

EDWARD LOTTER IS SUMMONED BY DEATH

**Receives at Carney Hospital;
After Serious Operation Upon
Kidneys; Burial Today.**

On February 1, 1881, in the home of John and Susanna Lotter of Mildmay, Ont., Canada, there was born a son who was called Edward. In 1892 he removed with his parents into New York state, later moving to Michigan where they located near the village of Elkton. On December 28, 1904 he married Lucy, the third oldest daughter of Jonathan and Elizabeth Blead. They immediately established a home on a eighty acre farm one mile west and one and one-half miles south of Elkton. This union was blessed with three children, Clifton, Helen and Harold, all of whom are still at home.

In many respects this home was unusual, due to the fact that seventeen years ago Mrs. Lotter contracted a severe case of arthritis and has been an invalid for many years. During all these years, Mr. Lotter has shown loyalty and faithfulness to his wife and family that is far beyond a word description, though often during the busiest season of the year it was necessary for the deceased to attend to the comforts of his wife as often as forty times in a single night he was never known to complain that the burden was too heavy, but always tried to do more to relieve his wife's suffering.

Working under the terrific strain his health finally began to fail and after several medical examinations it was decided to operate upon him on December 29, 1930, but in spite of all that medical science could do there was no help for the greatly overburdened body and on January 5, 1931, his spirit was called to dwell with the immortals across the great divide.

Mr. Lotter took an active part in civic affairs, serving on the school board for twelve years, and as the township treasurer two years, and always took an active part in the Evangelical church of which he was a member for more than twenty years.

Mr. Lotter leaves to mourn his demise, besides his wife and children, his mother, Susanna Lotter of Elkton, a brother, Samuel, of Brown City, Michigan, Mrs. Wm Baker and Mrs. Wm. Armstrong both of Flint, Michigan, Mrs. Wm. MacInnes of Alma, Michigan and a host of other relatives and friends.

Funeral services were held from the home (today) Thursday, at 1:30 o'clock p. m. and from the Evangelical church at 2:30 o'clock p. m. Rev. Herbert Stressman officiated, and was assisted by Rev. E. M. Gibson. Burial was made in Caseville Memorial Park.
