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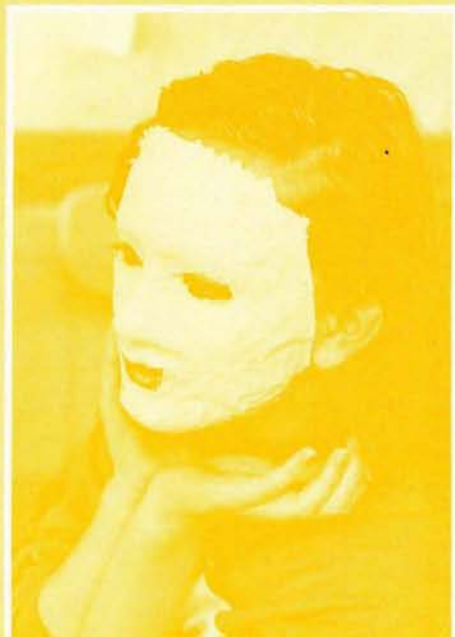

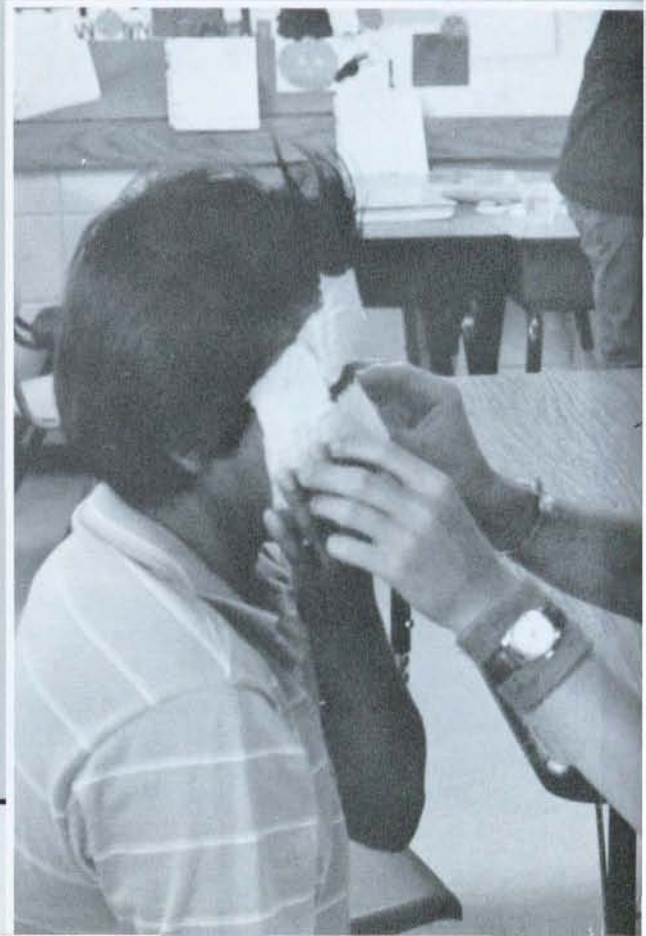

Student life describes the kinds of activities students love to do, whether it's during or after school.

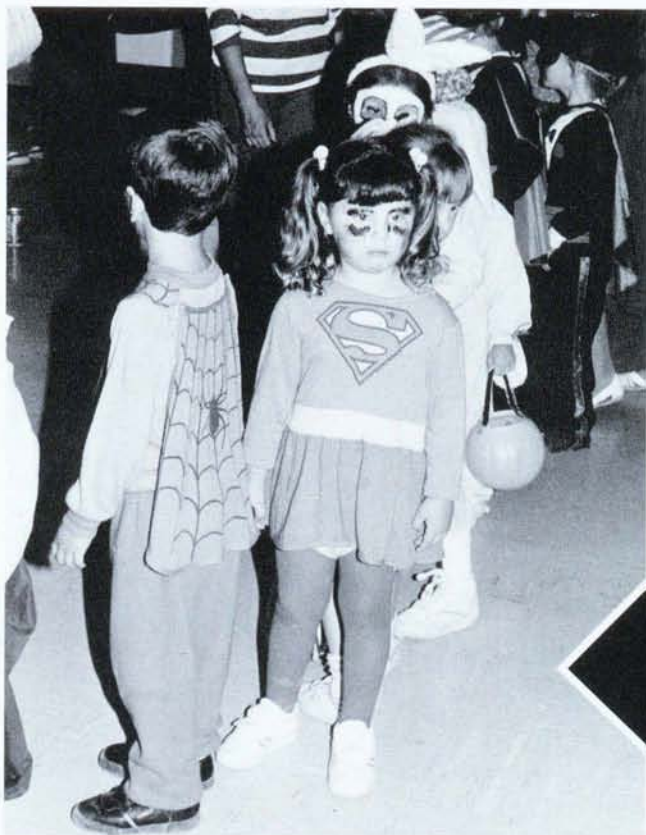
Every student does a variety of things to have fun during lunch. Some like to chat and eat together or cruise down town. Other have to go home and have lunch. After school students do a lot of other things.

