Hurricane Season 2019: Are you ready?

he first forecast for the year was released by TropicalStormRisk.com (TSR) on December 11,

2018, which predicted a slightly below-average season in 2019, with a total of 12 named storms, 5 hurricanes, and 2 major hurricanes, due to the anticipated presence of El Niño conditions during the season. On April 4, 2019, Colorado State University released its forecast, predicting a near-average season of 13 named storms, 5 hurricanes and 2 major

hurricanes. On April 5, TSR released an updated forecast that reiterated its earlier predictions. North Carolina State University released their forecast on April 16, predicting slightly above average activity with 13–16 named storms, 5–7 hurricanes and 2–3 major hurricanes. On May 6, The Weather Company predicted a slightly above average season, with 14 named storms, 7 hurricanes, and 3 major hurricanes.

Regardless of the forecast, as Floridians, one thing we know is that during hurricane season we are likely to be on the path of many of these storms.

This is the reason why it is so important to develop a disaster plan for you and your family.

Preparing a Disaster Supply Kit with enough emergency supplies to last for at least three days (72 hours) is paramount in this plan and we have created a cut-away checklist for you on page 12 that will help you get started.

It is also helpful to determine in advance if your home is in a flood

zone or mandatory evacuation zone and be proactive about getting materials to secure your home's doors and windows without the stress of doing so at the last minute. If you live in an evacuation zone, decide in advance where you will go and plan at least two evacuation routes.

If you have pets and think you might need to evacuate to a shelter, it is imperative that you make plans way ahead of time as not all shelters accept them (more on page 13). If you plan to shelter-in-place, locate a safe room – an interior,

first-floor room with the fewest windows and doors. Large closets and bathrooms often work best. Pick two places to meet if your

family cannot return home and select an out-ofstate contact for everyone to call if the family is separated. Post the **Emergency Phone Numbers cut-away on page 12** in a prominent place and teach children how and when to call 911. Check your insurance coverage and update if necessary. If you have one, have a plan to secure your boat and trim trees and branches.

It will also be useful to sign up for the City's CodeRED® emergency notifications and review all instructions, emergency resources and information at www.ftlauderdale.gov.

Stay safe this Hurricane Season Lake Ridge!

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

Hurricane season begins June 1 and runs through November. Over the next six months, all of us need to pay close attention to weather developments in and around our area. Experts are predicting another busy season with as many as 12 to 14 named storms.

Please don't be complacent. As the season starts, everyone should review their family emergency plan and assemble a hurricane supply kit so you are well-prepared if a storm should impact our area.

Remember to check your disaster supply kits. Make sure to have a three- to five-day supply of food and water. Those supplies should include at least one gallon of water per person per day, non-perishable food that is ready to eat, a battery-powered flashlight, a battery-powered radio, a first-aid kit and a reserve of prescription medicine.

As part of your family action plan, you should determine if you live in an evacuation zone and where you would go if ordered to evacuate. Keep a full tank of gas in your vehicles as lines can be long once a storm approaches. Make plans to secure homes, boats, pets and property. Check your insurance coverage. It's also prudent to inventory your possessions. Secure valuables and important documents. Please also ask your neighbors if they need any extra help or assistance.

In addition, please remember to trim trees, shrubs and other landscaping to minimize vegetative debris on your property. Also, you should assess your home for vulnerable spots and check the condition of shutters and back-up generators.

Keep in mind that after a hurricane, neighbors may be asked to help expedite clean up and recovery efforts by separating debris into four categories - vegetative debris, construction debris, appliances and electronics – and placing it unbagged curbside for collection without blocking roads or storm drains.

Finally, now is also a good time to sign up for the city of Fort Lauderdale's Code Red alerts and City News updates. We encourage you to follow us on Twitter and Facebook, join your neighbors on Nextdoor and visit www.fortlauderdale.gov/hurricane for more updates and preparation tips, as well as additional ways you can stay in touch with the city before, during and after a storm.

Remember, the most important thing we can all do is be prepared.

When to evacuate?

Residents and visitors of Fort Lauderdale located west of U.S. 1 (Federal Highway) typically will not need to evacuate. However, households east of U.S. 1 should consider the following points as they maybe advised to evacuate:

- When ordered to evacuate don't delay your departure
- Slight delay will result in significantly longer travel times as traffic congestion worsens
- Fill up your car with gas before you leave
- Select an evacuation destination that is nearest to your home
- Hotels will fill up quickly so be sure to make reservations
- If possible, make arrangements to stay with a friend or relative
- who resides closest to your home and who will not have to evacuate
- When evacuating to another county or region, be prepared to wait in traffic
- Be alert for road hazards such as washed-out roads or bridges and downed power lines
- · Do not drive into flooded areas



Check FDOT's 511 for Emergency Roadway Information

511 provides real-time traffic information, including travel times,

congestion, lane closures, emergency evacuation information and more on all of Florida's interstate highways, toll roads and many other metropolitan roadways.

There are five convenient ways for motorists to receive traffic updates:

- Call 511 toll free for updates in English and Spanish from any landline or mobile phone.
- Visit <u>FL511.com</u> for interactive roadway maps showing traffic congestion and crashes, travel times and traffic camera views.
- Sign up for a "My Florida 511" account at <u>FL511.com</u> to create custom routes and register for email, text or phone alerts.
- Download the free Florida 511 mobile app available on <u>Google Play</u> or <u>Apple App Store</u>.
- Follow one of the 12 statewide, regional or roadway-specific <u>Twitter</u> feeds (<u>#FL511</u>), including @FL511_I95, @FL_511_I4 and @FL511_I10.

Where do I go for sheltering?

