THE WORD

The early part of John's Gospel, chapter 16, can be read in conjunction with today's Gospel reading. The commissioning of the disciples takes place today, where they are strengthened by the presence of the Holy Spirit and they are to go out into the world and baptise people in the name of the Father, Son and the Holy Spirit.

In John's Gospel, we hear Jesus speaking with his disciples for the final time. There was fear or even sadness perhaps, given the great ministerial journey that had taken place with Jesus was now coming to an end. The disciples are now venturing out on their own. Although, they will never be on their own. The promise of Jesus is to send the Spirit of truth who will offer wisdom and guidance during the difficult times to come. The sending of the Spirit into the lives of the disciples and into our own lives is God's grace alive and active.

REFLECT

the life of the Trinity permeates everything we do as Church whether it's a prayer group gathering on a Monday night, a St. Vincent De Paul meeting on a Friday morning or a baptismal celebration after mass on a Sunday. The Trinity becomes reflected in the missionary activity of our parish communities from morning to night.

Bishop Robert Barron states that as a lecturer in University, he is only too aware of the highly developed technical language' surrounding the Trinity. All the great theologians over the centuries have wrestled with its meaning and often in trying to communicate that meaning, they leave the student or the listener even more confused than before.

The danger however is that we simplify the doctrine of the Trinity too much in our preaching and teaching. Suffice to remember that every time we bless ourselves, we are invoking the name of the Trinity. When we participate in a sacrament for example, the first step is to put ourselves into the mystery of the Trinity. We place ourselves into the love that connects the Father and the Son.

We can probably get the sense through our work for the Church and our participation in the Sacraments that the Trinity is not something that is static. Today's Gospel portrays a Spirit as a guide and the bearer of wisdom and knowledge, Trinity Sunday therefore is less about trying to understand the complicated theological theories that surround a doctrine and more to do with every member of the Church being summoned to mission and action. Today could be the perfect opportunity for a parish to re-evaluate its missionary activity and work. It could also be a time where we take a personal look at our own faith lives. Do I see myself being part of the dynamic life of the Trinity or have I become static?

LEARN

The Trinity is a mystery of faith in the strict sense, one of the mysteries that are hidden in God, which can never be known unless they are revealed by God.¹

(Catechism of the Catholic Church, 237)

DO

Think of concrete ways you can go out to your community and bring the love and tenderness of the Trinity to the lives of others. No action is too small.

"It is not easy to find a name that will suitably express so great an excellence, unless it is better to speak in this way: the Trinity, one God, of whom are all things; through whom are all things, in whom are all things." (St. Augustine)