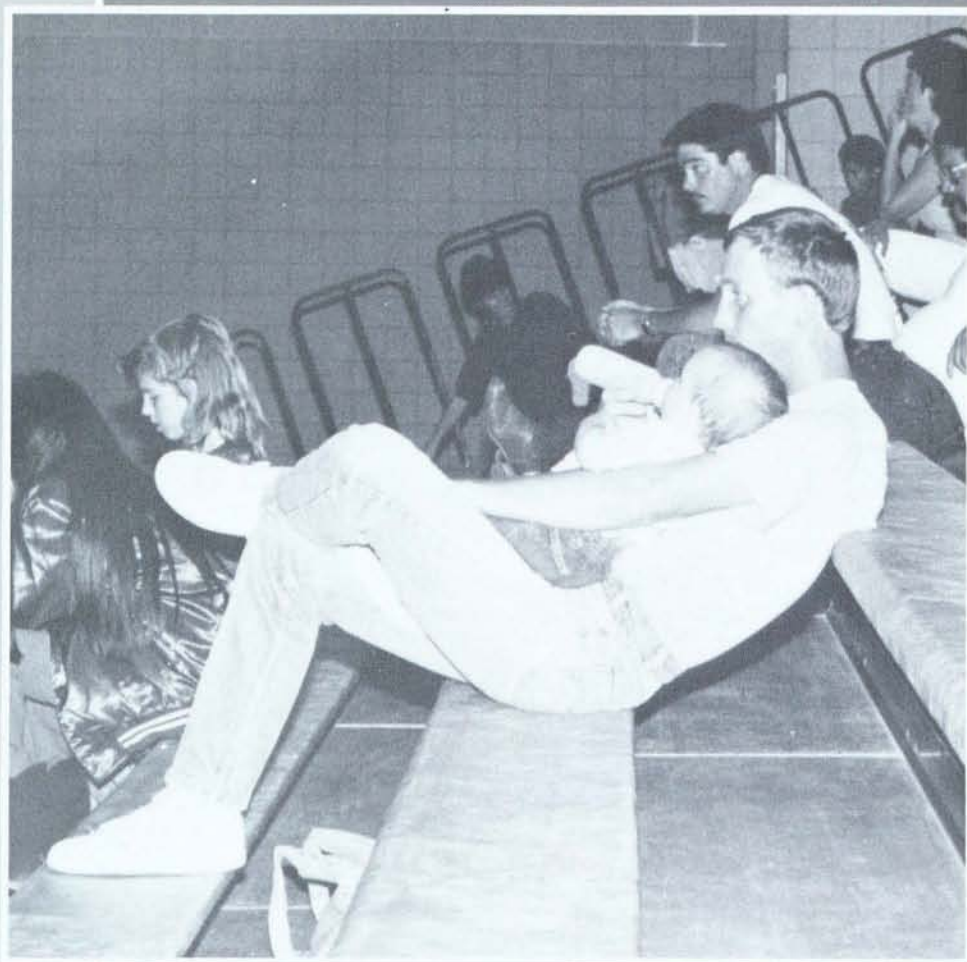

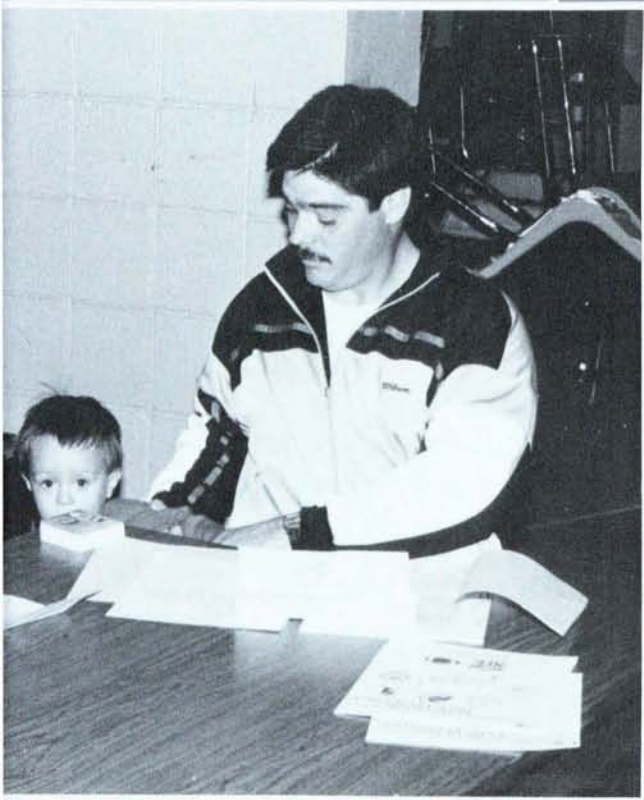

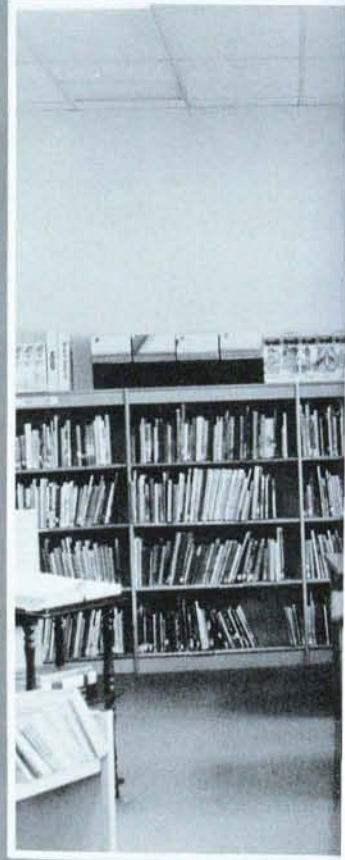






