Old Business:

Progress on Plan to create and distribute 10 point "Benefits of SFMS" to Clubs – originally presented by Reggie Bolton, Wayne Dodd. It was suggested that a committee be developed for each area. The Secretary read the ten Categories:

Phil Kaiser suggested that we produce a dramatic flyer that includes the list and could be distributed to all clubs, and at the Rockhound Roundup. Could be produced with our marketing budget. As each was reviewed, some volunteered to help in some areas. It was further suggested that the list be published in the Lodestar to appeal for additional assistance throughout the membership.

Rockhound Roundup- Organizational work has already begun. In order for the SFMS to assume leadership of the event, Dennis Buchannan made a motion that the SFMS Host the event. Second by Lori Heinemann. Motion carried. Discussed the plan to make the Roundup an annual event to promote interclub and SFMS interaction. Jerri described the venue and available space to fill with vendor sites. She indicated that based on her discussions with the site manager, we should be able to fit a minimum of 50 spaces, perhaps as many as 100. After some discussion about setting the vendor fee, Dennis Buchannan made a motion to charge in introductory rate of \$20, with the possibility of increasing in future years to expand the event. More discussion was followed by a vote, 7 for, 14 against. Motion failed. It was suggested that paying \$220 for show Insurance, printing banners, preparing for the event might cost more. We don't want the event to run in the red. Motion by Lori Heinemann to charge \$25, Dave Wayment, seconded, vote was 14 for, 7 against. Motion carried. Additional discussion followed with suggestions for terms and information to be included in the application. Jerri will

get the information to Jeff Ursillo who has planned a separate page of information for the event within the next few days. Jerri ended the topic with the suggestion that if the event is successful, and grows, we might, in the future, be able to use this revenue stream to fund travel stipends to State Directors and Officers to support SFMS business without being a burden to clubs.

Brainstorm possible people to fill vacant positions. Need many to fill openings. Discussed the open State Director Positions and Committee positions. Buddy Shotts discussed the process to elect a new State Director. Melissa Hill will be working on this. In reviewing the Committee positions, it was suggested the Publications Chair is an obsolete position, because all publications are now digital. Motion made by Dave Wayment, second by Jason Hamilton to drop the Publications position. Motion carried.

Dave also suggestion that due to Don Monroe's ill health, we should be looking to fill that position as well. Travis Paris indicated after looking over the Bylaws, since Publications was a Standing Committee, it could only be removed by an amendment to the Bylaws. Therefore, Dave made a motion and Jason seconded to rescind his previous motion. This carried, with recognition that we need to pursue that amendment.

It was suggested that vacant positions with descriptions, be published in the Lodestar to try to solicit volunteers to fill them. Motion made by Phil Kaiser to table the issue, second by Barbi Beatty. Motion carried.

#### **New Business**

ALAA – Dave Wayment announced he is now the Southeast Director. He described their mission and purpose to help protect right to collect and access public lands for that purpose. He encouraged everyone to consider joining and supporting the organization. Individual membership is just \$25 per year. Dennis Buchannan and Travis Paris also spoke in support.

Barbi Beatty repeated the proposal to invest \$10,000 in a CD with Wells Fargo with a term of 19 months at an APR of 2.6%, to continue at rollover at 2.57%. Jerri Heer made a motion to purchase the CD as described. Reba Shotts seconded. Motion carried.

The announcement of a new SFMS Workshop website was discussed. There was some confusion as to who started it and under what circumstances. Teresa will investigate.

Travis Paris brought up the Dixie Mineral Council. He was concerned that he had heard some confusion as to whether SFMS members could attend fieldtrips without membership in a DMC participating club. It was restated that the DMC rules had always maintained that only members of DMC participating clubs can attend DMC Field trips. Then it was suggested that the DMC should send out an article to the Lodestar to restate the rules.

**Adjourn - Dave** Wayment made a motion to adjourn, Reba Shotts seconded. Motion carried. Meeting adjourned at 12:50 PM

## **Safety**

Greetings all, hope you have had a good March. April is just around the corner and it seems that winter still wants to make a statement. We are in Young Harris, GA this weekend and the projected low on Monday is 26 degrees F, Much better than a minus number, no doubt.

