

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE



The purpose of this message will be to summarize what I said in my brief acceptance speech at our lovely Milwaukee AGM. (See Eugene's summary on page 15, and thanks again to the committee for a wonderful event, start to finish.)

In my opinion there are only two basic models of leadership in

a country like the United States of America. I will call them the Command Model and the Democratic Model. The Command Model is characteristic, for example, of hierarchical religious organizations, the corporate world, governmental agencies, and the military. In the Command Model, the leader is appointed from above, and he/she answers to the authority that appointed him/her. The leader is responsible for using the members' talents and abilities to the best advantage of the organization, has a moral/ethical responsibility not to ignore the well-being of the membership, but is not answerable to the membership. On the other hand, in the Democratic Model the leader is elected by the membership and is responsible both for and to the membership.

As president, I am, and will remain, very aware that I am responsible to the membership. I am, and will remain, very available – responding in a timely and thoughtful manner to all

A MACLEOD LAMENTS...

2015 may go down for me as a year in which a number of things looked promising, but somehow went terribly wrong.

I'm not referring simply to my usual "the dog ate my homework" series of woes that have delayed this newsletter. However, this time they included very unique events like having to leave Scotland suddenly because immigration policies have changed and my volunteer work there now requires a visa (it is in the works), and I seriously injured both of my hands. (The left one got trapped in a nasty industrial gate on Bute, and the right one fell victim to some dangerously dull kitchen knives on Cape Cod.)

Those events took place late September and October, but my misadventures really began in June. I probably took the most complicated route possible from Boston to our AGM in Milwaukee, courtesy of the ground staff at Southwest Airlines. Without getting into the blow-by-blow, I'll just say that my luggage went via Atlanta (without me), and I flew only as far as Chicago, where I had to rent a car. I then drove it to the Milwaukee airport and waited patiently for my luggage to arrive from Georgia.

Then, after the AGM - WHICH WAS AWESOME (see page 15) - I took on the assignment of driving a U-Haul full of MacLeod geneology books from the home of the outgoing ACMS Business Manager, Bill McLeod in Victoria, Texas, to the home of the incoming ACMS Business Manager (our own Pacific RVP) Tammie Vawter in Fresno, California. This should have been a pleasant trip, staying with family and friends along the way, but I managed to make it more difficult.

The first day on the road, I decided to drive non-stop from Victoria to Phoenix, Arizona. Weeden had wisely advised me to stay with him and Rosalie in Las Cruces, a sensible half-way point, but I kept going. After piloting the ten foot panel truck 1,100 miles in 18 hours, I stumbled into the home of my friends in Phoenix. By then, I was hallucinating. And I think the only reason why I didn't run out of gas on the highway was because Arizona is on Pacific time, and observations and queries. I already have taken some actions and participated in the initiation of a committee. Any action I take and any committee or program I authorize between Council meetings will be an <u>interim</u> action, <u>interim</u> committee, or <u>interim</u> program, until confirmed by Council. When confirmed by council, the actions, committees, or programs will become creatures of Council (as, in a sense, I as president also am). As president, I work for Council and the membership. I will communicate. I will travel and visit, to the extent that health, time, and finances permit. So far this year, on behalf of CMSUSA I have visited Albuquerque, Milwaukee, and San Diego. During the remainder of the year, I intend to visit Hamilton, Montana; Charleston, South Carolina; McPherson, Kansas; Murray, Kentucky; Salado, Texas; and Alexandria, Virginia.

Finally, there are members of CMSUSA who are older as members than I, and members who are older in chronological age than I, but I am very old in chronological age to be assuming the presidency. I shall be only a fraction of a year from my eightieth birthday when I finish this tour of duty. So there undoubtedly will be times I need help. I have full confidence that I shall receive the help I need when I need it.

Chief John of the MacLeods of Raasay, guest of honor at Charleston Games

The 2015 Charleston Games was the culmination of 2 years work preparing for the Chief's visit and supporting the recognition of Clan MacLeod as the honored clan at this important gathering. At this point I want to thank the following people who assisted me most during Chief John's visit – First Chief John Macleod of Raasay whose attendance made all this happen, then Karen, Cecil and Doug McLeod, John W. and Ann McLeod, Ron Hays President of the Charleston Scottish Society, Bill and Maureen McDaniel Scottish Society of Charleston, Karolea Lucas Scottish Society of Charleston, Tim and Marianne O'Loane and the many members of Clan MacLeod who attended the Games. The Games had asked that we be the Honored Clan with the Honored Guest for the 2014 Games Season. I declined this request but said I would plan for the 2015 Games. The first task was to fill the Honored Guest needs. In 2014 at Parliament I asked Chief John of Raasay to be the Honored Guest. He accepted and the work began to get him here. There was constant communications between Chief John, the Scottish Society of Charleston, members of Clan MacLeod and myself.

