Congressman Katko is Missing the Target

In his effort to tout the alleged benefits, short term though they may be, of the Trump Tax Plan for New Yorkers, Congressman Katko recently missed the target by having his picture taken standing with Target employees and claiming the employee raises were due to the Trump Tax.

Now, to be sure, the Congressman was told that the tweet was false. According to CNBC and CNN reporting, and press releases by Target, the retailer announced on September 25, 2017, a full two months before the Tax plan, that they would raise their minimum wage from \$11 to \$12 per hour and committed to a \$15 per hour wage by 2020. In fact, the state and national AFL-CIO, including our union, made a concerted push for increased wages in the "Fight for Fifteen" campaign. We were successful with the Governor passing the state minimum wage increases.

To be fair, the congressman has since modified his claim in light of Target's own announcement in September of 2017. We hope facts matter to the Congressman when voting on laws that affect his constituents in Central New York.

At this point I would like to share with him another set of facts, facts that apply to one segment of his constituency, seniors and middle income Americans...in light of his support for the Trump Tax plan: Congressman Katko's support of the Trump tax to the rich and corporations means

- 13 million Americans lose health insurance, 18,000 in his district by 2025.
- Thousands of New Yorkers have their tax deductions limited. New Yorkers have 73 billion in these deductions that would be lost. There are 98,000 filers of State and local tax deductions in the 24th Congressional district.
- The national deficit increases by 1.5 trillion, requiring \$473 billion in cuts Medicare and over 1 trillion in cuts to Medicaid.

The bottom line is that the tax plan gives middle class taxpayers a minor and temporary boost and gives corporations permanent cuts while programs such as social security, Medicare and Medicaid that seniors depend on, could be slashed. It may not be next year, but it will come.

Facts should matter to our Congressman, even the fact that he missed the target on Target. Their pay increases, welcome as they are, and deserving of praise, did not come about by the Trump tax plan. They came about, in part, by a concerted labor-led campaign for higher wages.

The improving economic climate under the previous national administration aided that Target announcement but more importantly, the "Fight for 15" that many of us engaged in made it happen. We changed the conversation.

Congressman Katko could change the conversation. For instance, support a national minimum wage increase. Support unions to grow the middle class. Say no to cuts in social security, Medicare, Medicaid, the social safety net, not only for seniors but for future generations. Have real town halls and in the future, get your Target right.

Updated late alert: President Trump and congressional Republicans are considering forcing votes to cut billions in spending that would cancel parts of the bipartisan appropriation measures that averted a government shutdown. These potential cuts could harm senior programs. At the same time the Republicans are pushing a Balanced Budget Amendment that, if approved, "would be terrible for Medicare, Medicaid, as well as social security, said Joseph Peters, Jr., Secretary-Treasurer of the Alliance for Retired Americans.

The following is taken from a recent ARA Monday Alert.

Balanced Budget Amendment Fails in House

A balanced budget constitutional amendment failed in the House on Thursday. A two-thirds majority was needed for passage, and the vote was 233-184.

"We are grateful to the 6,000 Alliance members who responded when we asked them to send an email to their House member urging a NO vote," said **Richard Fiesta**, Executive Director of the Alliance. "Proposals that would cut our earned benefits are coming fast and furious, and we need to be ready to respond quickly to beat them back."

If the measure had passed, it would have a dramatic impact on the nation's economy. Of concern to retirees, the Social Security Administration would be prohibited from using its trust fund reserves to pay current beneficiaries. That means the amount paid in any given year would have to come from the payroll taxes collected in that year. If there was a shortfall, it would result in benefit cuts for beneficiaries.
