

COUNCIL REPORTS – Clan MacLeod Society USA AGM New Mexico April 25, 2019

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CMSUSA PRESIDENT'S REPORT
TO COUNCIL 4-25-19
AND
TO ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING 4-27-19

There are two broad categories in which I should be held responsible by Council, by Membership, and by myself personally:

1. My behavior as president.
2. Accomplishment of objectives.

BEHAVIOR

Under the behavior category, I can say I have treated others as I myself wish to be treated. I have been present to the membership and to the public. Rosalie and I have traveled to most parts of the continental US during my tenure, joining with our regional vice presidents, commissioners, and tent hosts in representing MacLeod at Scottish games and festivals. I have answered all correspondence from members, other Macleods, and inquiries from the general public. I have tried to be attentive to all CMSUSA problems and issues. I think I have maintained dignity and decorum in all activities and dealings.

ACCOMPLISHMENT

As to accomplishments and objectives, I began my tenure with the agenda of reforming three CMSUSA practices than I considered faulty (none of which are enshrined in the By-Laws). As I may have said too often, "Bad habits and bad practices perpetuated, do not become traditions. If they do not add value to the organization, they are simply bad habits and bad practices perpetuated."

A bad practice perpetuated is the choice of one and only one candidate for president for a particular term of office being made, in effect, by an "insider" group years ahead of the formal election, and "rubber-stamped" by the membership at the AGM at which the new president is to take office. (Our Counsel, John MacLeod Tutterow, who doesn't like to be paraphrased, has stated to the effect that everything that is legal is not necessarily right.) We are incorporated as a 501c3 entity. Incorporation entails a democratic polity. Being a corporation that uses other people's money for charitable, educational, and cultural purposes, entails (in my opinion) an even greater responsibility to employ the most democratic, collegial, and participative methods. I have explained my reasoning on this in my final full report as president, delivered in brief summary last December.. You can find the unabridged version at the "Members Only" part of our CMSUSA

website. I can give you directions on getting there, or you can contact webmaster Ian Good for directions.

A very bad practice is the office of vice president being filled in the same fashion as that of president, but then utilized, not as a functioning vice president, helping the president fulfill the functions of the presidency, but merely as a “waiting station” for taking office, in turn, as president. Coupled with the mode of selection and the lack of utilization, is the problem of assumed, inevitable, succession to the presidency. My position was, and is, that both offices should be directly nominated the year previous to the taking of office, preferably with two or more candidates nominated for each, and without an assumption of a succession of vice-president to president. In other words, the office of VP should be a working role. Again, as I have stated, I have explained my reasoning on this in my final full report as president. But I shall try a slightly differen approach here.

We do not have a monarchy or a dictatorship. We do not have an organizational head who considers himself “the smartest person in the room,” whose “gut instinct” is foolproof, and who, thus, doesn't have to consult or listen to anyone. (Just entertaining the illusion that one is “the smartest person in the room,” is defacto proof that one is not.) A combat commander under combat conditions may have to rely instantly on his or her experience, training, and judgment, without consultation. Likewise, a police SWAT commander. Even those, under non-combat conditions, produce better decisions by involving their “Number Two” first, and perhaps consulting staff or even the general membership of the unit or organization. Heads of agencies, businesses, and charitable entities absolutely need consultation and participation to produce good decisions. The “presidential cell” (my term, meaning, really, the wholeness of the presidency itself) is rightly comprised of the president and the vice president (the “Number One” and the “Number Two”). There may be persons who can adapt to either role. Most cannot. The roles are different. Ideally the incumbent should be suited to the role. “Number Two” analyzes, counsels, helps to flesh out concepts and ideas, serves as “Devil's Advocate” when necessary, and serves as a sounding board. “Number Two” is low-profile with regard to the rest of the organization and the external public. “Number One” is the part of the “presidential cell” with public visibility. The “Number One” and the “Number Two” must be in interaction on a day to day basis for optimum functioning of the organization.

