Dormant Season Pruning

During the colder months, trees go dormant, slowing their growth and conserving energy. Without active leaf production or nutrient distribution, trees redirect their resources to strengthening their root systems and preparing for the upcoming spring. This makes winter the ideal time for pruning, as trees can heal more efficiently and direct energy toward new, healthy growth when warmer weather returns.

Dormant season pruning differs from pruning during other times of the year because there is less risk of disease or pest infestations. In warmer months, freshly cut branches can attract harmful insects and fungal infections, potentially causing long-term damage to the tree. Additionally, with leaves gone, arborists have a clearer view of the tree's structure, allowing for more precise cuts that improve shape, strength, and overall health. This proactive approach not only enhances the tree's resilience but also helps prevent potential hazards, such as weak branches breaking under the weight of snow or strong winds.

The benefits of winter pruning include

- Better visibility for precise pruning
- · Reduces risk of disease and infestation
- Promotes faster healing and spring growth
- · Prepares trees for harsh weather conditions

Notes on the Grounds, Trees and Trails

The new landscaping company,
Superior Lawncare, is hard at work
around the neighborhood identifying
problem areas that require further
attention and planning for the future.

Superior In the coming days, LawnCare Superior will provide a detailed tree map

of the neighborhood with an action plan for treatment and future plantings. Please allow the Superior crew to work and do not disturb them.

Additional focus to assess and repair irrigation issues is taking place. Systems were tested recently and confirmed that Fountain 2 on Lake 1 is not working. The Board is collecting bids to repair the fountain. We are also waiting on bids for the irrigation pump on Lake 2 which has not been functioning for a while. A vendor will be selected as soon as possible so that work can begin. The Grounds Committee would welcome additional volunteers to help with these and other initiatives.

HERE ARE A FEW TIPS TO KEEP IN MIND

- Stick to retailers that you know and have shopped with before.
- Research retailers that you're not familiar with or haven't shopped with before.
- Avoid using public Wi-Fi when making online purchases.
- Keep your receipts and monitor your bank account and credit activity.
- When looking for a parking space, be patient and alert for pedestrians.
- Park in well-lit, high-traffic areas.
- Don't leave valuable items in your vehicle, especially in plain view.
- Lock your car doors, even if you're stepping away for a moment.
- Avoid putting your personal belongings in the shopping cart.
- If you're shopping with children, identify the store personnel so they know who to ask for help.

- Always lock your doors and windows, whether at home or away.
- Adequate outdoor lighting is a deterrent to burglars.
- If you're expecting deliveries, track packages and arrange for them to be delivered when someone is home.
- Avoid advertising your travel plans on social media. Wait until you return to share your holiday experiences.
 Broadcasting your absence can make your home a target.
- If you have a home security system, renew your alarm permit annually. For more information, call 713-755-4600.
- Update and share emergency contact information with trusted neighbors.
- If you're traveling for the holidays, we've got you covered! The Harris County Sheriff's Office Vacation Watch Program offers added security when you're away from home.

A family recipe suggested by one of our own neighbors

Thanks to Lynne James for sharing this recipe from her mother.

MOTHER'S CHOCOLATE CAKE

Bring to a boil:

1 cup oil

1 cup water (I used a carbonated water)

1 stick butter

4 Thsp cocoa (I use somewhat heaping tablespoons)

Slightly cool and add the following:

2 cups sugar

2 cups flour

2 eggs

1/2 cup buttermilk

1/2 tsp salt

1 tsp cinnamon

1 tsp baking soda

1 Tbsp Mexican vanilla

1 Thsp pure almond extract

Mix (with a whisk) and bake 40-50 mins. At 350 degrees in a greased and floured (or sprayed) pan. (I baked in a 10×14 " shallow metal sheet pan and frost while slightly warm.

*Note: The cocoa I used was "Dark Cocoa Powder" from an Amish store. It is literally black and I think has more flavor and richness than other cocoa powders. Point is that the richer the cocoa powder, the better. You can also add a very little strong coffee for an extra flavor.

CHOCOLATE ICING

Bring to a boil:

1 stick unsalted butter

4 Thsp Black cocoa powder (or other rich cocoa) (also heaping)

6 fingers of salt (an old-fashioned measurement)

1 Thsp Mexican vanilla

2 or 3 Thsps pure almond extract

Beat (or whisk) till somewhat thick:

1 lb powder sugar (or more)

*Frost cake while still warm. Then sparingly sprinkle a coarser sea salt on top of frosted cake. Be careful not to use too much. Salt adds a nice dimension to this cake.

Optional: 1/2 cup finely chopped pecans


