

A WORD FROM YOUR PASTOR

Dear Friends,

As I am writing to you the Labor Day Weekend is fast approaching. The first Monday in September is a day to celebrate the contributions of the American Worker to the strength and prosperity of our nation. It has been an official federal holiday since 1894. Millions will enjoy a short trip or a family get-together during the three day weekend. School has just started or is about to start. Different sports come into season. And it is the unofficial end of summer.



Back in the 1800's many people worked 12 hours a day 7 days a week. Children as young as 5 years old once worked in factories and mines. Men and women and children often worked in very unsafe conditions. A lot has changed in our nation, but sadly in our world today there are still places where children and adults work in unsafe conditions for pennies with no hope of a better life.

In Luke 10:7, Jesus says in part, "... the worker deserves his wages..." (The Apostle Paul also says this in 1 Timothy 5:18.) Deuteronomy 24:15 says of poor and needy hired workers, "15 Pay them their wages each day before sunset, because they are poor and are counting on it. Otherwise they may cry to the LORD against you, and you will be guilty of sin." Leviticus 19:13 also says we are not to hold back the wages we owe a hired worker.

God worked as well. For 6 days in fact. And then God rested on the 7th day. Jesus was a carpenter. Jesus would have worked hard with wood and stone using only simple tools and a lot of sweat and muscle. He was a trained and skillful craftsman.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

Did America have a Religious Founding? (Part 1)


This disputed question has important implications for how we perceive the role of religion in our republic. Today there're two popular answers... "Absolutely!" and "Of course not!" Norte Dame History professor Mark David Hall, one of America's leading historians of religion says, "Both answers tend to distort the Founder's views." This engenders a second question, Was America founded as a Christian Nation? Today this is somewhat of a debatable question. By what measure is a nation called Christian? But maybe the first question should be, what would it mean for America to be a Judeo/Christian Nation? Since the Christian scripture contains the Jewish Torah, which are the first five books of the Old Testament, the application of Judeo/Christian to the question seems to be a valid addition. How this question is answered determines whether the answer is, Yes... or No. But before we answer this last question, let's look back in history to the founding of the very first English colonies in North America.

In May of **1607** a group of roughly **104** Englishmen founded the first permanent English settlement in North America. The colony was Jamestown and it was sponsored by the Virginia Company of London. They were investors who hoped to profit from the venture. The colony's religion was Church of England and some were also interested in the conversion of the local Native Tribes. This was the colony that Captain John Smith led, the same Captain Smith who was captured by the local Algonquian tribe and saved by the chief's favorite daughter, Pocahontas. Although, some historians cast doubt on whether Smith's life was really saved by her.

We all know the story of the Pilgrims. 102 passengers set sail in late August of 1620 aboard the Mayflower. They were a Puritan separatist's congregation who had rejected the Church of England and were coming to the New World to construct an ideal Christian society. The trip across the Atlantic took 64 days, nearly twice as many days as they had expected. During the voyage they faced many difficulties, uncooperative winds, rough seas and navigational problems. And the conditions in the ship interior were terrible. Passengers suffered from sea sickness, illness, very crowded quarters and smoke from cooking. On the top deck they suffered harassment from sailors. The November 1620 landing of the Mayflower was on the shore of Cape Cod. The weather was turning cold, so they relocated across the Bay to Plymouth Harbor. Miraculously in Plymouth, the Pilgrim men somehow came upon a suitable site that seemed especially prepared for these desperate new arrivals. The site had huge advantages for building fortifications, an area with cleared trees for growing crops and an abundant water supply. The Pilgrims were told that the location was once a thriving Patuxet Indian village wiped out by a European disease. They were also able to find large caches of buried dried corn on the site. The site had 20 acres that recently appeared to be used as a corn field. Against all odds, the Pilgrims found just the right spot to plant their new Godly commonwealth. They firmly believed that God had led them to the only place in the area that would allow them to survive the harsh New England winter. This was the first miracle the Pilgrims believed was all in God's plan. But during that first winter, the colonists suffered greatly from lack of shelter and diseases such as scurvy. Unfortunately, by spring, 45 out of 102 pilgrims had died during that first New England winter.
