COLORADO TRIVIA

Instead of questions this month, I thought I might share some interesting trivia of events that have made the region notable.

May 1, 2013 - An act of the Colorado General Assembly makes civil unions legal in Colorado for both conventional and same-sex couples, although same-sex marriage remains illegal for 17 months.

May 8, 1988 - Colorado U.S. Senator Gary Hart announces the end of his presidential campaign which began the previous month.

May 9, 2000 - The Denver Museum of Natural History changes its name to the Denver Museum of Nature and Science.

May 12, 1958 - Canada and the United States establish the North American Air Defense Command (NORAD) to be headquartered at Ent Air Force Base.

May 12, 1969 - The International Olympic Committee selects Denver to host the XII Olympic Winter Games in 1976.

May 13, 1976 - The New York Nets defeat the Denver Nuggets 112 to 106 in the last American Basketball Association game ever played. The Denver Rockets/Nuggets finish their nine seasons in the ABA with a record of 474 wins and 432 loses.

May 13, 2006 - The Colorado Mammoth defeat the Buffalo Bandits 16 to 9 to win their first National Lacrosse League Champion's Cup.

May 17, 1983 - The United States Air Force begins construction of Falcon Air Force Station near Colorado Springs.

May 19, 1971 - The Denver Art Museum opens its Gio Ponti designed North Tower.

May 20, 2006 - The Denver Outlaws defeat the Chicago Machine 24 to 14 in their first Major League Lacrosse game.

May 21, 1976 - The final segment of I-225 is opened in Denver, completing the entire 11.959-mile (19.246 km) length of Interstate Highway I-225.

May 24, 1962 - Astronaut Scott Carpenter from Boulder becomes the fourth person to orbit the Earth.

SOCO Tourism Summit

Two RMGA members, Steve Kaverman and Tom Jensen participated in the SOCO (Southern Colorado) Tourism 2019 Summit April 3rd to 5th hosted by the cities of La Junta and Trinidad.

For the third year the regional tourism groups Southern Rockies: Crossroads of Cultures and Canyon and Plains have come together to learn more about developing a regional tourist infrastructure, attracting more visitors to their regions, and to celebrate the successes of each other. Southern Rockies: Crossroads of Cultures represents communities in Southern Colorado such as Pueblo, Cañon City, Walsenburg, Trinidad, Westcliffe and Silver Cliff. Canyons & Plains represents the counties of Baca, Bent, Crowley, Kiowa, Otero, Prowers and eastern Las Animas.

These two lesser-known areas of Colorado are rich in Colorado and pre-Colorado history, wildlife, natural beauty, recreational activities, and local residents. As other parts of Colorado host more and more visitors, these largely undiscovered cities and counties provide a place to "Come to Life" as the Colorado Tourism Office (CTO) describes it.

Rather than a day of workshops in a windowless conference center, the Summit took place on a motor coach driving from La Junta to Walsenburg to Trinidad to La Junta. This was a perfect way to experience the expanses of Southern Colorado while learning!

From La Junta to Walsenburg the speaker was Tony Gurzick of the Colorado Parks and Wildlife. As we discovered the beauty of the low mesas and gulches, Tony told us about the Plains wildlife we were passing – the Lark Bunting, the Pronghorn (not Antelope!), the Black-tailed Prairie Dog, the Black-footed Ferret, the Burrowing Owl, the American Badger, and Red-tailed Hawk. Alas, the only one we saw was the Pronghorn. In Walsenburg, Mother Jones, the Miners' Angel, joined the motor coach, describing the life of the coal miners. With the magnificent snow covered Spanish Peaks or Wahatoya, as the Native Americans called them, as a backdrop we experienced "A Taste of Spanish Peaks Country" Lunch. Continuing on to Trinidad, Mother Jones described the events leading up to the 1913-1914 miners' strike and the tragedy of the Ludlow Massacre.

In Trinidad, we learned how Trinidad is transforming its economy by attracting visitors. The downtown is a magnificent collection of late 19th century buildings, the locals are excited to have visitors, to share their community, and have many festivals planned throughout the year. Here you experience a part of Colorado that is not found in the Front Range or popular mountain communities. Trinidad's key word was "patience" as they worked to get community support. Trinidad is a Creative Arts District. Dana Crawford is part of the team developing their Fox West Theater.


Returning to La Junta, Rick Wallner told the story of the Santa Fe Trail as we drove through towns that are only names on a map today.

The next day, Cathy Ritter, Director of the Colorado Tourism Office (CTO) provided a high-level overview of the CTO, while discussing how her office is working with the non-urban, non-ski resort areas of Colorado to bring more visitor traffic to rural Colorado communities. A new trend in travel is "slow travel" – take a train, take a bus, ditch the electronics, visit the rural communities.


The Seminar was closed by Elizabeth O'Rear, Manager of Destination Development at the CTO. Elizabeth told of the training, support and funding that communities can receive to advance tourism-related goals or develop new tourism products in their communities.

City Park FAM

On April 3, 2017 RMGA member Mike Pearl lead a Familiarization tour to City Park. Ten members participated. In their visit, the participants saw highlights of the Denver Museum of Nature and Science from the perspective of staff members. Maura O'Neal, Communications and Media Relations Manager for the Museum, arranged the experience. On one instance, participants viewed signage that showed the heights (at the shoulders) of elephant-like animals from modern-day elephants to woolly mammoths. Participants took lunch at the Museum's cafeteria.

Dr. Phil Goodstein, Denver historian and author, led the participants on a walking tour of the east end of City Park. Among the various sites, he told about "Old Cronies Lane," the Children's Fountain, and the Pavilion.

Megan Deffner, Community Affairs Manager, and Andrew Rowan, External Relations Coordinator, met the participants at the Denver Zoo. Of the 3,500 animals housed at the Zoo, participants were treated to visits with keepers at the Toyota Elephant Passage and at the Edge, home to the Zoo's Amur (Siberian) Tigers.