As noted last month, being inside and out of shape makes catching up with the transplanting and mowing a bit more exercise than watching the basketball games. We moved several shrubs around and now have to get the garden cleaned, so watching the games takes a backseat..

All of this exercise of course leaves me a bit sore the next morning. So, if I had spent some of my nap times getting exercise, I would have done better, well maybe next year.

Spring is better than shoveling snow as far as harmful exercise, but even moderate exercise needs to be planned. Sedentary folks do not seem to live as along, since the 12 oz curls or 6 oz curls consume far fewer calories than cutting the grass or trimming the hedges.

Whatever you do, do it in moderation. When we lived in New Jersey, a neighborhood lady ran the super long marathons, like 125 miles or something like that. This lady had tag team running partners for her training, so multiple 26.2 mile marathoners would tag team to help her train. A friend of ours noted, he would take up running if and when he saw a runner with a smile on their face. He never took up running. I am not a runner, because I do not have the patience.

Safety this month looks at TV programs. For those who watch everything from Barnwood Builders or Rehab Addict or other DIY fixer up programs, please note that most of these do not show the proper Personal Protective Equipment (PPE). Barnwood Builders and Rehab Addict do a pretty good job of addressing these issues. But, me being employed by a very large Engineering and Construction firm we look for the slightest chink in the PPE used by these folks on TV.

Hammering a nail without gloves or safety glasses is a definite no-no. Demolition of walls, concrete slabs without the proper PPE can leave you doing less in the very near future. Some may remember, my less than successful attempt to use a saws-all single handed and my finger got in the way. A substantial fail in the safety area; and I did not mention this during our safety topics we use at the start of our meetings. And to make matters worse, I was not wearing gloves.

Several of us went to a plant site this past week and based on the Company's safety charter, we requested hard hats. This particular tank fabrication did not require hard hats in the production area. So, we were required by the fabricator to have wrap around safety glasses, steel toed shoes and hearing protection, so they did well in protecting their employees. Their safety record was also quite good. In selling construction on a large project the safety records become a major selling point; since good safety records save money.

In the year 2001, I was in the midst of a 16 month stay in Puerto Rico. For whatever reason, we had three lost time accidents in one day on the island. Two (2) were on our job site. One was a fall, because of an improperly covered opening. The other was an individual got his hand into a blower and nipped the end of a finger. The fall victim was lucky, he fell 15 feet and landed in such a ways as to not break any bones, he went to the emergency room and was back to work the next day. He did office work for a couple of days, just as a safety measure. The other guy was disciplined, because he disobeyed the warning signs on the equipment.

So, as always, look at your tasks and ask what can go wrong. Then take appropriate safety PPE and be careful.

Be safe and take care.


#### 2019 WEBMASTERS CONTEST RESULTS

## **Dixie Mineral Council Field Trip Report**

January 2019 DMC Field Trip Report
Hosted by the Forsyth Gem and Mineral Club

On January 19th, 2019 the Forsyth Gem and Mineral Club hosted a field trip to a lake in Tennessee for the DMC. In spite of the gloomy forecast, around twenty

hardy individuals from clubs in Georgia, Tennessee and North Carolina gathered at the marina that morning to hunt for "diamonds" i.e. double terminated quartz crystals. The water level was down about twenty five feet from full pond, exposing lots of lake bed to search. The weather was mild with occasional light rain showers.



The overcast skies made the small clear crystals difficult to find without the typical sparkle that sunshine produces, but many people found crystals anyway. Most were larger and milkier than what is normally seen at this site, with many crystals showing dark inclusions.



The small "brain" shaped geodes were plentiful, along with portions of geodes with a sugar coating of quartz crystals. By mid-afternoon most collectors decided to call it a day and head home. Lake levels are lowered from December to the end of February. Best collecting is on days with mild weather and sunshine. Thanks to all who braved the weather and attended the "dig".