On September 16th 2015 all the hard work came to fruition with the arrival of Chief John of Raasay at the Charleston International Airport. Chief John said that his travel time was 34 hours from Hobart, Tasmania to Charleston, South Carolina. I told Chief John that little was planned for Thursday so that he could begin adjusting. Thursday we had a lunch meeting with the President of the Scottish Society of Charleston to review details associated with Chief John's stay. Later that evening Chief John attended the Whiskey Tasting, which he enjoyed. One of the Whiskeys presented was Highland Park which the Chief expressed as his favorite.

Friday, we took Chief John out to the Games field at Boone Hall Plantation. While we were unloading and arranging at the tent he was out viewing the plantation. That afternoon Chief John was guest of the President of the Citadel for a special ceremony "returning of a sword" from the Canadian Government and then the "Parade" of the Cadets. It was an impressive event. Doug McLeod, a former cadet at the Citadel was there to answer any questions Chief John might have. There were also members of the Citadel administration and members of Clan MacLeod. The last event on Friday was the Sponsors Reception and Tartan Ball. With all the pomp and ceremony of the event the Chief and dignitaries were piped in. Unfortunately for Chief John he spent much time meeting and greeting people and didn't get to the food until it was nearly all consumed. I understand that there was many a lady that was disappointed by not being able to dance with the Chief.

Saturday out to the Games Field and finish setting up the tent. Shortly after I arrived many others began to arrive. Soon there were many MacLeod's at the tent to meet and greet each other and Chief John. The Games Day weather was typical of Charleston – hot and humid but there was a breeze and it was partly cloudy. For me the day was a blur. So much was going on at one time – setting up the work table at the tent, getting banners and flag out, setting up the food and drink tables, putting chairs out, answering questions – thank goodness there were others helping. And then the people came. I will not try and name names since it would fill up a page. Let it be said that the MacLeod's had a large contingency of people. I will note that members of the MacAskill Society visited the tent. They were having their annual gathering this same weekend in Charleston.

For the parade of Tartans Chief John wanted to march with the members. Unfortunately as Honored Guest he had to view the clans as they passed in review, speak a few words and then announce the opening of the Games. After the Parade of Tartans, Ron Hayes took Chief John about to visit the other clan tents. He was gone most of the afternoon. There was a brief time when he returned to the MacLeod tent and was given food and water before being whisked off by Ron Hayes again. Finally toward the end of the day Chief John made it to the tent to stay. At the end of the Games the plan was to stay on the field and allow members to meet Chief John at a more personal level. Fortunately for me everyone was ready to leave. A group of us, including the Chief went to dinner and then turned in for an early ending of the day.

Sunday was another busy day for the Chief. First there was the church service at First (Scots) Presbyterian (a good service), followed by a reception for the Chief at the church and then to MacLeod Plantation where Chief John was asked to speak about his Scottish ancestry by a group called "Friends of the MacLeods."

Rediscovering our many Clan MacLeod Chiefs

> It is the end of "The Year of the Crotach." The person who inspired this effort to focus on the greater and deeper history of the Clan MacLeod through our chiefs is Kris McFadden. His idea seems to have caught on, and received a lot of attention at the AGM in Milwaukee. Kris had prepared some written remarks on the project, which I wanted to read at our dinner on Saturday night, but I managed to misplace the paper at the last minute. So with apologies to Kris, here are his words.

We are going to continue to explore our Chiefs next year, and bring attention to a more modern Chief, Norman MacLeod of MacLeod. This Norman was the 25th Chief and the grandfather of Dame Flora.

While we may not always agree with their actions, we can learn a great deal about our MacLeod legacy by understanding how and why our Chiefs responded to the circumstances in which they found their country, their Clan, and themselves personally. Norman lived through challenging and changing times, the legacy of which impacts us still today. It's going to be an interesting year! -- Ed

What was the clan system? It had some aspects of feudalism but clansmen were not just some nameless serfs. The clan was made up of relatives and friends who bonded together for protection. As time went on, the chief "owned" the land and a rent was to be paid. But he had the responsibility to defend the clan from invaders (foreign and domestic) and to try to make life better for everyone. Invaders changed over time from just bands of raiders to other clans to other nations and even the king and his feudal lord's political dealings.

We see the changes continuing today. Although it would have been inspiring to see Dame Flora leading a charge of Macleod warriors and wielding her claymore against the MacDonalds, her weapons were the pen, the spoken word, persistence, and a dream. These weapons touched, persuaded, and inspired many of her clansmen and countless others. We do not have to face off on a field of battle, but politics, economics, and public relations have over time complemented and then replaced the fierce war leader.

There is a fine line between lionizing the chiefs and over humanizing them. Some were great and did great things for the clan. Some - like the Red Man - not so much. But we need to embrace the bad with the good. We may look at some of their acts and decisions using our 21st century values, and think how awful things were. But we can also try to understand what was done from their point of view.

I have heard stories of my boxing con artist, baseball playing grandfather who mended his ways and got a "real" job (milkman) so he could marry my MacLeod grandmother. I have heard that her ancestors were Tories in New York state, fought on the side of the Loyalists during the Revolutionary War, and moved to Canada afterwards.