The popular Yin-Yang diagram best illustrates the “Number One” and the “Number Two.” On the right is “Number One” – sun-lit and visible to everyone. The shaded individual on the left is “Number Two” – visible mostly to her/his teammate, “Number One.” The Yin-Yang diagram suggests just how close the working relationship should be.



Mostly, what takes place is about substance – the actual content of the policy or procedure being discussed, the effects, the costs and consequences, the resources involved. But even “style” and “image” are not out of bounds. What is produced by the interaction, supplemented by the input of staff and counselors is quality, not the “gut instinct” of the boss (which often, subsequently, must be rationalized or “walked back.”)

Our present practice is for the Nominating Committee to choose a Vice President years ahead of time (actually, as a president-to-be, even four more years ahead of time). The Vice President is not really a participant in administration, not in everyday consultation and discussion with the President. The VP's only real responsibility is to be a “spare tire” in case the President “goes flat.” Perhaps the VP (she or he) has a special project or two, or more or less reluctantly offers an opinion when asked, until the day the outgoing president pins the president's badge on his/her jacket. My cousin Don Mack McLeod (not as close a cousin as James Hunter claimed, but a cousin nonetheless), as Chair of the Nominating Committee, was an absolute master at identifying a candidate who had the capacity to do a job, then selling the idea to the individual in question. There were other nominal members of the Nominating Committee, but it was essentially a one-man job, and only one candidate per office was produced. The nominee normally was a good choice, the system being structured as it was, but we seldom had the benefit of a working vice president.

So, here is the remedy. Nominate a presidential candidate for the president position. Nominate a vice-presidential candidate for the vice-presidential position. The two jobs require different attributes, qualities and characteristics anyway. Better yet, come up with more than one candidate for each position. Let the membership actually make a choice. Have some faith in the membership. Don't make the public choice years ahead of time, but only the year previous to taking office. That way the person chosen matches the present problems and challenges of the organization. That way the person chosen is likely to be the same person who takes office. (You never step in the same river twice. A person is not the same person after four, six, or eight years, though, in the case of a good candidate, there is some continuity.)

When I agreed to become vice president, my purpose was to demonstrate that the VP office could be a useful working position. I knew I was too old to succeed to the presidency, but my intent was to identify a younger, able, energetic person (I had hope that person might even be a woman) who would accept the presidency, thus breaking the succession pattern. Things didn't work out as I hoped, so, not only did that planned objective fail, but I became president. (I assure you that our practices have not been

illegal – I have checked with our corporate counsel – “but everything that is legal is not necessarily right.”) In my case, I know myself, and I know my proper niche. I’m a really good “Number Two,” as I have proved many times during my working career. I’m really not “Number One” material.

Initially, I also thought that our highest award, Clansperson of the Year (COY) should not be automatically awarded, as seemed to be the practice, to persons who happened to have served as president, because I thought that made 25% of COY awards then to be unavailable to hardworking and enthusiastic members among the general membership. I have come to see there is no use in making restrictive rules regarding the COY. A conscientious awards committee should be able to select a suitable honoree, and to know enough not to heap awards on persons who have been highly honored already. Receiving honors for having been extensively honored already (as seemed to be the case) is something like being famous for being famous. The main reason I changed my mind on this one is that we have had presidents who remained high-energy workers and producers for CMSUSA after a presidential term. So I have “backed off” on this one.

My behavior as president has been okay. Someone else might have presided better. Someone else might have been a better example of dignity and decorum. But I give myself an “okay.” My accomplishment of the objectives I set for myself, has been zero. I recommend to my successor the first two of the areas I marked for reform. Also, for those who come after me, I recommend utilization of women in the highest roles, not males exclusively. At least half of our best, brightest, and most diligent are women. I also recommend losing the racial bias that afflicts so many of us. I would estimate that a relatively high percentage of descendants of our MacLeods and MacLeod septs are non-white.

