promise not to leave early because there would be a surprise at the end. This was a terrific experience


and I think all

buttons and as time went on creativity increased and the nacho chip bags became decor too. Everyone had his or her own




flair and proudly wore their work of art as we left the building to get ready for dinner.

½ cup olive oil

Southwestern Salad

Total time: 30 Minutes Yield: 6-8 servings

Ingredients:

For the Dressing

1 ripe avocado, pitted and peeled
¼ cup red wine vinegar
2 tablespoons fresh lime juice
2 tablespoons chopped fresh cilantro
½ jalapeno, seeded and coarsely chopped
1 clove garlic, coarsely chopped
½ teaspoon kosher salt
½ teaspoon ground black pepper

For the Salad

2 heads romaine lettuce, chopped
1 (15-oz.) can black beans, drained and rinsed
1 ½ cup grape tomatoes, cut in half
1 orange bell pepper, seeded and chopped
1 cup frozen corn, thawed
1 cup shredded pepper jack cheese
4 green onions, sliced
½ cup chopped fresh cilantro
1 ripe avocado, peeled, pitted and cubed
½ cup crushed tortilla chips or strips

Directions:

- 1. For the dressing: In a blender or food processor, add the avocado, red wine vinegar, lime juice, cilantro, jalapeno, garlic, salt and pepper. Blend or pulse until almost smooth/ there should still be bits of cilantro. Add the oil and blend until incorporated.
- 2. For the salad: To a large bowl, add the lettuce, black beans, tomatoes, bell pepper, corn, cheese, green onion, cilantro, avocado, and tortilla chips. Drizzle with the dressing and toss to combine. Serve immediately

Tip: Toss the cubed avocado with a tablespoon or two of lime juice before adding it to the salad to maintain its beautiful green color



Notes from our National Director.

Hello everyone.

FMCA has been busy with developing new tools to help chapters, training videos for office

positions, updated their website and created positions for recruiting and retaining members.

Here are two new positions that our chapter should consider.

These positions are recommendations, and not directives, for chapters and the areas. Please use them as a guideline for your group. These duties could be incorporated into existing officer positions, or this might be a way to involve someone or team not yet in a leadership role.

#1 Chapter Membership Coordinator Position

Description: Membership is every person's responsibility. A Chapter Membership Coordinator would be the person responsible for motivating chapter members to recruit and retain members, contacting RVers at campgrounds and making personal contact with potential new members. The Chapter Membership Coordinator will respond to new membership recruitment efforts and receive central office leads. This is a vital position to keep FMCA's chapters healthy and thriving. The Chapter Membership Coordinator must be familiar with their chapter's scope, special interests, or activities and must be able to respond to inquiries as quickly as possible. The coordinator will work with the chapter leadership, the chapter members, the Chapter Services Department at FMCA, and the Area Vice President to keep chapter membership within a healthy range.

#2 Area Chapter Developer Position Description:

The Area Chapter Developer position/group would not be a regular officer requiring bylaws change. The person or committee would endeavor to establish new chapters that are hobby/interest focused, more local/regionally focused, and may include RVers who have towable when possible. The Area Chapter Developer is a position/group recruited and appointed by the Area Vice President to the area leadership team. The Area Chapter Developer will work with FMCA staff to create a zip code range, brand specific RV, or special interest lists for a potential new chapter. FMCA staff will pull information from the database to show the number of chapter and nonchapter members in the requested pool. Once they have the information, the Area Chapter Developer will work with the current chapters to see whether they are interested in recruiting more FMCA members to their group. If there are no current chapters that suit the needs, the Area Chapter Developer will work with the list and the Area Vice President to set up a meeting for this new group to get together to discuss the possibility of chapter formation. Focus of a Chapter Developer will seek contacts with regionally focused hobby/interest groups. The Area Chapter Developer will formulate a plan to discover and meet such groups, exhibit at area gatherings, and pursue the development of new chapters oriented to such groups.

The governing board members will be meeting in Redmond, Oregon on Aug 14, 2024. Here are the changes for which we are voting.

#1 Proposal

The Constitution and Bylaws Committee moves to change the title of the national "Area Vice President" to "Area President."

#2 Proposal

Executive Board. The national officer Senior Vice President to read Vice President.

#3 Proposal

In case of a permanent vacancy in the office of Executive President the Vice President shall become the President to fill the unexpired term. This would be the same for the Area President and Senior Vice President.

#4 Proposal

The Constitution and Bylaws Committee moves to change the date for receiving proposed Bylaws amendments from January 1st to March 1st and for the Governing Board members to receive proposed Bylaws amendments not later than 60 days versus 120 days prior to Governing Board meeting.

#5 Proposal

The Constitution and Bylaws Committee is moving to update the wording in this article to include the new Pathfinder category of membership.

#6 Proposal

The Constitution and Bylaws Committee moves to update the wording in the Bylaws to be consistent with the Purpose statement in the FMCA Constitution.

Article I – FMCA Mission and Purpose – Paragraph (2) to read as follows.

The purpose of FMCA is to promote good fellowship and cooperation among all FMCA and provide services to meet the needs of the RV community.

#7 Proposal

The Constitution and Bylaws Committee moves to amend Article XV I – Area Associations, paragraph (5) to include the requirements for electing the Area Senior Vice President. That position is to be filled by a person that is qualified to fill a vacancy in the office of Area President.

I will be voting on this proposal in August. If you have any questions, comments or amendments to these proposals please email me. I will provide more information about Pathfinder in next month's newsletter. Have a safe and fun summer. See you September.

SAFETY REMINDER

Tire Pressure

I know that we have talked a lot about tire pressure in the past, but as summer is here, it is a good time to think about this again.

Remember that it is recommended to check your tires when they are cold.

Okay that is all good, but what is cold tire pressure and how is it defined:

Cold Tires: Ensure that your tires are truly cold, meaning they haven't been on the road for several hours. Driving or moving on tires generates heat, which can elevate tire pressure. Waiting at least three hours after your last trip ensures a more accurate reading.

Temperature Compensation: Tire pressure is not based on any laboratory standard temperature. Instead, it's based on the tire not being warmed from use (driving) or sun exposure in the previous two hours. The classical "temperature in the shade" is the ambient temperature that tire engineers consider. So, check your tire pressure before the sun has a chance to shine on the tires and before you've used the vehicle.

Pressure Changes: As you drive, both temperature and pressure can increase. It's essential not to bleed pressure from a "hot or warm" tire after you've started your travels. Tire pressure changes by about 2% for every 10°F change in temperature. However, this varies for different tire types. For RV tires (80 or 100 psi), consider a +10% cushion above the required inflation pressure to avoid constant adjustments