Broward County has three types of emergency shelters:

- General population shelters
- Pet friendly shelters
- Special needs shelters (People with medical needs)

While evacuating to a general population shelter, bring some of your own supplies such as:

- Bed linens & blankets
- Clothing, toiletries/hygiene items
- Personal medications

What to Expect in a Shelter:

When disasters occur, Broward County provides refuge in temporary emergency shelters, mostly located in schools.

General population shelters are well stocked with basic necessities for survival including food, water and a place to sleep. However, shelters will not be able to provide the same level of convenience as a friend or family member's home or a hotel. Oftentimes, shelters are crowded, noisy, boring, short-staffed and offer very little privacy.

It should also be expected that, although a general population shelter is able to provide basic first aid, a person with medical needs should consider looking into eligibility requirements for a Special Needs Shelter if their particular medical condition requires daily medical assistance. Shelters in the City of Fort Lauderdale include the following:

- Arthur Ashe Middle School 1701 NW 23rd Avenue, Fort Lauderdale, FL 33311
- Riverland Elementary School 2600 SW 11th Court, Fort Lauderdale, FL 33312

Public emergency shelters are a place of last resort. It is best to stay at a hotel, relative's home, or friend's home outside of the impact area.

If you live in an evacuation zone and an evacuation is ordered, you are required by law to evacuate.


- Leave when local government officials issue a mandatory evacuation order for your area.
- Evacuate to a family or friend's home or hotel outside the evacuation area. Shelters provide for basic needs only and are a choice of last resort.
- Tell someone outside the storm area where you are going.
- Take your hurricane kit and important papers with you.

Vulnerable Population Registry Available

The Vulnerable Population Registry is available for residents who are at risk due to disability, frailty or health issues, regardless of age, who elect to stay at home in the event of a hurricane or other emergency. The Registry is a partnership between Broward County and municipalities, including the City of Fort Lauderdale, to help emergency responders better plan for recoveries from hurricanes and other emergencies. It is not a guarantee of assistance.

You can register online or by calling 311 in Broward or 954-831-4000 (TTY 954-831-3890). All the information provided will be held in the strictest confidence as required by State law.





Hurricane Preparedness

Stay informed. Download local news apps, follow FEMA and emergency management reports, and try to have a battery-operated radio handy in case power goes out.

Know your evacuation plan. Know how you will get you and your family out of the storm area. For information about shelters close to you, download the <u>American Red Cross Shelter Finder App</u> or text SHELTER and your zip code to 43362.

Stock up on essential supplies. Make sure your car is fueled, locate your first aid kit, gather prescriptions and important documents, and keep your pet's kennel ready at hand. You'll need bottled water, non-perishable food, and batteries in case your power goes out.

Know what to do in case of flooding. Don't attempt to drive on flooded roads and stay away from downed power lines.

Pets & Shelters: Think Ahead

Pet friendly shelters

Pet friendly shelters are open to accommodate pet owners that want to stay with their pets and have no other alternative. Ideally, pet owners should not rely on pet friendly shelters and should make plans in advance to take pets with them to a location out of the threatened area. However, if no other option exists, pet friendly shelters will serve as locations where pets and their owner can stay in the same building.

Broward County Pet Friendly Shelter location:



Millennium Middle School 5803 NW 94th Ave, Tamarac, FL 33321

Owners should bring the following supplies:

- Crate to house your pet with enough room to stand up, lie down, and stretch out.
- Labeling crates with the pet and owner's name and phone number is mandatory
- Medications (in waterproof bag)
- Food (in waterproof bag), water and bowls
- · Blankets/toys
- Cleaning supplies including paper towels, spray bottles, trash bags
- Leash and harness / collar with Identification tag (s)
- Veterinary records for each pet in an airtight bag
- Photograph of your pet
- Store items in a plastic tote container
- Use airtight bags within tote

Supplies for your pet should be adequate to last seven days at a minimum.

Pets are family too. Plan ahead, for their sake.

I have medical needs, where do I go for sheltering?

Special Needs Shelters are for residents that require health care assistance with activities for daily living. Examples include:

- Medical assistance with the administration of medicines
- Oxygen and/or electricity dependent
- Emphysema, partial paralysis, heart problems, Parkinson's disease, dementia or incontinence

If you plan on going to a Special Needs Shelter, pre-registration is encouraged to ensure that the shelter is adequately prepared to meet your needs. If you pre-register, you are not obligated to go to the shelter in an emergency. You can change your plans without notice if you make other arrangements.



TRANSPORTATION: Transportation is available for residents staying at one of our Special Needs Shelter.

THINGS YOU CAN DO BEFORE BEING PICKED UP:

- Pack a bag and be ready to go
- Medications for 3 weeks, list of medications, Pharmacy name & number, Doctors' name & number, your walker, wheelchair and other medical equipment
 - Bring all equipment if oxygen dependent
 - Clean clothes for three days
 - Extra eyeglasses, flashlight, and reading material
 - Blankets and pillows, sheet if desired for cot
 - Personal hygiene items, towel & wash cloth
 - House keys and car keys
 - Personal phone book or list of important numbers and important papers, including identification, sealed in zip-lock bags
 - Folding chair, lawn chair or cot
 - Non-perishable food and snacks, items if you require a special diet
- Medical orders including "Do Not Resuscitate" order, if applicable
- Call caretaker and family to inform them of your evacuation plans
- Turn off electricity, water and gas if possible. Be sure to follow turn off instructions given by your utility company

HOSPITAL ADMITTANCE

Unstable medical condition or on-going treatment may require hospital stay during an emergency. This includes late term pregnancy and other unstable conditions. Please consult with your physician, because a Special Needs Shelter may not be the best option for you.
