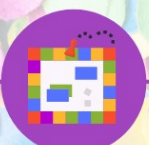

Security Amid Unpredictability

Our lives are ruled by unpredictability: is a kid going to get sent home from school because they have COVID symptoms? Am I going to catch COVID? And going back to October 2018, a question that we've all had to ask ourselves is, "Is it safe to go to Shabbat services?"

Pittsburgh. Poway. Colleyville. There's no way for us to know when and where the next incident will occur, so I thought that I would take this opportunity to share some details on what TBS has implemented over the past couple of years to keep our Temple family safe.

Thanks to the efforts of JewishColumbus's Jewish Community Relations Council and Howie Beigelman at Ohio Jewish Communities, TBS has been the beneficiary of over \$200,000 in security-related funding since 2017. The bulk of these funds came from Ohio Emergency Management Agency grant opportunities. TBS has implemented many building improvements that are clearly visible – cameras and improved lighting – and many that you cannot see. These "target hardening" (physical improvements to a building that make it more secure) updates have significantly bolstered the Temple building's capacity to keep all of us safe. However, the biggest deterrent will always be a live security presence, which TBS will always have whenever we are in the sanctuary or building for a major event (e.g. Purim carnival).

But, work remains, and this work should always be proactive instead of reactive. To that end, TBS is in the process of formally establishing a Security Committee, consisting of Temple members who have security/law enforcement backgrounds, and members who are passionate about the topic. This group will guide TBS staff, clergy, and leadership in the months ahead on the proper steps that we can take to learn from the events in Texas, and incorporate the takeaways into our practices and awareness as a Temple community.

Hopefully, we will eventually get back to a place where Jewish community security concerns are secondary. Until then, the mantra of, "If you see something, say something," is one of our most effective tools in keeping each other safe. On behalf of the entire leadership of TBS, we will always do everything that we can to keep our Temple community safe!

Miner-Romanoff Support Programs

Supporting Jewish Life (Needs-based)

Jewish life should be accessible to everyone. This area of funding will support individuals/families who need help with TBS dues, Religious School tuition, or other aspects of living Jewishly (e.g. indigent burial)

Camp Registration is coming up and the Miner-Romanoff Youth Subsidies can help!

Youth Experiences Subsidies (Needs-based)

Money shouldn't prevent families from providing incredible Jewish experiences for their children. This area of funding will help families with Jewish camping, NFTY trips, and other transformative youth experiences.

The Miner-Romanoff Micro-Grant Program

(Open to anyone with a great idea!)

This program will provide funding for new or ongoing social justice/action initiatives, including B'nai Mitzvah projects.

10 Presidential Address



Join The Community

As we enter the year 2022, we find ourselves caught between two worlds. One world hopes the COVID surge will eventually recede into our rear-view mirror, so that we can continue to return to a more fully in-person community. Our hopes stand juxtaposed against the recent hostage crisis in the Colleyville, Texas, synagogue, reminding us once again of the rise of anti-Semitism in our communities.

In the case of the latter, the frightening events in Colleyville re-emphasized the need, throughout Jewish communities across the country, for on-going, proactive vigilance and practices to ensure our safety. Recently, you received an email from us explaining actions that TBS's leadership is considering and taking to ensure our safety. TBS leadership is using all the tools available to us - including JewishColumbus and Secure Community Network resources -- to guide us in the days and weeks ahead. As noted historian and Emory University Professor Deborah Lipstadt reminded us in her recent New York Times op-ed, "It is not radical to say that going to services, whether to converse with God or with the neighbors you see only once a week, should not be an act of courage, and yet this weekend we were once again reminded that it can be precisely that." And she later writes that showing up at synagogue (and synagogue-sponsored events) in the face of rising anti-Semitism is absolutely critical. While we are anxious and not really okay, she reminds us that "resiliency is part of the Jewish DNA."

In this spirit of resiliency, and in the belief that we can get to better, we hope that you will continue to support all that makes TBS joyful, personal, and accessible. To that, please join for a springtime of wonderful, communal, and fun events:

Temple Beth Shalom Food Waste Composting Program



TBS has partnered with our neighbor All Saints Episcopal congregation to create a food waste drop-off point at TBS through GoZero Composting.

The bins are located behind TBS off the parking lot. All Saints and Temple Beth Shalom are utilizing these bins for the food waste generated at both facilities.

All Saints has around 30 households participating in the GoZero drop-off point behind TBS.

The TBS Green Team would like to provide the opportunity for TBS members to participate in the drop off program.

