

An Easter of Acceptance

As a teenager I attended a fellowship that put music to certain verses of the King Jame Version of the Bible. One of those passages was Isaiah 55: "Ho, everyone that thirsteth, come ye to the waters, and he that hath no money; come ye, buy, and eat." It was a happy, upbeat tune that included a few additional verses from the chapter. And it was my March 23 sermon text.

As I read Isaiah 55 again for my sermon, verse 5 captured my attention, this time from the New Revised Standard Version: "The Lord your God, the Holy One of Israel...has glorified you.

"That's not the way we generally think of ourselves. We don't often look in the mirror and see someone who has been "glorified" by God. We're more likely to look in the mirror and see our faults and failures. It's part of our fallen, human nature. We're prone to self-condemnation. And the church doesn't help. Case in point is the famous 1741 sermon preached by Rev. Jonathan Edwards entitled, "Sinners in the Hands of an Angry God." That sermon was an important part of the First Great Revival which swept Great Britain and the Colonies in the 1730s and '40s. In fact, it was such an important sermon that it is still studied today.

In that hour-long message, Rev. Edwards went to great lengths to describe how God "abhors you," and how God's "wrath towards you burns like fire" as "you hang by a slender thread" over the fires of hell. It sounds like spiritual abuse. Thankfully, though, Rev. Edwards concluded his sermon with a message of hope and forgiveness. But that's not the part of his homily that people remember. Rather, that message of God's hatred toward humanity has been picked up by others so that it still haunts people today. Sadly, some conclude that God is angry with them and hates them. And those ideas become imbedded in their minds.

I would hope every school in America has a policy against bullying. And yet, none of those policies take into account that the biggest bully we face is ourselves. We beat ourselves up because we think God is against us, that God is out to get us.

As a young monk, Martin Luther engaged in self-flagellation and other extreme ascetic practices as a way to atone for his perceived sins. We may not beat ourselves up physically, but we beat ourselves up mentally. We need a heaping helping of Isaiah 55. In verse 8, God declares, "My thoughts are not your thoughts, neither are your ways my ways."

Once I've repented, God no longer condemns me, though I may still condemn myself. But thankfully, God doesn't think of me the way I think of myself. God's thoughts about me are different than my own thoughts about me. The message of Easter is a message of peace with God: Jesus suffered and died for our sins so we wouldn't have to die for our sins. He rose from the dead so we could rise from the dead. Once we make his Easter story our story, then we are forgiven, justified by God's grace.

In Romans 5:1, Paul wrote, "Since we have been justified through faith, we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ." When we have peace with God, there is no animosity between God and us. Rather, we have been adopted into the family of God.

In adopting us, God accepts us. Since God accepts us, then why don't we accept ourselves? The message of Easter is not message of God's hatred for humanity. Rather, it's a message of love, "For God so loved the world that he gave his only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth on him should not perish, but have everlasting life" (John 3:16).

Ash Wednesday is not the end of the story. Ash Wednesday does not stand alone. It always leads to Easter. One of the scriptures traditionally associated with Ash Wednesday is Joel 2, which is a call to prayer, fasting, and repentance. But it also points to hope: "Return to the Lord your God, for he is gracious and compassionate, slow to anger and abounding in love, and he relents from sending calamity. Who knows? He may turn and relent and leave behind a blessing" (Joel 2:13-14).

The promise is simple but sure: as long as we repent, God will relent. And when God relents, we are reconciled to God. If we are reconciled to God, surely we can be reconciled to ourselves within our own minds.

Connecting with the Word

"We exist to connect people to Jesus Christ," and one of the most important ways we connect to Christ is through the Word of God. The Revised Common Lectionary suggests readings each week from the Old Testament, the Psalms, the New Testament, and the Gospels. Those readings often frame each week's worship services and are listed here to help you prepare for Sunday.

Sunday, April 6: Isaiah 43:16-21; Psalm 126; Philippians 3:4-14; and John 12:1-2.

On Palm Sunday, April 13, our Chancel, Bell, and Children's Choirs will be presenting "Echoes of Easter" at the 10:30 service. Scriptures include Psalm 118:1-2, 19-29; Isaiah 50:4-9a; Philippians 2:5-11; Luke 19:28-40, and Luke 22:54-62.

Holy Thursday is April 17, and I will be presenting a service at 6 pm. Communion will be served. Scriptures include Exodus 12:1-14; Psalm 116; 1 Corinthians 11:23-26; and John 13:1-17, 31b-35.

Good Friday is on April 18, and there I will again be presenting a service at noon. Scriptures include Isaiah 52:13-53:12; Psalm 22; Hebrews 10:16-25; and John 18:1-19:42. Immediately following the service, you are invited to gather at the College Avenue entrance as we carry the cross to the courthouse and back.

Scriptures for Easter Sunday, April 20, include Acts 10:34-43; Psalm 118; 1 Corinthians 15:19-26; John 20:1-18; and Luke 24:1-12.

Scriptures for Sunday, April 27 include Acts 5:27-32; Psalm 150; Revelation 1:4-8 and John 20:19-31.

• 9:15 am, Palm Sunday, April 13: Sunday school for all ages. Nursery care provided. NO Rock and Worship this week only.



- We were blessed to host Shawna Bunnell on Sunday, March 9. Shawna serves as the Outreach and Church Relations Manager for Chaddock, located in Quincy. Despite everyone losing an hour's sleep the night before, your response was fantastic! You gave \$790 in our Connection Coins offering; our missions team added another \$60; and our general fund contributed its customary \$150 speaker's fee. That meant we were able to send \$1,000 to Chaddock. Fantastic!
- On Sunday, March 23, Pastor Dave mentioned our Loving Hands ministry, which is a ministry in which we partner with the Mercer County Health Department: we prepare food and they distribute it. Because of the unique nature of that ministry, Loving Hands is recognized as a Conference Advance Special. From time to time, other United Methodist Churches in our conference look for places where they might invest their mission money. As a result, in mid-March our Loving Hands ministry received \$500 from Christ United Methodist Church in East Moline. That is our United Methodist connectional system at work!

If you have not received a bucket, you can still participate by writing a check payable to the AUMC.
