4 High Holy Day Guide

We hope you have read the emails with our big changes to our High Holy Day observance at TBS, that we will be doing services together drive-in style in the parking lot and online rather than in-person in our Sanctuary. While we are all preparing for these High Holy Days, there are a number of important items to note.

Do I Need To RSVP?

RSVPs are not required this year, however, it will help us to have an idea of how many people and cars to expect. If you have already signed up to attend a drive-in service, no need to change your registration. If you are planning to participate in services from home and previously signed up to be in person, or wish to sign up for different services, please email Amanda Cohen at acohen@tbsohio.org and let her know.

Timing

The parking lot for each drive-in service will open half an hour before the service begins. Many services will be happening back to back during Rosh HaShanah and Yom Kippur so please be patient as one service clears out before parking for the next one begins. We have allocated enough time between services that this shouldn't be an issue!

Where do I Park?

When you get here to the Temple, you will be greeted at the circle near the front door. You'll receive a machzor (prayer book) to use during services and any other pertinent flyers or items for the upcoming service. You'll then be guided to a parking spot. You'll notice we are parking against the regular lines of our lot, so make sure to follow the guidance of the ushers.

Where do I sit?

You are welcome to sit comfortably in your car or you may bring folding chairs and sit outside of your car. When you check-in we will let you know on which side of your car to set up chairs. Please plan to wear a mask whenever you are out of the car.

How Will I Hear the Service?

We have a great and loud sound system, so you'll be able to hear the service from in and around your car. In case you want even better sound, you can turn on your radio to FM 94.5 (which we are calling WTBS).

Morning Family Services at Rose Run Church Parking Lot

You may have noticed that on Rosh HaShanah morning and Yom Kippur morning at 9:15 there is a family service happening at the same time as the traditional service. The family service will take place across the street from the Temple at Rose Run Presbyterian Church (5220 Johnstown Road, New Albany) (click to view map). The church is directly across the street from Oakland Nursery.

Borrowing a Machzor (High Holy Day Prayer Book)

For those people attending drive-in services, we will have a Mishkan Hanefesh machzor for you to use while you're here, and then we will collect it following the service. If you are planning on participating in services from home, you may borrow a prayer book. Check the eWindow for a link to sign up to borrow a prayer book. The book's publisher, the CCAR press, is allowing free use of an online flipbook version of Mishkan Hanefesh during this season. Click this link, then scroll down to click on either the Gold Rosh HaShanah volume, or the Silver Yom Kippur volume. https://www.ccarnet.org/publications/hhd-2021/

What Should I Wear?

During this High Holy Day season, we are going for comfort over style. Please check the weather and plan accordingly. No clothing judgment here! You may have seen in the earlier email that you can wear shorts to the High Holy Days - very exciting!

What if it Rains?

The Temple staff and leadership are watching the weather closely for these High Holy Days. As we have all learned, there is a lot that's out of our control these days, weather included. If there is inclement weather, we will broadcast services from the Sanctuary so people can watch from home. We will communicate via email and Facebook should the weather change our plans.

Streaming Services

As we have been doing for many years, we will be streaming many of our High Holy Day services live at their appointed times. As always, you can find services by going to the TBS Facebook Page, the TBS Youtube Page, and the TBS Website. The two morning Family Services that are taking place off-campus will be streamed via Zoom.

There is more information below on the High Holy Day services in the next pages. If you have any questions or tech issues, feel free to reach out to the Temple office and we will help!

How Do I Attend High Holy Day Services?

Outdoor Services

In order to run all of our services outside, we have reworked the Rosh HaShanah and Yom Kippur service times. Please see the new service times in the accompanying graphic.

Outdoor services will take place in the TBS parking lot, Rose Run Presbyterian Church's parking lot, or the TBS Outdoor sanctuary and will be drive-in style. You may bring chairs to sit outside your vehicle, but masks are required if you choose to do so.

In the event of inclement weather, services will be streamed online at their appointed times.

