2 years ago, the pair of Bald Eagles that nest at the Raystown Lake Dam rebuilt their nest in a large pine tree above the Hydropower Plant. This new location allows birders to have an eye-level view of the nest from the road on the dam, providing the unique opportunity to peer into the nest and watch the 2 eaglets grow up. COVID-19 Updates and Impacts

The Baltimore District, U.S. Army Corps of Engineers has announced the phased reopening approach of Raystown Lake facilities, which will begin with:

- The following restrooms reopened on May 22: Corbin's Island, Raystown Lake Dam, Snyder's Run, Aitch, James Creek, Tatman Run (Boat Launch only) and Weaver Falls, Pine Howard Miller (near Redbud Shelter) and Seven Points Boat Launch 1 & 2
- Raystown Lake Mountain Biking Skills Park in Seven Points Recreation Area reopened June 3
- Army Corps-managed campground facilities reopened on **June 4**, including all Seven Points Campground Loops, Nancy's Camp Boat-to-Shore, and Susquehannock Campground.
 - Individuals wishing to make camping reservations may resume making online reservations after Monday, June 1st by visiting www.recreation.gov.
- Day-use facilities and lake access areas remain open, such as boat launches, picnic areas, fishing piers, and viewing areas. All of the trails are currently available for bikers, hikers and runners.

The Raystown Lake Visitors Center, Seven Points Beach, Tatman Run Beach and group picnic shelters will remain CLOSED to the public at this time. An official date for the reopening of these facilities has not yet been determined. All special events and group gatherings, including fishing tournaments, have also been cancelled until further notice.

Although the public has expressed frustration regarding these reopening procedures, it is important to keep in mind that there are guidelines the Corps must meet before facilities may reopen. These guidelines are intended to protect the health and safety of Raystown Lake visitors. Additionally, the USACE district office in Baltimore has given Raystown these directives (which are mostly centered around CDC guidelines), and Raystown's team must "check all the boxes," so to say, before reopening any additional facilities, such as the Seven Points Beach.





Allegrippis Action

It seems that COVID-19 has touched every part of our lives, and the Allegrippis Trails are no exception. We were forced to postpone our inaugural Raystown Bike Fest until May 2021. Even with this postponement, the trails have seen heavy use this spring as most folks are looking for some way to get out of the house. At the same time, social distancing measures have prevented our normal gatherings for trail maintenance. The need for maintenance continues, however. Early spring wind storms downed many trees in the area of the trails, sometimes making them impassable. Thanks to the diligent efforts of several volunteers, the trails have been cleared and made safe for users. Thank you to the volunteers that handled these issues.

Volunteers also prepared the Raystown Mountain Bike Skills Park for opening by repairing some erosion damage. The skills park has remained closed later than normal because of the propensity for folks to gather there. As restrictions ease, it should reopen. Watch for an announcement.

We've recently started utilizing the Trailforks mapping app, popular in the mountain biking community, which has made trail maintenance in the times of COVID-19 restrictions much easier. This app allows users to flag maintenance issues, which can then be corrected. Users submit a trail report, in which they can include a geotag and a photo of the problem. This information can then be used to guide our volunteers directly to the issue via GPS. This saves time, and allows our volunteers to attend to problems more rapidly. If you're a user of the trails, give this app a try.



Hopefully, as COVID-19 restrictions become less stringent, we'll be able to host group workdays. We can use these times to better assess issues and handle longer-term repair projects.
