Knowing their identity in Christ and feeling secure being covered in the Glory of God. To create a culture of Vulnerability we need to walk in vulnerability ourselves

and build trust with a profound amount of love. Just as Christ died on the cross, we can die to our flesh and live in the transparency of the Cross.
