




Board of Directors





Annual Review

2015

In 2015, External Audits continued for Disease Specific measures. Diseases included in the review were COPD/Asthma/Smoking Cessation, CAD, Diabetes, Hypertension, Prevention, Tobacco, Obesity and Mental Health. A small sample of each disease was audited each month. During the first quarter, improvement was noted in most areas. Results continued to vary in Hypertension, mostly related to patient compliance. In Diabetes, A1c results improved, as more patients were falling into the area of having an A1c less than 8.0. Tobacco reviews showed that a greater number of patients were non-smokers, relative to the education and tools provided to those patients.

During the 2nd Quarter, review of Laboratory and Referral logs were started. Many of the issues found were related to completing the comments and filling in the blanks. Review of the Referral Log was completed and a few suggestions were made to fill in the specific test/x-ray requested when referring a patient to the ARH. The referrals to Eye and Dental were color-coded. The review of the May Laboratory log appeared to be complete and a few issues were addressed. Improvement was noted in June log review. The disease specific audits showed steady improvement, especially in the Diabetes Foot Exam. BMI's were documented in all charts reviewed, which was a huge improvement. The improvements were largely attributed to the EMR alerts.

All audits were repeated in the 3rd Quarter. Review of the Laboratory and Referral Logs showed great improvement. The reports from other physicians where patients had been referred were not received in a timely manner even though they were requested multiple times. Many times, the patient did not actually show for their appointment. This was noted on the log, as well as when the patients cancelled their appointment. The sample of Disease Specific audits showed great results. Pap Smears were now being performed on site, which was a great service for the female population in the clinic. It appeared that LDL and A1c results were improving. In the review of Obesity, BMI's showed a steady decrease in a few patients.

During the 4th Quarter of 2015, the Disease specific audits were completed on site. Review of the Laboratory Logs and Referral Logs were completed and showed continued improvement in follow-up and documentation. It was suggested the documentation go a step further on the Laboratory Log, to explain why a lab was marked through or what happened when a patient was marked "unable to draw". In some cases patients were sent to ARH for blood draw, but not all were documented. In review of the Referral Logs, it was noted that some patients did not qualify for long-term treatment or were denied an appointment due to insurance. Suggestions included noting what step was taken next with those patients.

Over the past year, the clinic has continued to show improvement in most areas. Those results will be included in the Internal Audit Review. The use of the EMR and continued collaboration between staff and practitioners were instrumental in improvement in documentation of excellent patient care. In 2016, most audits will be performed via the EMR reports. External audits will be developed to include other areas where opportunities for improvement would benefit the patient population they serve. The HEDIS 2016 Measures will be used to develop audits. One area for review and possible improvement is Osteoporosis Management in women, including Dexa Scans and possibly need for medication. Discussion will continue with the clinic practitioners to develop audit criteria for this measure. Other areas might include administration of medication during a clinic visit. These will be reviewed and a plan implemented in April.

Annual Review 2015 Improvements

- 1. The lab logs have been updated and now include explanations as to why a lab was not drawn or why a patient needed to have their blood drawn at ARH.
- 2. We continue to struggle trying to get reports from other offices. We will continue to monitor this and try to get records in a timely manner.
- 3. If patients do not qualify for long term treatment or are denied an appointment due to insurance, we have the option to appeal that decision. Additional information is sent in hopes the insurance company will approve the treatment. This has to do mostly with CT scans and MRI's. Long term treatment refers to pain management. This is the Physician's decision after they have been evaluated. We do make an effort to try to get the patient into another facility.
- 4. A PDSA study has been written to address Osteoporosis Management in women which includes DEXA scans and medication management.
- 5. Our next PDSA will be to address administration of medication in the clinic. We have a policy in place, but our procedure will be updated.
