WINTER CAMP WINNERS

On the Winter Camp trip, the Scouts' patrols and three patrols made up of adults competed in a series of competitions, including a

trivia test, a scavenger search and a winter edition of Horseshoe Highscore. The top patrols in the trivia/scavenger/riddle portion of the challenges were, in third, Stag with 24.45 points, Flying Eagle in second with 29.75 points, and coming in first place was the adult patrol called "The Band Formerly Known as the Misfits" with a whopping 43.7 points.

Horseshoe Highscore featured events like fire building, knot tying, sled racing and two-man saw. In third place with 15 points was Stag patrol. In second place with 17.5 points was Rattlesnake patrol. And in first with 19 points was the Panther patrol.



ANTIETAM BATTLEFIELD TOUR AND CAMPOUT

Dads and Scouts, join us for an exciting trip to Antietam National Battlefield on the weekend of March 28-30, www.nps.gov/anti/index.htm.

The battle at Antietam Creek, Maryland, was one prong of a two-prong attack into Northern territory by Confederate General Robert E. Lee. While Lee was advancing on

Union forces at Antietam, Confederate General Stonewall Jackson was advancing on Harper's Ferry.

The battle in Antietam, fought on September 17, 1862, stands as the bloodiest single day of fighting in US history, with nearly 23,000 killed, wounded, or missing. We will tour the battlefield, a field hospital, the visitor's center, and Antietam National Cemetery.

We will be tent camping at the nearby Maple Tree Campground (www.thetreehousecamp.com).

We will leave from the troop cabin on Friday night and return early Sunday afternoon. Mark your calendar now!
