CURRENT AFFAIRS & RESOLUTIONS Susan Webster: susanj-webster@sky.com Every month seems to have days earmarked for something, whether that something touches the lives of many or seems frivolous or trivial to the majority. Since our last newsletter dropped into our inboxes in April, we have passed through World Health Day and World Blood Cancer Day, with the more recent World Oceans Day on the 8th of June.

It has been mentioned here before that My WI has its own Campaigns Calendar and, although April's Asparagus Day (23rd like St George as it marks the start of the asparagus season apparently) and May 2nd's World Tuna Day don't feature on this, the calendar does highlight those days with links to WI Resolutions over the years.

World Oceans Day is shown as having ties to the very successful Plastic Soup campaign which received overwhelming support at the 2017 NFWI Annual Meeting, and which more recently (November last year) saw Alberto Costa MP introducing a Ten Minute Rule Bill in the House of Commons in which he advocated for mandatory filters in new washing machines, as a crucial step in tackling microplastic pollution. He even mentioned the WI in his presentation! Granted, a good seven years have passed since the adoption of our resolution, but there is clearly a process to be followed which cannot be sidestepped. It is easy to think that resolutions are swept under the carpet after the Annual Meeting, but this is not the case. As a group, the WI and other organisations with whom we work in collaboration (the Climate Coalition, Friends of the Earth, for example) raise public awareness of issues that affect many people in a bid to bring about change and improvement. It can be a time-consuming and frustrating process, but hopefully a fruitful one.

Regarding Resolutions, thank you to the WIs who have returned their requests for more information on past and current Resolutions, amongst which Plastic Soup was mentioned.

Following members' generous donations last year for the Women's Refuge, the Team has decided to ask for donations of period products this year. Items can be taken to International Day on 19th July and thereafter WIs can deposit them at our new premises until the end of September. The products can then be shared out across our region either to the Refuges or to other local places where there is a need.

Any period products will be very gratefully received, but you may be interested to know that 85% of women prefer external products to those worn internally. Refuges apparently have a preference for night time pads, and the use of menstrual cups is also increasing. Plastic free products are also available, but these are expensive. There is a rising number of reusable period underwear on the market, although of course this too is expensive. A tip from a canny shopper is to check the lower shelves on the display, avoiding those at eye level if you are looking for a bargain or a lower price. Not forgetting, too, that supermarket brand products are produced in exactly the same way as other branded products and can often be a cheaper substitute.

Whatever your product of choice, all donations will be most gratefully received. Thank you in anticipation of your generous support for women and girls.

Finally, with regard to days on the calendar, a final request to support this year's International Day – Japan – on Saturday 19^{th} July. See you there.

BARNSLEY OPALS WI

Wow! What a May meeting!

Barnsley Opals welcomed 40 members and visitors to our session with the wonderful gourmet chocolatiers Jo and Tony from Chocolates by Design. Jo and Tony make the most spectacular handmade and handpainted chocolates.

Jo told us all about how she got into making chocolate and how it went from a side hustle to her main business. In the run up to Christmas Jo and Tony were making 2000 chocolates a day! They even moved house to one where they could have a dedicated chocolate kitchen.

Jo's passion is the flavour and the design of the chocolates. New flavours take months to be developed and go through chocolate tester panels (where can we sign up!) for honest feedback. They love to mix fruit flavours with more unusual ones, often something savoury (including cheese for a French cheese producer).

Members enjoyed a taste test of high street chocolate versus the chocolate couverture (chocolate buttons that chocolatiers melt to make their products), the difference was huge! Dairy Milk now only contains 23% cocoa solids, to be classed as chocolate in the EU it needs to meet 25%. So Dairy Milk can no longer be sold as chocolate. Jo and TonY only use the best quality chocolate and ingredients, they are passionate about sustainability. Their chocolate is sourced from Casa Luker in Colombia a business that invests in the local community and economy.

The highlight of the evening was Jo and Tony guiding members through tasting their wonderful handmade chocolates, we got to sample creme brûlée, raspberry, lilac and lychee and lemon thyme. All their chocolates are gluten free and suitable for coeliacs, they also offer a range of vegan chocolates too.


WOODSETTS WI