# Out With The Old . . .

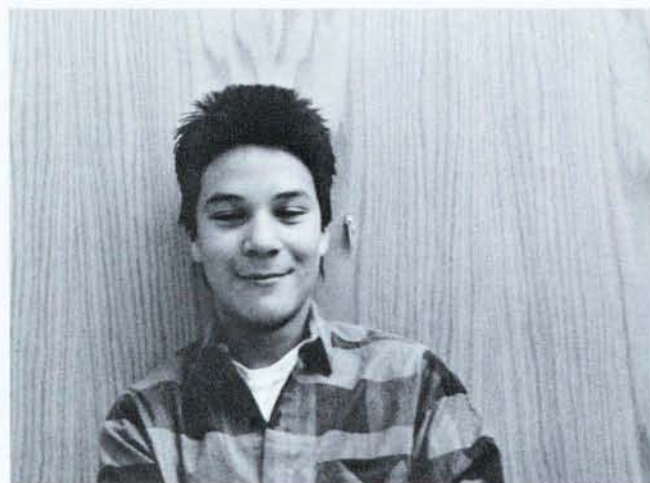

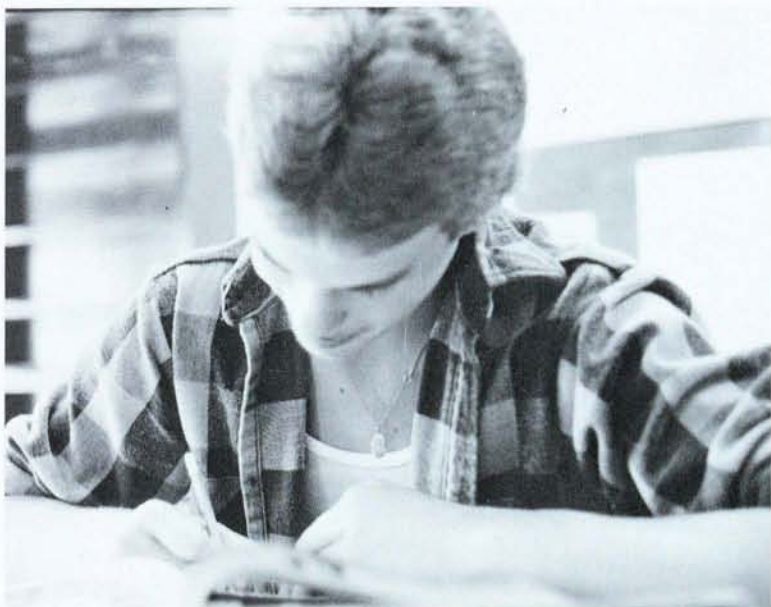

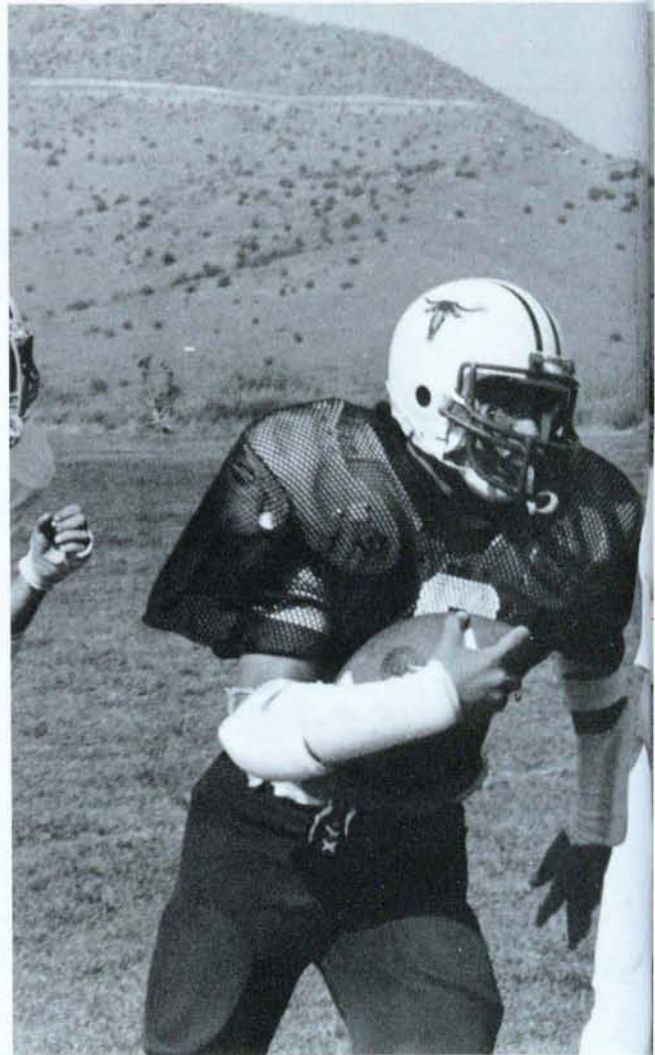

