Using the theme as a guide, our church will learn why having its *Best Christmas Ever* is possible this year, and truly every year, as we focus on what is most important in our lives.

PEACE IS CHRIST'S GIFT TO YOU

DEEP, ABIDING, RESILIENT JOY IS POSSIBLE WITH CHRIST.

TO BE TRULY LOVED, FOR WHO YOU ARE, IS ONE OF THE MOST AMAZING AND WONDERFUL FEELINGS A PERSON CAN EXPERIENCE. **November 27, 2022**: It is easy to be overwhelmed by the state of our world, but don't lose heart, **Jesus has overcome the world.** Stop believing the lies that things will never change. Choose to find hope in the promises of God. Choose to believe that Jesus' birth changes everything. Each day we can be defeated by darkness or find victory in the light of Christ. Choose hope. And share it with others.

**December 4, 2022**: Listen to what Jesus tells the disciples in John 14:27; "Peace I leave with you; my peace I give you. I do not give to you as the world gives. Do not let your hearts be troubled and do not be afraid." #### LOCAL PERSPECTIVE:

This excerpt is from an article by Craig Pitman published in the November 17, 2022, edition of the "Florida Phoenix," about God's creatures *right here in the Florida Keys*:



Bette Zirkelbach, who for the past 11 years has managed the Turtle Hospital in Marathon, reports, "We have not seen a single male juvenile turtle in the past four years, which is frightening." Something's wrong with the loggerhead sea turtles that overwhelming breed here in Florida: They're not producing male babies. As columnist Craig Pittman writes, Florida Atlantic University has been monitoring the turtle breeding cycle for 20 years and reports that the proportion of female births over the years have ranged in the high 90s to 100 percent. The reason is climate change — the heat of the sand in which turtles bury their eggs has been increasing as the climate warms, which encourages

development of female rather than male babies. Bad for turtles and bad for us — just as the warming planet is making life harder for them, it's subjecting us to more powerful storms and flooding.

GLOBAL PERSPECTIVE: The COP 27, the 27<sup>th</sup> United Nations Conference on the Climate in Egypt, will end tomorrow November 18. The "big ask" is for a *Fossil Fuel Non-Proliferation Treaty*. To save lives, to avoid global destabilization, and to prevent volatile prices, first-world countries MUST stop any increase in the production of fossil fuel and hasten the transition to renewable energy …by 2030. *God help us*.



The 2023 Reading Program kicked off on November 28 at Edna Waldorf's house with a review of ten new books for members to read during the coming year. Members earn reading certificates by reading one book in each of the following five categories: Spiritual Development Education for Mission; Social Action; Nurturing Community; and Leadership Development.

At the meeting all attendees received bookmarks to use in their reading efforts as well as having the opportunity to make Thanksgiving bookmarks. All books for the United Women in Faith reading program are kept on the shelves in the church narthex. Women do not need to be a member of our group or even a member of Burton Church to sign out books from the shelves. They are for the growth and spiritual development of any member or visitor to our church. All we ask is that books be returned in 4 weeks if possible so that others can check out the book. Please be sure to enter your phone number on the sign out sheet if you are not a member of the United Women in Faith group.

During our November 28 meeting, Barbara Koch gave a short report on Dulac Community Center in Louisiana. This National Mission Institution of the United Women in Faith, located in the bayou communities of lower Terrebone Parish, was founded in 1932 by two Methodist women to provide an education for the indigenous children of these communities who were denied a public-school education at that time.

Over the years the mission changed to encompass all aspects of social service for people in this area which has been repeatedly devastated by major hurricanes. In addition, this area was in the forefront of communities damaged by the Deepwater Horizon spill, the worst environmental disaster in United States history, and an economic disaster for this community for many years.

Information about all the national mission institutions supported by the United Women in Faith can be found in our annual prayer calendar. Researching the institutions and programs listed in the prayer calendar is an uplifting experience, revealing the difference that two or three women banding together can make in combatting social problems.



Our December meeting will be held on Monday, December 26, at 7:00 pm at Edna Waldorf's house. We are still celebrating Christmas! Think fun, food, and fellowship! 

Give your family the gift of "Letting your wishes be known" this Christmas!

The Holidays are a good time to talk with people closest to you about your end of life wishes; they will thank you for it! It does not matter how old you are to have these conversations. It is my prayer that you have them!

