



- ~1260 Sites in CA
- Goal: keep
 homes, lives &
 neighborhoods
 safer from wildfire





The Power of Firewise Collaboration



Investments in 2024:

- 81 communities, 6549 homes
- \$18.4 Million personal money
- 183K volunteer hours

Sends a powerful message to
Our Board of Supervisors, Fire Chiefs
and County





- Framework with 6 step process for communities
- Neighbors collaborate
- 8 homes minimum
- Voluntary participation
- **Education**: home hardening, defensible space
- Decreases risk for residents, first responders
- Together we are stronger
- Not "One and Done"; recognition earned yearly via annual renewal

Benefits – Why Participate?

- Community-building collaboration
- Neighborhood focus:
- Vegetation management, evacuation readiness, emergency communication
- Builds goodwill with local fire professionals
- Access to professional help (FireSafe Councils, OR3, Resource Conservation District)
- Potential home insurance discounts (USAA, State Farm, FAIR Plan, others)

6 Steps to Achieving Firewise USA Recognition

- **1. Form a steering committee** comprised of neighborhood residents, to organize and drive the process
- 2. Complete a wildfire risk assessment. Including input from the Fire Department within your jurisdiction, if resources are available.
- **3. Host/attend** a minimum of one wildfire risk reduction **educational event**, or related activity per year. Example: Home Hardening workshop

Steps to Achieving Firewise USA Recognition

- 4. Develop a **Three-year Action Plan** based on the site's risk assessment and priorities
- 5. Meet the minimum wildfire risk reduction investment: 1 hour (or ~\$33.49) per residence per year. Ex: home defensible space, road work parties for brush clearing
- 6. Create a Firewise USA® Portal online account, add your data and submit your application

Potential Neighborhood activities (for investment hours)

- Brush clearing, chipping & chain saw days
- Fire hydrants clear surroundings, blue reflective dots in street, wrap in blue tape
- Road and driveway clearance for fire engines (15 x 15)
- Mark turn around locations for emergency vehicles
- Create GIS map (houses and water sources)
- Emergency Communication plan
- Evacuation drills