In very brief summary, my words of advice to those who come after me are:

1. Elect the President and the VP directly to those offices after choosing candidates, preferably at least two candidates per office, who are particularly suited to the specific office. Nominate them in the near time frame (one year in advance). Consider women. (At least half of our best and brightest and hardest-working members are women.) Forget the idea of assumed succession to the office of president from vice president, though there might be a “Renaissance person” who can do anything and everything “waiting in the wings” somewhere.
2. Lose the racism. I’m older, probably than anyone else in this room. The cultural conditioning resulting in biases and prejudices was even stronger in my time than it was for most of you. But I recovered. You can too. And the organization will be better for it.

Vice-President Report

In the past few months I have represented Clan MacLeod Society at only a few functions. Last January I went to the Central Florida Highland Games in support of Matt McCloud. I followed this up with the Northeast Florida Highland Games during February in support of John and Linda MacLeod. March saw me visiting Dothan, Alabama in support of Jeff and Cindy McLeod. Those were the games that I made a point of representing the Society. I also went to a Robert Burns supper in Jacksonville, Florida where Ann and I represented Clan MacLeod Society.

I asked questions about the liability issue of Clan tent sponsors at the games. We all, at one time or another, have signed the "hold harmless" letter for the games we attended. I checked on this and we are pledging not to sue the games organizers if WE are injured in our tents at the games. Part of this is the set up and tear down period as well as the day or days of the games. The games organizers do have liability insurance for guests to the games. I will further research this. My remaining question is: even if we sign the "hold harmless" agreement yet purchase a ticket to the games, are we covered by their insurance should we injure ourselves while away from our clan tent area?

I am looking forward to the future of Clan MacLeod Society with a bit of anxiety. Where do we want to go? What do we want to accomplish? How do we increase interest in our society in this day of social media interaction? How can we interest younger people in joining, participating, and holding office? Can we forge ahead into the world of the generations to come? How do we get our newsletter published in this 21st century? I will be looking to those who have had the most influence on the day to day operations of the society for suggestions and possible solutions.

Many societies are experiencing the same problems we are when it comes to gaining members and retaining members. Membership is getting older. Weeden reminded us that he is probably the oldest president the society has had. I will also be long in the tooth at the end of my tenure. These are but a few of the concerns I have for our continued success as a society.

VP Regional Coordination 2019 AGM Report

Two vacant regional vice president positions have been my major focus this year.

In the New England region we were left leaderless with the passing of John S. MacLeod. After a two year vacancy, that position has been filled with an extremely capable and energetic person in Christopher Barker from Rhode Island. Chris has done a wonderful job in “rallying the troops” in his region and endured his baptism under fire by hosting the Loon Mountain Games. This is one of the largest events in the country and the 2nd most attended event in all of New Hampshire. We are very lucky in bringing Chris on board.

We have struggled for some time in finding leadership in the Southwest region. After numerous emails, phone calls, and registered letters, the previous incumbent has become MIA. Dale Lewis from Phoenix has stepped forward and is considering taking over this geographically expansive region. Dale is well experienced in highland games and Scottish culture. If he accepts this position, our regions will all be fully staffed and well managed.

In order to keep our experiences current, Sandy and I have cohosted or hosted games in Nashville, TN; Florence, SC; Myrtle Beach, S.C. and hopefully later this year Wilmington, NC.

As co-president (yes that’s the title) of the Scottish Society of Wilmington, NC I have formed a committee to have erected a fitting monument to the 20,000 or more Scottish Highlanders including many MacLeod’s that immigrated from the highlands of Scotland to the American colonies between the Battle of Culloden and the American Revolution. While most did not settle in Wilmington, when they arrived they traveled up the Cape Fear River, and settled the interior in such places as Scotland County, Aberdeen, Laurinburg, Cross Creek (Fayetteville) and numerous Scottish named towns and communities. As a result, North Carolina has a higher percentage of Scottish surnamed individuals than any other state. To these early Scots, Wilmington was their version of Ellis Island and should be noted appropriately with a monument along the Cape Fear River.