Death – along with taxes – is one of life's few certainties. Despite this inevitability, most people dread thinking and talking about when, how or under what conditions they might die. They don't want to broach the topic with family, either, for fear of upsetting them. Ironically, though, talking about death "early and often" can be the greatest gift to bestow on loved ones. As a sociologist who has studied end-of-life issues for more than two decades, I've learned that people know they should talk about death honestly and openly, but surprisingly few do. In fact, one recent study showed that while 90% of adults say that talking to their loved ones about their end-of-life wishes is important, only 27%



have actually had these conversations. It's frightening to think about our own suffering, or our loved ones' distress. But everyone should talk about and prepare for death precisely because we want to minimize our own suffering at the end of life and soften the anguish of loved ones left behind.

#### What to cover

Advance care planning, which typically involves a living will and a health care proxy, allows people to articulate which medical treatments they want or don't want at the end of life. A living will formally articulates preferences for care, such as whether to use comfort measures like hospice and palliative care, or more invasive measures like feeding tubes and ventilators. Documenting these preferences when the patient is still able to make those decisions helps to ensure they die on their own terms – a cornerstone of the "good death."

Appointing a <u>health care proxy</u> when still relatively young and healthy gives people an opportunity to decide who will be tasked with their end-of-life decision-making. It also clarifies loved ones' responsibilities and can fend off arguments that could arise around the deathbed. Having these discussions early also prevents panicked choices when someone's health takes a dramatic turn for the worse. End-of-life discussions also help you to <u>construct your own legacy</u>. Ample resources are available to guide these conversations. Organizations like <u>The Conversation Project</u> – not related to <u>The Conversation</u> – have created guides for productive end-of-life discussions. Advance care planning documents ranging from <u>living wills</u> to the "<u>Five Wishes</u>" program, which helps clarify people's values about how they'd like to spend their final days, can be a good starting point.

A simple introduction like "I need to think about the future. Will you help me?" is a good icebreaker. And the first conversation eases the path to future chats, because changes in physical health, family relations and mental sharpness may necessitate revisions in end-of-life plans. By discussing these issues during calm times, such as after a holiday get-together or birthday dinner, we can feel prepared and empowered as we and our families approach the inevitable.

Meaning of Advent

A blessed Advent and Merry Christmas! The Christmas holiday season is a very exciting time with our church dressed in her Christmas finery! We encourage you to join in the spirit of Advent with your whole heart. A little confused about Advent? Here are some basics about the traditions of Advent.

When- Advent marks the beginning of the church year. It begins with the fourth Sunday before Christmas Day and ends on Christmas Eve. If Christmas Day falls on a Sunday, Advent will last four full weeks. If Christmas Day falls on any other day of the week, Advent will last less than four weeks. If Christmas falls on a Monday, Tuesday, or Wednesday, all of Advent will be in December. If Christmas falls on any other day of the week, Advent will begin in November.

**What-** Advent comes from the Latin word, *adventus*, meaning "coming." It is a season to prepare for the coming of Christ in various meanings: the promised coming of the Messiah to the Jews, the coming of Jesus being born in Bethlehem, the promised return of the risen Christ in final victory, and the continual coming of Christ into the lives and hearts of believers.

**History-** Advent began in France in the fourth century. In various times and locations of the church, Advent has been observed for three, four, and six weeks leading to Christmas

**Color-** While the traditional color for Advent is purple, there is a growing interest in and acceptance of the color blue as an alternative. *The United Methodist Book of Worship* identifies purple or blue as appropriate colors for Advent. The genesis of the introduction of blue into the liturgical colors comes from continued reflection on the calendar of the Christian year, particularly on the season of Advent.

Here is how the reasoning goes: Advent is a season of preparation that anticipates both Bethlehem and the consummation of history in the second coming of Jesus Christ. Since this anticipation is characterized by hope - in contrast to the repentance characteristic of Lent -- the color for the season should not be purple, with its mood of solemnity and somberness, but blue with its hopefulness.

Here at Burton, we celebrate in many ways. We light the candles in our Advent wreath each Sunday, with the four candles representing "Hope", "Peace", "Love" and "Joy". The center white Christ candle will be lit this year on Christmas Eve to celebrate the birth of Jesus.

We decorate our Chrismon tree with the symbols of the church. We encourage you and your family to take a close look at these symbols, many of which were handmade by members of our congregation. A picture explaining the meaning of these symbols is located on each of the front wall columns. See if you can find them all on the tree!



We sing the hymns of Advent like "Come, Thou Long Expected Jesus" and "Hail to the Lord's Anointed" and the carols of Christmas such as "Away in the Manger" and "O Little Town of Bethlehem".

We display our crèche with the scene of Nativity, complete with Mary, Joseph, shepherds, wise men, animals, and eventually – the baby Jesus!

On Christmas Eve, we join in the singing of "Silent Night" with only candlelight to illuminate the church. Then we lift them together – the Light of the World has come!

This year, make Advent and Christmas a time of renewal as we await together the greatest Gift of all!