The Shofar Calls - Something Is Asked of Me

Over and above personal problems, there is an objective challenge to overcome inequity, injustice, " helplessness, suffering, carelessness, oppression. Over and above the din of desires there is a calling, a demanding, a waiting, an expectation. There is a question that follows me wherever I turn. What is expected of me? What is demanded of me?

What we encounter is not only flowers and stars, mountains and walls. Over and above all things is a sublime expectation, a waiting for. With every child born a new expectation enters the world.

This is the most important experience in the life of every human being: something is asked of me. Every human being has had a moment in which he senses a mysterious waiting for him. Meaning is found in responding to the demand, meaning is found in sensing the demand.

- Rabbi Abraham Joshua Heschel

As I write this article, we are in the tenth day of the month of Elul. Elul is the month that leads us up to the High Holy Days, the month in which we are reminded every day to start to slow down and turn our focus inward. What am I proud of from this past year? What have been my successes? How have I treated people this past year? What kindnesses did I bestow upon others? What was asked of me and how did I respond? We also ask ourselves the tougher questions. Where did I miss the mark this year? Where did I fall short of my goals? Whom did I hurt this past year? What actions do I regret?

Perhaps you've noticed that we have been going online each day to sound the shofar. It's a mitzvah during this month to hear the call of the shofar as it reminds us to wake up to start examining ourselves, to think more deeply about our lives and the choices we have made. If we have slept through a chunk of our lives, if we have dropped the call, perhaps we have truly missed the mark. But as we are reminded over and over again throughout the season, we can turn back. We can try again. We can make the mark. We can answer the call.

For me, the sound of the shofar also brings a certain familiarity with it. While the sound is supposed to be jarring, hearing its unique tone can also transport some of us back to another time. As you've likely heard me discuss before, my family was not very observant in our Judaism when I was a kid. But we would always make it to Temple on the High Holy Days, and hearing the call of the shofar reminds me of sitting in our huge sanctuary and anticipating the last shofar call of the service when the person sounding the shofar would hold the note as long as he or she could. To be honest, I don't remember a lot about High Holy Day services as a child, but I do remember the sound of that shofar. I remember delighting in hearing its sound, and seeing just how long the note would last before the *ba'al tikiyah* (shofar sounder) would start turning red.

Isn't it strange that the sound that is supposed to stir us to change is also in some way a comforting reminder of the past? In many ways, our Jewish holidays this time of year have that certain duality to them. During these holidays we are supposed to start the hard work of introspection, searching our past year to see where we've fallen short. That waiting. That expectation. But the holidays also fill us with warmth and joy when we share meals with family and friends, when perhaps we lovingly remember family members who are no longer with us, when we picture a version of ourselves at our best.

As we approach the High Holy Day season this year, we know that it is going to feel much different than it usually does. When we first began planning our High Holy Day season back in Spring, we planned for what felt like a joyously "normal" season. At the time we were moving away from wearing masks in the Sanctuary, COVID cases were very low in our state, and it felt like we were emerging from the darkness. But as we all know, in the middle of July we started to see a reversal, with the super-contagious Delta variant spreading even among vaccinated people. We saw a number of these cases in the Jewish community here in Columbus and in our congregational family. So our board, with input from our COVID -19 Task Force, decided that as of this writing we will have two options for services: drive-in services outside, and streaming of all services so people can experience the holidays from home. While we all wish desperately that we could get back to normal (we miss you June) and celebrate the holidays in a packed Sanctuary, we know that for one more year, things will be a bit strange. While there are a lot of creative and interesting ways that we will connect to one another in 5782, we must also acknowledge the sense of loss that so many of us will feel as we observe these holy days this way. We must allow ourselves to mourn not just for this season, but for all the darkness, suffering, and isolation that this pandemic has brought.