Magdalena beat the NMSD Roadrunners, and lost the next

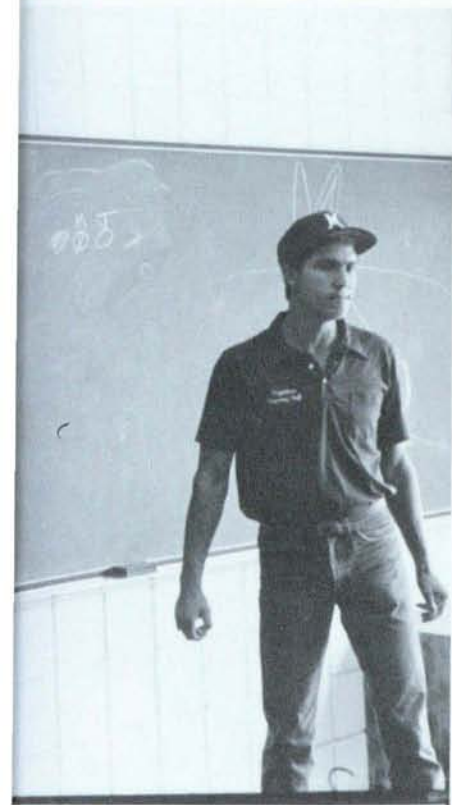
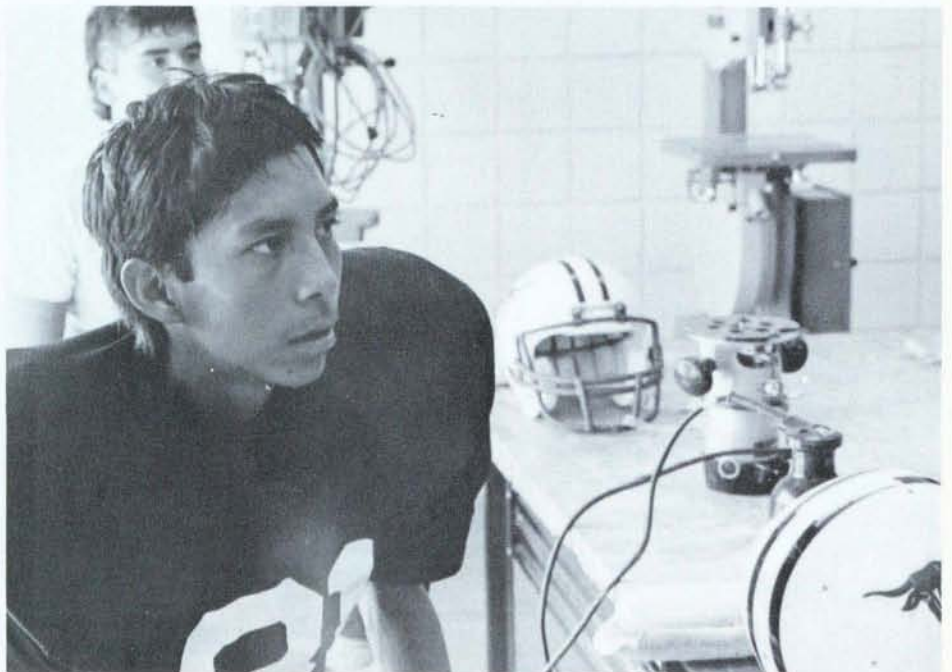
game to the Lake Arthur Panthers.

