Aloha Kakou,

I'm sitting thinking about what to write and all I can picture are the mass shootings in Buffalo, Laguna Woods, and Uvalde. On top of that I am pondering the overturning of Roe v Wade and what that portends on so many levels. What about Ukraine? The criminalizing of health care for transgender youth? The SBC report on clergy sexual abuse? Replacement theory? Voter suppression? The wildfires? What have I left out? My head is spinning.

At the same time I am remembering a notion, a psychological defense mechanism that was identified, I believe, in the 1980s during the traumatic Ethiopian famine in which millions died. Night after night we were subjected to news images of young children suffering from hunger. Experts began to notice that as the news relentlessly covered the famine, more and more people would get up and change the channel or simply turn of the TV (This was back in the day when one actually had to "get up" to turn the channel dial or push the on/off button!). The experts called this mechanism "psychic numbing," that point at which any more witnessed suffering and pain simply left a person numb. They could no longer process what they were seeing and experiencing. It was too much.

I think with what we have been through the last three years or so, with one tragedy after another striking us, many of us are becoming "psychically numb." It's not that we don't care, we do! It's that our central nervous system simply cannot process any more sadness, heartache, and disaster.

Because of our evolutionary conditioning, we are biologically trained to take in five times more negative information than positive. We had to in order to stay alive. Now, it leaves us psychically numb, unable to respond in meaningful ways.

There is nothing wrong with not listening to the news every morning, not reading the paper every day, or watching the news every night. It is okay to take a break, take a breath, get some exercise, rest, and even meditate.

We can't save the world – none of us can, not even me (surprise!). But with some exercise, rest, and meditation, perhaps we can pick one thing, maybe two, and focus on that issue. And trust that others are focusing on the things we cannot. "Small moves against destruction" - those are what change our world ... and pull us out of psychic numbing and back into caring for our neighbors, near and far.

Pacifica Synod Assembly Highlights

- ◆ The major news from the Assembly is that Rev. David Nagler of Christ Lutheran in Pacific Beach was elected the fourth bishop of the Pacifica Synod. His term will begin August 1. David's professional history includes pastoral work in Bend, Oregon, and Encinitas, California. He also serves as chair of the advisory board of Pacific Lutheran Theological Seminary.
- Pastor Keith was elected Dean of the Hukilau Conference (a nonpaying job, so he's not going anywhere!)
- ♦ The national Church Council was memorialized to look at the possibilities and limits of online worship, study, etc.
- ♦ The Assembly approved an invitation to Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Services to discuss the opening of an extension office within our Synod's territory.
- The entire Assembly celebrated Bishop Andy Taylor's service as bishop over the last six challenging years.

An Excerpt from A Service After a Violent Event

God, giver of life, you intend for humans to live together in peace. In this time of grief over gun violence, we pray for your presence among us. That, trusting in your mighty and gentle healing, we may live in hope, we pray:

make us instruments of your peace.

God of resurrection, we remember before you those who have died in Buffalo, in Laguna Woods, and in Uvalde. We commend them to your eternal love. Grant healing and wholeness to the survivors who are wounded or traumatized. Restore all whose spirits are maimed by such violence. We pray for men who are not fathers but still mentor and guide us with fatherly love and advice.


We remember fathers, grandfathers, and great grandfathers who are no longer with us but who live forever n our memory and nourish us with their love.
