

MONTHLY MEETING-APRIL

On April 19, eighteen Broomfield Spellbinders, one guest (Vicki Tiedeman's sister Deb) and two visitors from other Spellbinders groups (Betsy Crosby from Boulder and Deborah Crabbe from St. Vrain Valley Storytellers) gathered at Brunner Farmhouse for our monthly meeting. Julie Toepper was out of town, so **Tiffany Painter** opened the meeting with the question: "What is your favorite season?" Spring and Fall were favored over Winter and Summer. Janis Lievens shared available storytelling opportunities, including two outdoor opportunities in August and expressed her disappointment that so few people signed up. Tiffany reminded everyone that the survey about plans for next year is still awaiting a response from some of us and that Julie is also sending surveys to teachers in whose classrooms we have told this year. Sheila Brush reported that she had shared a story with group of small business owners [see page 2]. Kathy Daniels gave a library update and recommended five books--American Indian Myths and Legends, Best of Heroic Stories, Wiltshire Folk Tales, American Fairy Tales (by L. Frank Baum), and Three-Minute Tales from Around the World (by Margaret Read McDonald).

We agreed that the Spellbinders Annual Meeting had been a great success. Sherry Potter and several others reported that the workshop about Neuroscience was fascinating. Sandy Hopper praised Kathy Babb's presentation on "Participation and Props" (even though Kathy was a last-minute substitution) and suggested that we invite her to present at one of our meetings. Denny reported that Mitch Krayton's workshop on improving presentation skills was great. Several members found Wynn Montgomery's presentation on "Making A Story Your Own" to be enlightening. We also learned that two of our members (Janis Lievens and Ed Winograd) have agreed to serve on Spellbinders Board of Trustees. Janis shared the story, "Brer Tiger and the Big Wind," and Jan Osburn told "The Fairy's Gift," changing the fairy to a leprechaun. USING POETRY TO ENHANCE YOUR STORYTELLING

This was the focus of the presentation by Deborah Crabbe (at right), a St. Vrain Valley Storyteller. She likes to tell her young listeners: "Roses are red; pickles are green; you are the finest kids I have ever seen." She discussed why poetry is important and reasons for memorizing poetry. She demonstrated how to use poetry in storytelling, noting that some stories (like "The Night Before Christmas") are poems, and recited a funny poem/story ("The Dentist and the Crocodile" by Roald Dahl) and also



recommended Shel Silverstein's poems. She closed her session with a fractured version of "Beauty and the Beast," which she had adapted from *Fractured Fairy Tales* by A.J. Jacobs.
