Our next photo contest will start April 8th and go to the 28^{th} . Please send your entries to me at dfdown2000@yahoo.com . It would be best to get your photos to me no later than April 7th since voting will open on the 8th.

The May theme is **Trackside Industry** in four categories for models and 4 categories for prototype. Category A is Manufacturing/Warehousing; B is Chemicals/Fuels; C is Agriculture/Forestry; and D is Mining.

You can look at the contest photos as soon as they are loaded, but voting will not start until April 8. Voting will end on April 28.

When you enter the site the following steps should be followed:

1.Just above the pictures on the right hand side is a sort option. Select sort by Title. This groups the pictures in each category near each other. (They will not be grouped in numerical order, but I don't control that.)

2. After you sort the photos by title, then, if the photos are not labeled with the category and number click on the "information dot" on any one of the photos and all the labels will show up.



3. Below each picture there are two boxes. The box on the left has a black dot, the box on the right is blank and shows a check mark if you pass the cursor over it. When you select a picture as your choice for the category, click on the box with the check mark. If you change your mind you can click on the box with the dot in it to remove the checked box. Select only one photo in each category.

4. When you are finished, close the site.

If you go back to the site your votes will be visible, but

not any others.

If you have problems with voting or using the site, please let me know. Because our instructions were not complete, some of you did not vote in the last contest. We do not want to leave anyone out.

Winners will be acknowledged at the May meeting.




From the Editor

Enter the new email address in the appropriate box and click "Submit". If your membership has lapsed, you will be placed back on the monthly Member-only email list once you renew your membership. Here's how it works: you send me a photo or photos, along with a brief description and I post it on the listserv for all to see. If you would like feedback from the group, let me know and I will include your email in the post, but that is **optional**. That way if one of you has a question they can contact you directly.

And from that day on March 29, 2020 to the present, we have had upwards of 150 posts from our modelers. We hope to continue this for as long as it is of interest to our members. If you are not on the listserv, just send an email to the address below requesting to be added to the list!

A Puzzle for You

You like trains, or train watching, but have you ever wanted to go to an OPS (Operating Session) and run trains on someone else's



layout, but were afraid you wouldn't know what to do?

Model Railroad Operation is a fun and interesting role-playing game where the players (operators) use model trains to simulate the movements of the prototype railroad. Operators fill the roles of railroad employees like engineers, conductors, yardmasters, dispatchers, and more. Many of our SCWD members participate each month at multiple layouts to enjoy this fun and stimulating practice of critical thinking and problem solving in the context of railroad operations.

Now, there is a way for you to get your feet wet in this critical thinking and problem-solving railroad environment in the privacy of your own home through the use of railroad switching puzzles.

In July, a group of SCWD members started a project to introduce more of our members to the enjoyment of railroad operations, or as our wives call it, playing trains. Some of us have been engaged in operating sessions for 20 years or more, and would like to get more of you involved.

The project involves getting one to solve a series of train switching puzzles (on paper, or your computer) in the least number of moves possible. You can then submit your solution to see if yours was done in the least number of moves.

Beginners can start with **3 introductory puzzles** to show the kinds of skills used in railroad switching operations. Then, you can advance to a series of more advanced puzzles written and based on actual SCWD member area layouts. Or, if you have already been to an OPS session, you could do an introductory puzzle, and jump right into the more challenging ones.

Railroad Bridges

Among the explosion of new technologies introduced by the railroad industry in the 19th century was the development of bridge building techniques.

Ancient Bridges

The bridges of prehistory were accidental, a tree fallen across a stream, or vines tangled near a ravine. But very early, people started building them deliberately. Their first attempts simply mirrored nature with logs and stone fill. Rope bridges, a simple type of suspension bridge, were used by the Inca civilization in the Andes Mountains of South America. The Chinese had arch and suspension bridges as early as 300 BC.

The Greeks developed a mathematical and geometric basis for bridge construction but as usual they didn't do much with it but left it to the Romans who by utilizing the Greek description of the arch added their own discovery of concrete and became the bridgebuilding masters of the ancient world. Some of their bridge and aqueducts are still in use two thousand years later.




Puente Romano across the Guadiana River in Spain. 752 meters long and still in use

Wooden Bridges

Early wooden bridges of course have not survived the way stone ones have but the biggest wood bridges were built in the era of photography.

As the UP and SP built the transcontinental railroad across the country, they encountered mountains, rivers, valleys and grades that were beyond any known bridge technologies. No bridge in history had been required to span such rugged terrain, traverse such sharp curves or carry such loads. Fortunately, a Massachusetts engineer designed and patented the Howe Truss which allowed fast and sturdy construction both on and off site. Construction crews worked just ahead of the track layers and had to build quickly. Wood was so plentiful, available and cheap that it was always the first option. Some truly spectacular wooden bridges were built. They were always regarded as temporary and as soon as possible they were replaced with steel, iron, and later concrete or just fill. The railroad coincided with the development of very large earth movers, so some valleys and ravines were just filled in and the line built on the fill.

Goat Canyon Trestle built 1932. 750 feet long and 200 feet high. Southern California. The biggest wood trestle in the world. Currently out of service but undergoing repairs.