MIGRATION DIRECTOR REPORT – APRIL 2019

Our migration database continues to grow almost every week. Data is being provided by potential, new and current members through our Tribal Pages program, letters, e-mails, family trees, etc. We are also constantly adding information that we have identified through such programs as Ancestry, Newspapers, Family Search, etc. Not only do we document information received from our members and potential members, but we also help answer many of their questions which in turn helps us to make our database more accurate. As of today, we have approximately 58,000 names in the database and continue to request everyone provide us information that they have gained at games or from the Clan MacLeod family members. It is important to remember that we are documenting information and sources—not actually proving the information as that is a lifelong job!

The publishing of the Tribal Pages password in our newsletters has proven to be the best way to provide members access to our database. Although we had a few challenges this year due to the delayed Newsletter, our members are learning to find the new password there. Our current password is “Murphy” so if you haven’t checked it out lately, give it a try.

We recently identified a new source that we believe will help us help some of our members make their genealogical connection between the US and overseas. This program is called WikiTree and not only gives us access to more information but also identifies some significant sources. An initial look at the program shows approximately 4800 McLeods, 2100 MacLeods, 4600 McClures, etc. Many of these are identified as being born in Scotland, Australia and Canada. The sources provided vary from next to nothing to a great deal. One of the best things about WikiTree is that it is free and is being built by volunteers. Check it out: www.wikitree.com.

The following are examples of the information retrieved from WikiTree:

Rev. Norman McLeod was born 17 Sep 1780 in Lochinver, Assynt, Scotland and died 14 Mar 1866 in Waipu, Northland, New Zealand. He was a son of Daniel and Margaret McLeod. He married Mary (maiden name unknown) in 1812 in Scotland. They were the parents of John Grant McLeod, Donald McLeod, John Bunyon McLeod, Mary McLeod Ross, Alexander McLeod, Murdoch McLeod, Samuel Rutherford McLeod, Edward McLeod, Margaret McLeod Anderson and Edward McLeod. The family migrated to Nova Scotia in 1817. There he established a church for a group of Scottish immigrants. Following a bad winter and potato blight, Reverend McLeod and his followers looked for greener pastures. They immigrated together to Adelaide in Australia. Reverend McLeod and his family arrived aboard the Margaret in 1851. They did not fair well there, with a number of his children dying of typhus. Reverend McLeod wrote to the Governor of New Zealand asking for land to be granted to the group. They were offered the land that was to become the town of Waipu. Reverend McLeod immigrated over aboard the Gazelle in 1853. The Normanites cleared the land and farmed it. Many descendants still live there today.

John “Hatter” McLeod, son of Murdock McLeod and Effie McInnis, was born on 12 Feb 1801 in Skye, Inverness-shire, Scotland and died 25 Jan 1864 in Moore, North Carolina, USA. He married Flora Johnson on 18 Nov 1831 in Cumberland, North Carolina. He was the father of Alexander McLeod and Samuel Johnson McLeod. John was buried in the Bethesda Cemetery in Aberdeen, Moore County, North Carolina.

William Daniel McLeod was born in August 1790 in Dunnett, Caithness, Scotland and died 19 Mar 1870 in Independence, Arkansas. He married Catherine McLain on 8 November 1820 in Cumberland, North Carolina. He was the father of Nancy McLeod Dawson. She was born 11 Feb 1834 in Cumberland, North Carolina and died on 25 Oct 1910 in Aetna, Sharp, Arkansas. She married Joseph Dawson on 2 Apr 1859 in Washington Township, Lawrence, Arkansas. No sources provided.

John McClure was born about 1761 in Scotland and died about 1821 in Ohio, USA. He married Margaret Morrison. They were the parents of Mary McClure Caldwell, Anne McClure Bonham and John Morrison McClure.

Chairman's Report

April 27, 2019
Las Cruces, New Mexico

The Dunvegan Foundation of the Clan MacLeod Society, USA, continues to carry out its mission to preserve, protect and promote the heritage we share with Scotland. Its continuing success is made possible by the generous contributions of members of the Society and an endowment that continues to grow through that same generosity.