But who were they before they emigrated to the United States? I know they were proud to be MacLeods. But what does this mean? Most of the deeds of the MacLeods are written in conjunction with actions taken by the Chiefs. Learning about the Chiefs and their times will help us understand what our ancestors' lives were like, and why they were so proud to be MacLeods. This understanding helps us turn our hearts to our own fathers and mothers, and to reach out as fathers and mothers to the hearts of our children.

Because the highlands were established with the clan system of family, safety, and belonging, it is bred into us. We still hold to these clan bonds even though we are spread across the world. We also have new bonds of work, extended family, and friends wherever we are, but we still hold onto those ancient bonds of clanship. The current chiefs and the chiefs of the past can be our examples of how we may be able to help our family and protect the ones we love. To have a better future we MUST remember our past.

So please learn about our many MacLeod chiefs, and along with them the many forces that have contributed to our clan's complex and remarkable history. And share what you learn with your children, and with the rest of us.

It includes familiar sights such as the Quiraing and Dunvegan Castle, but presents them very beautifully and integrates Skye's geology and human history with the surrounding area.

The video is a short film, one of many in a series called "The World From Above." These aerial programs offer a view of the world from 10,000 feet down to practically ground level. Stabilized high definition aerial cameras are used to create especially dramatic and vivid footage. This St. Kilda film was made in 1923 and 1928, before the population was evacuated. It is 18 minutes long, silent, and in black and white. It includes some footage of Dunvegan.

FAMILY RECIPES FROM ISLE OF SCALPAY, SCOTLAND

In 2000, John N. MacLeod followed his genealogical trail to the Isle of Scalpay off the Isle of Harris in the Outer Hebrides. Here he found Ella (Finella) MacLeod, John's distant cousin, working at the island's public school as the cook. Over the years, we gained first hand knowledge of her expertise in the kitchen from the many meals she prepared for us during visits. In addition, we would meet people who praised her school meals that they had eaten over the years of their schooling. We thought you would enjoy trying some of them!

Dropped Scones (these look like our small pancakes)

- 2 eggs
- 8 ounces flour
- 3 ounces sugar
- ¹/₄ teaspoon baking soda
- $1\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon cream of tarter
- Pinch of salt
- 1 tablespoon honey
- 2 teaspoons cooking oil, plus a bit more for the pan
- 8 tablespoons milk

Preheat frying pan or griddle. To make the batter, sift the dry ingredients together. Add eggs, oil, and milk, and beat well.

Very lightly brush oil on the hot pan. Drop spoonfuls of the batter on the hot pan. They should be ready to flip when batter appears firm. When they are golden brown on both sides, remove them from the pan and cool between the folds of a tea towel, so that they won't dry out.

Serve with Clotted Cream, Jam or Honey or all of them!!

Bread and Butter Pudding

- 12 slices of white bread with the crust removed
- 4 ounces butter
- 6 ounces mixed fruit or raisins Zest of 2 lemons
- 4 ounces brown sugar
- 1 pint of milk
- 2 eggs

Butter bread slices, then cut them into one inch triangles. Place half of the triangles, butter side down, in an 8 inch by 8 inch baking dish. Sprinkle half of the sugar, fruit, and lemon zest evenly over the bread. Layer on the rest of bread, butter side down. Sprinkle with the remaining sugar, fruit and zest.

Beat together the eggs and milk and pour it over the contents of the baking dish. Let it sit and soak for one hour.

Bake at 350° for 40 minutes. Serve warm with cream, honey or ice cream. As a

variation, spread some jam on the bread before layering it.



Passed away at age 57


David lost his battle with liver disease on May 3, 2015. He is survived by his wife, Shari Fletcher-MacLeod.

LOOKING AHEAD TO NEXT YEAR'S NEW YORK TARTAN WEEK

In modern times, April 6 is known as "Tartan Day," a day on which the world-wide community of over 45 million Scots may celebrate their heritage. April 6 is the date chosen because it is the anniversary of the Declaration of Arbroath. This document was made in the form of a letter in Latin submitted to Pope John XXII, dated 6 April 1320, and intended to confirm Scotland's status as an independent, sovereign state.

Famously, in New York City Tartan Day has become part of Tartan Week, and includes a wide range of cultural, business, and political events. New York's 2016 Tartan Parade will next be held on Saturday April 9, and although the Grand Marshall has not yet been announced it has often been a notable celebrity of stage or screen (Alan Cumming, Brian Cox, Kevin McKidd and even Sean Connery). We MacLeods have participated in the parade for a number of years. Please check out the photos from the 2015 parade on the inside front cover of this newsletter.

In 2016, the Parade will start at 2:00PM at West 45th Street and march up 6th Avenue to 55th Street. Line-up will be at 1:00PM and will be on the side streets near 6th Avenue and West 45th Street. About a week before the Parade, the Line of March will be released which will give the position of each unit in the parade and exactly where they are to line up.