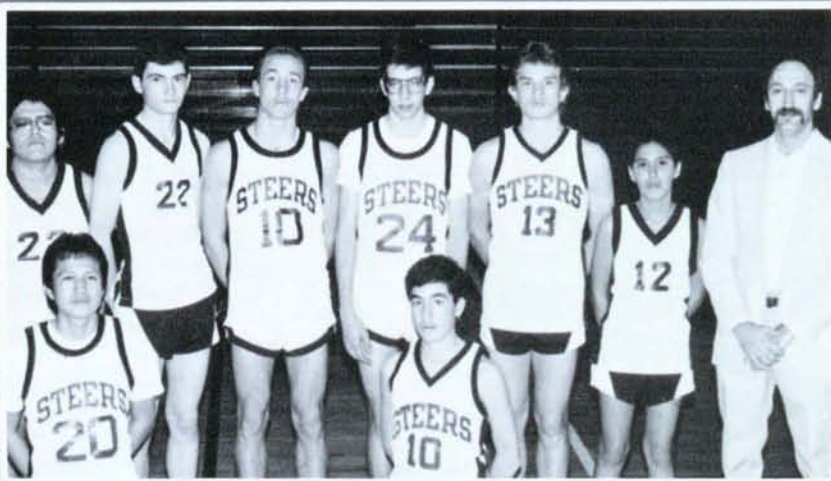


The Magdalena Boys Basketball Team had a good season this year. Under new head coach Tony Myers the team tried new and different strategies. Some worked, but others didn't.

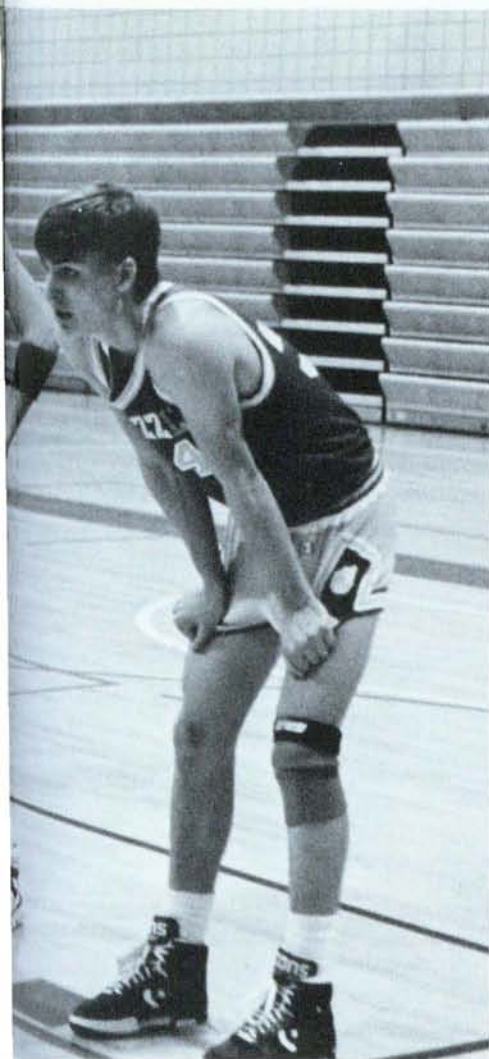
