5 Key Factors That Determine Line-Haul Earnings

1. Pay Structure Transparency

Not all companies pay the same per mile—and not all explain their pay clearly. Look for:

- Mileage pay clarity (e.g., \$0.70-\$0.85 CPM)
- Whether it's hub miles or practical miles (you want practical miles)
- Bonuses (e.g., safety, performance, on-time delivery)
- Layover and breakdown pay
- Break and Hook pay

▶ **Red flag:** If a recruiter dances around the numbers or avoids giving clear breakdowns, move on.

2. Miles Consistency

Some companies promise "up to 3,000 miles a week," but rarely deliver it. Ask:

- "What's the average weekly miles over the past 6 months?"
- "Are there slow seasons or certain times where miles drop?"
- ▼ TopTip: Talk to current Drivers if you can. They'll tell you what's real.

3. Drop-and-Hook vs. Live Load/Unload

Time is money. Line-haul work that's mostly drop-and-hook means you spend less time waiting and more time earning. Avoid jobs with:

- Frequent dock delays
- Long waits at distribution centers

4. Terminal Proximity & Home Base

Your home terminal can make or break your weekly schedule. The closer you are to a busy, well-managed terminal:

- The quicker you get rolling
- The easier it is to maximize your miles
- The less unpaid time you waste

5. Company Culture & Turnover Rate

Companies with high Driver turnover often have poor support, unreliable routes, or broken pay promises. Look for:

- Average Driver tenure (more than 2 years = good sign)
- How dispatchers treat Drivers
- Equipment maintenance responsiveness

Top Questions to Ask in Your Next Line-Haul Interview

Use this checklist to find out what they're really offering:

Pay & Miles

- "What's the exact mileage rate start?"
- "When does a driver hit Top-Pay?"
- "Do you pay practical or zip-to-zip miles?"
- "What's the average miles per week right now?"

Route & Freight

- "Is this a dedicated route or variable?"
- "How much of the freight is drop-and-hook?"
- "What's the average wait time per Hook?"

Note: This last question applies to those terminals that hook and break sets for you)

✓ Time & Home Life

- "How many days off do Drivers typically get?"
- "What's the average time between dispatch and return?"

☑ Bonuses & Benefits

- "Are there performance bonuses? If so, how are they earned?"
- "Do you offer retirement contributions or 401(k) matching?"
- "How long before benefits kick in?"

Note: Timing of your start date is important. Example: my start date was June 1^{st} , and my medical benefits started July 1^{st} . If I had started on June 2^{nd} my benefits would have started on July 1^{st} — see the difference even one day can make?

Reputation & Stability

- "What's your Driver turnover rate?"
- "Can I speak with a current Driver about their experience?"

Final Thoughts

The road to six-figure income as a line-haul Driver isn't just about hustling—it's about making smart career choices. Choose companies with consistent miles, clear pay, and a strong Driver support system.