This year the Foundation will be distributing \$30,805 for a wide variety of projects. This is about the same as last year. You can find a list of specific grants attached.

Donations for 2018 were a bit lower than expected. I suspect this is because the stock market took a dip late in the year—just as people take a look at year-end contributions in anticipation of their preparing their tax returns. I am confident that this is temporary, and we will be able to continue our work for the benefit of the clan and the greater Scottish community.

At our meeting in December the trustees approved a new project to assist in restoring the graves of the chiefs of the Lewis and Raasay line in Australia. The chiefs of the Raasay (and Lewis) have been buried there since that branch emigrated in the early 19th century. We supported a similar proposal for work on graves of the Harris line of chiefs several years ago, and it has been a while since we undertook any historic preservation projects. Some gravesites not included in this proposal have already been restored by the immediate family and the Australian societies. I believe this is an excellent opportunity to do something supporting John of Raasay, the most enthusiastic of our chiefs. The cost of AU\$7,350 (about \$5,000 US) is manageable. We can do this.

As always, the other trustees and I would be delighted to answer questions at meetings like this one, whenever you think of them, or whenever you see any us.

Overview

As previously advised in November 2018, information contained in this report will represent the Year over Year data for the period being reported (either in the summer or fall numbers) vs. the historical data from 2012.

Our website continues to perform consistently user engagement and session time has remained steady. We have seen some increases in some relative areas and few minor decreases. The last 5 months, since the last report (Dec 1 – April 18), we have seen 2,105 (2,041 new / 64 returning) users, an avg. of 421 users per month. This is down from the 494 Avg Monthly users last reported. This is not unusual activity given the time period is from December to April, when user activity for our demographic of users and activities are idle. If reviewed against similar time frames for previous reports it is seen to be a consistent number (ref. AGM-Scotland 2018 Website Report).

Recently, the International Website for Associated Clan MacLeod Society (<https://clanmacleod.org/>) has been refreshed and updated and is greatly improved. There are some nice new features of their website and I encourage all members to take the time to visit the site and the various pages it contains.

Recent updates that have been made to support the 2019 Regional Games and Festivals.

Opportunities

Without having our National Newsletter, our membership is in need of consistent information. Our national website has been leveraged to supplement that void and provide the membership a source of information and events, along with the various Social Media applications being used nationally and regionally. It is important to have our Website supplied with the most current data and details necessary. It is important that we maintain fresh data, new ideas and a variety of content with critical dates for our website to be impactful and remain an avenue that provides value. As always, if there are desired changes, or any other feedback, please send them to me and I will be happy to review and incorporate them.

Costs

There were no other fees or costs associated with maintaining the site content for 2018 or for this reporting period. There will be no costs until 2020/2021 when renewal of the site will be required.

Definitions

Below are some definitions of terms utilized within this report:

- Sessions - A session is the period of time a user is actively engaged on our website
- Users – that have had at least one session within data range new or returning users
- Pages Views – Total number of pages viewed of a single page are counted
- Page sessions – Average number of pages viewed during a session. Repeated Views of a single page are counted
- Average Session Time – average length of a session
- YoY – Year over Year






Demographics of Visitors:



I've been very busy on social media. It's a first attempt at reaching out to a newer, younger base for continuity. My target audience has been Texas, Louisiana, Oklahoma & Arkansas. My social media stats are:

1. Facebook Boosts – I've made 4 FB boosts and 1 page promotion reaching a total of 28,151 people and 2,034 post engagements (ie. Link clicks, messages, shares, likes). Facebook page "likes" have gone from 160 when I took over in November to 553 and climbing, today.
2. Instagram – I've had one dual promotion that went to Instagram & FB jointly with 395 "likes" for Instagram. That's pretty good since, at the time, I only had 10 followers and 2 posts. In 2 weeks I've gone from 10 followers to 22 followers and 6 posts.
3. I'm playing with Twitter currently, still feeling my way around that one, it remains somewhat of a mystery.
