After our leaf hunt, students had a leaf investigation. In Social Studies and Religion, we talked about thanksgiving and what giving thanks means. Students were then able to write what they were thankful for along with a pie craft.

In December, we are looking forward to all the Christmas festivities! In our classroom, we will be focusing on sharing kindness. We have a Christmas tree in our classroom that is used as a kindness tree. Any time I catch a student showing kindness to another peer or teacher, they add an ornament to the tree! During this upcoming month, we will be learning about Advent and what each candle represents.



First Grade News



November was a quick but fruitful month for first grade! From learning new long vowel sounds to many addition strategies, we have been super busy. We also started a collaboration with fifth grade called "reading buddies." Fifth grade comes into our classroom to help first grade do some activities and read to each other. Our reading buddies have been such a great help and awesome role models for the first grade. With all of our Thanksgiving festivities, time has flown by.

In December, we are continuing to learn new sounds such as the long o, u, and e. We also are learning to build and read contractions. First grade has also started a Reading Goal Challenge! This month we are trying to read uninterrupted for 5 minutes each day with a focus in decoding tricky words. In math, we are going to be learning about subtraction and new strategies to help us solve subtraction equations. Also, this month we will be learning about Advent and the importance of Christmas. We have our room decorated with our advent wreath and our Elf on the Shelf. Our elf, Candy Cane, will be helping first grade be on our best behavior. We are all excited for the Christmas festivities that are coming up in the next few weeks, such as our STEAM day and our trip to see the Nutcracker ballet.

Second Grade News



November had a great start by going to mass on All Saints Day. We celebrated the Saints with a special project and visits from the upper grades sharing Saint history with us. During this month, we have been busy in all subject areas.

In *Religion*, we learned about the seasons of the church year. Being in ordinary time and as we approach the Advent season, we are followers of Jesus. Additionally, we discussed living in faith and expressing gratitude for our blessings.

In Language and Literacy, we had lessons about distinguishing between realism and fantasy literature. The class has practiced paragraph structure with main ideas and supporting details along with reading comprehension. As we read in our reading groups, we are improving our fluency in reading. We continue to work on grammar skills such as sentence structure and use of proper nouns.

For *Math*, in chapter 2, we learned about place value, number words, rounding to the nearest ten, and comparing.

In Science, we explored bats around the world including their behavior and habitat. In correlation with our readings, we learned types of natural disasters and their causes. For Social Studies, our class discussed the importance of teamwork and working together. We learned about veterans for Veterans Day. For Thanksgiving, we have learned about pilgrims, Native Americans, and thanksgiving traditions around the world. We talked about the Mayflower voyage, clothing, foods, and more then made a comparison of children then and today. As a class, we enjoyed authentic native american flute music and saw hoop dancing.

Ending the month with our special Thanksgiving feast, the class made turkey hats and placemats to use as they shared a meal together. Thank you for your contributions to make this feast possible.

Next month, we will be preparing for the birth of Jesus during Advent with Christmas fun.

We learned about the history of the Macy's Day Parade! The students were eager to learn new facts each day about the parade. Did you know the first Macy's Day "balloon" was actually a marionette? After they became Macy's Day Parade masters, we made our own balloons and had our own parade! Fifth grade did an amazing job with this project and I was very proud of them!

In math we have been working on multiplication. Three digit by one digit multiplication was a breeze! Now we are onto two digit by two-digit multiplication. We can't wait to begin this new challenge!

Cells, mitochondria, chloroplasts and much more! We are onto chapter 2 in science where we will be learning about cells, tissues, and organs. This is a very interesting chapter and we can't wait to see how our body works!

In social studies we have begun Chapter two as well. In this chapter we will be learning about who the first Americans were and how they lived. We will be comparing how the first Americans lived to how we live now.

November was fun and fast! We are thankful for our families, school and church. Now we are ready for December and all of the fun and learning that it will bring!

Middle School News



Middle School Math

6th The sixth-grade class are gearing up for their midterms as they finish up the last chapter before their big test. The mid-terms will consist of their first four chapter and the last on word problems. Going over all concepts in each chapter and the skill of reading comprehension through the word problems. Read comprehension becomes important through high school and during standardized tests so it is definitely important the kids to master.

7th & 8th The 7th and 8th graders have been within one class but at different paces. We have been able to learn the same topics so far throughout first quarter. For the second quarter we

have split the lessons and have had alternate days. One day is for 7th and one day for 8th. This has worked effectively so that during the day in which the lesson for their grade is not taught they are taking notes and applying their new found knowledge on their class work. Learn and Apply! We repeat this method and then take our exams to test what is retained then review and move on. We've been able to cover so much ground and the students have reacted well to this.

Grade 6 Science: The students learned the different aspects of animal and plant cells. They researched the functions of all components of the cells and had fun illustrating and labeling each cell. A job well done.

Grade 6 Religion: The students read the stories of Cain and Abel, Noah, and the tower of Babel. All stories dealt with turning away from God. We realize, though, that God's forgiveness and love can overcome evil.