While we should let ourselves mourn, we also should rejoice that there will be many opportunities during this season for connection, meaning, and closeness. Our drive-in services will be supplemented by video presentations by the Sharyonim choir, as well as video Torah readings and honors, helping us to reduce the number of people on the bima. Services will be meaningful and connective, even if we are mostly participating from our cars. We are lucky to have a wonderful set up for this, including a giant outdoor Bima, a great sound system, and plenty of space. And for those who choose to participate from home, we will be livestreaming many of our services to Facebook, YouTube, and our website. Services will be shorter than in most years, and if you're in your car or at home, no reason to have to dress up! Instead of a kiddush luncheon, we will be giving out boxed lunches from Scotty's for folks to take home.

The High Holy Days of 5782 will certainly be memorable. Let's spend some time mourning our losses, but also spend time celebrating the creative ways in which we can still safely engage. And most of all, we will maintain hope. The sound of the shofar might stir us to action, it might bring us back to meaningful times in the past, and, God willing, it will always remind us to have hope. The shofar is our people's beacon for hope. Its sound reminds us that we can change, that there is a future that can be different from our past and present. This hope has sustained our people in the past. May we continue to be sustained by hope of a better future.

16 TBS Green Team

I recently read a short article on the Hazon Seal for Sustainability site that got me thinking about the TBS Green Team and the vision of the team. The article is posted on the Green Team Facebook page if you would like to read the short article. There were three points that, for me are impactful.

- * "Now more than ever, we must stand up and asses the role that our actions play in creating the world we live in. We are called to make a change, to create a healthier and more sustainable world for all."
- ✤ It reminds us that the practice of "Teshuva" is the practice of turning inward and reflecting on our transgressions.
- ☆ "... acknowledging that what was done in the past does not have to be repeated in our future."

In the past, like most of you, I have used this time of year to reflect on my interactions with friends, family, and associates, acknowledge my transgressions and prepare myself for the coming year to be a better person. This is still important, but I challenge you to take the time to reflect on your transgressions against the environment. In both cases, "Teshuva is the time to face our actions and create a new path forward". Like making changes in our relationship with others, making changes with our interaction with the environment will take commitment and some work on our part.

An easy way to make a change is to join a composting organization for your food scraps. The TBS Green Team recently posted on our Facebook page, how to get involved with curbside composting in New Albany and Bexley. If you are in a community that does not offer curbside composting, there are several farmer's markets as well as Whole Foods (Easton) that offer drop off composting through organizations like Compost-It. There is a small membership fee for Compost-It.

I will end with this final note from Native American medicine man and writer Lame Deer wrote in *Seeker of Visions* (John Fire, Lame Deer, and Richard Erodes, Lame Deer, Seeker of Visions):

"We must try to use the pipe for mankind, which is on the road to self-destruction... This can be done only if all of us ..., can again see ourselves as part of the earth, not as an enemy from outside who tries to impose its will on it. Because we ... also know that being a living part of earth, we cannot harm any part of her (earth) without hurting ourselves."

TBS is a member congregation of BREAD, and together with 40 other congregations in Franklin County, we can "DO Justice" and take action to shape Columbus into the city that we want it to be. Our TBS Rodef Tzedek Justice Ministry has recently helped BREAD win some significant victories. BREAD got the city to invest nearly half a million dollars to partner with a national expert to work with Columbus agencies over the next year using proven strategies to reduce violence and murder. BREAD also successfully advocated for the Franklin County Commissioners to approve \$6.5 million for affordable housing to help at least 200 families per year access safe, decent housing.

This year, BREAD will be working on an issue related to the impacts of environmental injustice on our health and climate. Race is one of the most significant predictors of a person living near toxic air, water or soil and some community problems are invisible. We don't see what is in the water we are drinking or know why our electric bills are increasing. These problems are hurting our community, especially our Black and Brown communities.

The TBS Rodef Tzedek Justice Ministry will meet in October to discuss our community concerns. The date and time will be announced in the eWindow so watch for that. Our annual BREAD campaign will begin soon and we hope that you will support the efforts of BREAD to improve our local community.