How Does The Program Work?

GoZero Composting charges for the pickup of the food waste based on the number of times the bins need emptied. The TBS Green Team has worked with All Saints to create the following program:

- ◆ Each TBS household that would like to participate in the program can sign up at tbsohio.org/green-team.html. The cost is \$75 annually, to be used for buckets, bags, and cost of pickup.
- ◆ The Green Team will drop off a bucket, certified compostable bags (approximately 48), and GoZero flyer to your house.
- ◆ Start filling your bucket with food waste.
- ◆ When your bucket is filled you can take it to the GoZero drop-off point behind TBS. Repeat as many times as necessary during the year. It's that easy.

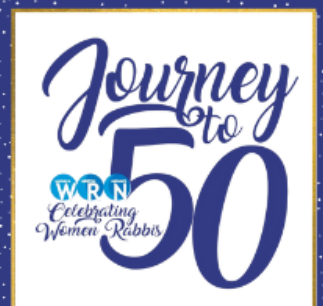

Scouts, Trailblazers, Pathfinders, Explorers: A History of Women Rabbis

2022 marks the 50th anniversary of the ordination of Sally J. Priesand, the first woman publicly ordained as a rabbi. Yet, her groundbreaking ordination, which opened the door for subsequent generations of women, was preceded by the impactful lives of other, lesser-known female scholars and community leaders. In this four-session adult education series developed by the Women's Rabbinic Network, we will spotlight a few of the significant women from the 1500's to the early modern period who held quasi-rabbinic status in their communities; compare and contrast the ordinations of Rabbis Sally Priesand and Regina Jonas (Who? Come find out!); explore the challenges faced by the first generation of women in the rabbinate; and reflect on how women's leadership has changed the rabbinate and the Jewish community as a whole.

Questions About Your Family Yahrzeits?



As the TBS Marketing Director, I am responsible for managing the Yahrzeit records for our congregants, sending out Yahrzeit reminders, and compiling the Mi Shebeirach, Sheloshim, and Yahrzeit lists. It is very important for me to honor the memory of each congregants' loved ones. In order for me to honor your yahrzeits correctly, I would like to share a bit about the options you have for your yahrzeit records.

You are able to observe your family yahrzeits on either the Hebrew or English date. As a congregation, we default to the English date of death to observe a yahrzeit, but I can easily change your preference to the Hebrew date equivalent if that is more meaningful to you. I can also adjust the week your loved one's name is read for Shabbat services. For example, if you are unable to attend services on a particular week, we are able to read their name on a different week. If you have any questions about yahrzeits, please do not hesitate to reach out to me, either by calling the office or by email. We also have a form on the TBS website to let you add a new yahrzeit or send in updated information at tbsohio.org/add-a-yahrzeit.html.

Additionally, if you are looking for a way to memorialize your loved ones in the TBS sanctuary, we do have memorial plaque options available.

Moral Resistance and Spiritual Authority: Our Jewish Obligation to Social Justice

Edited by Rabbi Seth M. Limmer, DHL and Rabbi Dov Pesner

The essays in this collection explore the spiritual underpinnings of our Jewish commitment to justice, using Jewish text and tradition, as well as contemporary sources and models. The accompanying discussion guide is intended to deepen one's engagement with the text itself, to examine one's own position in relation to the issues the text brings forth, and to help the reader take steps to put their learning into action.

Pirkei Avot: A Social Justice Commentary

By Rabbi Dr. Shmuly Yanklowitz

Pirkei Avot is the urtext of Jewish practical wisdom. In many ways, the words of Pirkei Avot were the first recorded manifesto of social justice and moral philosophy, engaging both classical commentators and modern thinkers. The accompanying discussion guide takes on something of a dual nature: it is useful both as a guide to reading Rabbi Yanklowitz's commentary as well as a guide to the primary text of Pirkei Avot itself.

The Fragile Dialogue: New Voices of Liberal Zionism

Edited by Rabbi Stanley M. Davids and Rabbi Lawrence A. Englander, DHL

The Jewish and Latter-day Saint have at times been at odds, yet share a number of significant historical and communal bonds. This volume provides a deeper understanding of the Jewish and Latter-day Saint traditions and how the two faith communities can engage in a meaningful dialogue. The accompanying discussion guide will foster a better understanding of the other and a growing sense of our identity; it was created to make conversations and deep encounters possible and to shed light on both the values and histories we share, as well as the theologies in which two communities differ.
