He loved people, and he loved to entertain them with his larger than life personality and humor. In recent years, he spent his time volunteering with the Elkton Lions Club. He volunteered at over 150 Pop Up Food Pantries, helping to distribute food to people in need. He also regularly attended church services at Cross Lutheran Church in Pigeon. When he wasn't volunteering, he was happily enjoying a cup of coffee and chatting with anyone and everyone that he ran into in Elkton. Greg was diagnosed with Acute Myeloid Leukemia in 2014, and he was given a second chance at life by a successful stem cell transplant.
