What's Going On with Our Cemeteries?

Memorial Day services in the seven, village cemeteries in the Colonies ranged from well attended to attracting only a handful of participants. In total about 100 people attended services amidst the gravestones and the tall pine trees.

There are 3,426 gravesites in the village cemeteries according to the Amana Heritage Society's cemetery database (Amana Family Tree project).

Amana cemeteries are private, not municipal or county owned. They are owned and maintained by the Amana Church Society which budgets just under \$14,000 each year for cemetery maintenance, Peter Hoehnle, Amana Church administrator told us.

This includes mowing (the largest expense), snow removal for winter funeral services, tree and stump removal, new trees and renovations (replacement of stones, fencing etc) Church members and non-members pay a set fee for a burial plot upon burial, however, the fees collected do not cover the cemetery maintenance expenses. So the church and church members pay for the rest, reported Hoehnle. Some generous contributions have established a cemetery maintenance fund.

Efforts are being made to curb expenses. Less area is being mown now compared to previous years. Volunteers complete most tasks at the cemeteries, but some jobs require professional equipment and some are simply too big for volunteers to undertake.

The white pine trees, some of which are 150 to 169 years old, are looking their age. Some are dying or damaged. Since 1997 when the monumental straight-line windstorm took down so many trees, particularly in East Amana, South Amana, Middle Amana and Homestead, trees have been replanted each year. In 2020 and again in 2023 high winds took a rough toll. However ,now a comprehensive, community-wide plan is being undertaken to replant, Hoehnle explained.

The Amana Church's Building and Grounds Committee has assessed the current state of the cemeteries. A plan, with input from Amana Society Forester Tim Krauss, has been developed and approved by the Board of Trustees, for removing all damaged trees and planting new trees. Here are the highlights:

- Stumps from all cemeteries will be professionally ground out and removed over the next 12 to 18 months.
- About 10 to 15 trees that are severely damaged have been noted and will be professionally removed in the next 12 to 18 months.
- New spruce trees, 6 or so feet in height, will be purchased and planted in designated spots. This will start and continue over the course of several years. They will be planted at least 10 feet apart or 10 feet from another tree.

Now and in future, only spruce trees, not white pine, will be planted in all cemeteries as advised by Krauss.

White pines, the more recent plantings, a more brittle tree that seems to become more so as it ages, do not seem to hold up well under current climate conditions. Hotter weather, less rain, bigger windstorms require a tree that can take it, Krauss told church volunteers.

Also to avoid the impact of a tree blight, more than one kind of spruce will be planted – though the spruce will be selected so that they look alike to maintain the uniform look of the cemeteries. Blue spruce will not be used as they have a blue cast of color and distinctive shape.

"We are all aware of the visual impact of our cemeteries and really want to maintain that," said Hoehnle. Therefore a coordinated, organized, effort to replant trees must be done rather than more haphazard, individual tree, or one village at a time, efforts.

Betsy Momany, Amana Church Buildings and Ground, explained, "We are no longer using white pines as our primary tree species. We will be using a variety of spruce as these are native and much

more resistant to breakage. In thinking about the future of our cemeteries we would like to minimize the clean up and maintenance that is required. We will be purchasing potted trees at 6-8 feet in height. They will be planted at least 10 feet apart. With this plan not every tree that is removed will be replaced."

The need to protect these trees from deer and to water them will be a huge task. Fencing to protect young trees will be used. Volunteers who have the time and patience to water will be needed, Momany

"We really need help with this and we appreciate how much everyone loves the cemeteries and wants to help," she told Elders last week.

Noting that some people have bought their own trees, or even planted trees recently, and while this is nice, it is not a help at this time as the committee is seeking to buy larger spruce trees, plant them according to the adopted plan so that they look uniform. Plus the church will be using a high quality, nursery grown tree and wants to buy them in uniform sizes.

"We are very grateful to everyone who has bought trees, but the best way to help would be to donate to the church tree fund," Momany said.

You can help by donating money to buy nursery trees. A cemetery tree fund has been established at the Amana Church, PO Box 103, Middle Amana,

Watering these trees will be a huge and ongoing task. If you have time, a love for trees and and want to learn how to water or know how to water and can help, please contact the church office.

Another ongoing task is the clean-up of gravestones. "The stones have really gotten a moss or lichen layer on them in some of the shady areas,"

Everyone can help with this. On the Amana Church website there is an easy-to-follow video tutorial that takes only 5 minutes to watch that shows exactly how to clean them using a spray bottle, a bucket or garden watering can with clean water and a stiff scrub brush. Mixing up a spray bottle of equal parts water and vinegar with a big squirt of dishwashing detergent. Spray this on the moss and/ or lichen covered gravestone. Spray the entire surface of the stone well. Leave it on for a bit, then scrub with a scrub brush. You don't have to brush too hard. Rinse with clear water and repeat.

Go to amanachurch.com to the tab and click "How to Clean and / or Straighten Headstones!"

Please do not paint the stones as the paint will peel off in a year or two. Please do not use acid washes on the stone as this might damage the

"If everyone did a few stones each year it would really make a big difference," said one Middle Amana resident.

are another concern. There is a tutorial on how to straighten stones on the Amanachurch.com website. That's a job for stronger backs and takes a little time, and a shovel, along with a willing heart. Watch the video for tips and technique.

"It takes a lot of work, we know. Yes, it really takes a village to keep these cemeteries up," one resident of West Amana said while placing flags on veteran graves last week.



ing piano and composing her first songs at age 7. Chastity Brown Saturday, June 14th, 7-10pm.