Grade 6 Social Studies: We have been discovering the history of Ancient India. Students have been learning about the geography, culture and religion of this Asian subcontinent while also making comparisons between this ancient culture and the other ancient cultures we have studied so far this year. Students learned about the city planning of Mohenjo Daro, the conquest of the Aryans, and the records kept in the Vedas. Students also learned about Hinduism and Buddhism, Next, students will be learning about Ancient China. Our chapter test on India will be sometime before Christmas Break.

Grade 6 Literature: We have continued reading Jennifer Nielsen's "The False Prince". Some strengths we have been building on are making

predictions and comparing characters. Ask your learner who they think will be chosen as the Prince.

Grade 7 Social Studies: We have been looking at the European colonization of North America. We looked at the reasons for the development of the New England Colonies, the Middle Colonies, and the Southern Colonies. We looked at the "push" factors that led many to migrate to the New World, such as religious freedom, trial by jury, and representative assemblies. We also have learned about the differences between Charter Colonies, Royal Colonies, and Proprietary Colonies. Ask your learner to explain the differences between the colonies.

Grade 7 Literature: Students have been reading Elizabeth George Speare's "The Witch of Blackbird Pond", set in colonial New England. We have been tracing many connections between the literature text and our social studies content as we discuss the persecution of the Quakers, the colonization of the Caribbean and New England, and the different social roles of men and women in the seventeenth century.

Grade 8 Social Studies: Students are now learning about the many reform movements of the nineteenth century as well as the emergence of an American literary identity. Students studied the Second Great Awakening and the domino effect the religious revivals had on the development of benevolent societies and charitable associations. Students also have been introduced to various American authors as we discussed the development of purely American literature.

Grade 8 Literature: We continue to read Louisa May Alcott's "Little Women". We are coming to the end of Part One, and will be watching episode one of the PBS television series to compare how they envisioned

the characters and conflict versus how the show producers envisioned them. Students have been doing daily writing prompts in conjunction with their reading as this book encourages them to do a lot of self-reflection. It also serves as a primary source for our studies on the nineteenth century.

Grade 7 & 8 Religion

Emphasis has been on Jesus' New Commandment to love one another. We recently took our chapter 3 test and will be moving on to chapter 4. Students will also be learning about the special season of Advent as they are encouraged to prepare their hearts for the coming of Jesus this Christmas.

Grades 6,7,8 Skills

This month the middle school grammar classes focused on verbs: action verbs, those with or without a direct object, linking verbs with subject complements, and main verbs with helping verbs. It was a challenge to distinguish the difference between direct objects and subject complements.

Grades 7 & 8 Science

The students had practice using a three-beam scale to measure mass of an object and a graduated cylinder to measure its volume. They used that information to calculate the object's density. Also, we focused on the element of oxygen. The students researched the element and presented their information in various ways,i.e., a mystery clue with an illustration, a 3D model, a logo or symbol, a poem, or an essay from internet research.

Physical Education



The year seems to be flying by. I hope everyone had an amazing Thanksgiving. We continue to be busy in the gym working on all of our skills in the lower grades. The students in Pre-k-2 are really focusing on hand eye coordination along with perfecting our locomotor skills.

Grades 3-8 just finished up Gaga ball and some fun Thanksgiving themed games which worked on throwing accuracy. In the coming weeks we will be starting to work on some floor hockey skills and end the unit with some gameplay.

The students continue to make progress with their muscular strength and endurance. Grades 3-8 have just finished up fitness testing where they had to perform as many sit ups as they could do in one minute and as many proper form push ups they could do until they could not do anymore. The first round of fitness testing went very well and the students are eager to beat their first round scores when we test again at the end of February.

Library & Computer Classes



Some exciting news to share! We have begun our hybrid classes this month! Grades 1-8 alternate each week between being in the library and the computer lab. This is providing some

much needed exposure to computer skills as well as keeping things fresh and exciting during library class.

Computer Class

1st, 2nd & 3rd grade began their computer class lessons by practicing logging in and out of their school Google computers and navigating basic computer functions. 4th, 5th and 6th graders have been working on developing muscle memory in their first typing course. These courses are meant to build base level skills that we can build on easily in the future.

Library Class

In the younger grades, students learned some pretty silly turkey and Thanksgiving Songs in class! We read stories including "No Turkey for Thanksgiving" by Jacqueline Jules where we learned that every family is diverse and may celebrate Thanksgiving with all sorts of different foods! We also read "Who Will Carve the Turkey this Thanksgiving?" by Jerry Pallota where we discussed that even though many animals are capable of doing the job, only a grown up should be in charge of that task!

In 4th and 5th grade library class, we continued reading "James and the Giant Peach" by Roald Dahl and with 6th grade "The Lion, the Witch and the Wardrobe" by C.S. Lewis. I hope to finish these books by Christmas Break!

Middle school grades have begun their Digital Citizenship Courses which is a perfect crossover between computer and library. This course begins by establishing a base knowledge of how to use a computer and then covers topics such as cyber bullying, recognizing safe websites, and navigating online communication. All skills that are very relevant in today's tech forward world.

Bookworm Club has been growing each week! The Bookworm is a club for students in grades 4 - 8 who love reading or are looking to strengthen their reading skills in a group setting. We are currently reading books from the 2023 RICBA Nominee list.

A friendly reminder that students in grades K - 8 have begun checking out books from the library. Students are allowed to check out 1 book at a time and must return the book before checking out another.
