Roser's Reflection . . .

Dear Friends,

Our gracious God equips His Church with everything needed to carry out His mission in the world. This is an important reminder for every congregation, as it is human nature for us to complain about the things that we lack. The Bible teaches us that we lack nothing, but because we do not always use God's gifts effectively, we sometimes think that we do. An important challenge for every congregation is for us to consider the resources that God has given us and ask ourselves if we are using them effectively. Very often when we think that we need more resources what we really need is to rethink how we are applying those we have already been given. As the pastor of our congregation, it is my responsibility to lead us in being good stewards of God's resources within the congregation.

During the Advent season, I reflected on the gifts of our midweek Advent and Lenten suppers. These are important times of community-building and mutual care that are largely underused because they occur at night when many of our members are unable to be present. While these are great events for the 15 or so people who attend, the majority of our members do not participate. From a stewardship perspective, it is clear that we are not using those resources wisely. Each week, during Advent and Lent, members prepare delicious foods and those who attend set aside time to gather together - resources (given by God) are being expended. By no means is this a waste of resources, but those resources could be used differently in order to benefit a larger proportion of our members.

To that end, I have asked our Board of Elders if we might shift these resources of foodstuffs, time, and talents from midweek evenings to Sunday mornings. In this way, many more of our members will be able to take part in the fellowship and building up of our faith community. After discussion, we have decided to hold a Sunday morning brunch each month instead of having midweek suppers during Advent and Lent. Knowing that their elimination will significantly impact attendance at the midweek services, we are retiring the services with the intention of shifting those resources over to the Sunday morning worship service. Additionally, we are hoping that a reduction in the number of midweek services will boost attendance at our Thanksgiving eve, Christmas eve, Ash Wednesday, and Maundy Thursday services. With the exception of Christmas eve, we really struggle to attract the attendance of our members on those special days. Hopefully, this change will assist our members in prioritizing their attendance on the sacred days of Ash Wednesday and Maundy Thursday.

I met with our Fellowship Committee on Tuesday in order to seek their assistance in planning for the meals. I was very encouraged by their response, ideas, and willingness to serve. I notice on Sunday mornings that we do not have enough room in the narthex to accommodate everyone who would like to gather in conversation - which are missed opportunities for us. Additionally, it is very embarrassing for our congregation to host funeral visitations in the narthex with coffee stains on the carpet where the casket is placed and families greet their guests. To that end, I have asked the Fellowship Committee if we can host the weekly fellowship time downstairs in the Fellowship Hall. Beginning in March, our fellowship time each week will be held downstairs following worship. On the first Sunday of the month, we will gather for coffee and treats in an open conversation style - meaning people can simply spend time in conversation with one another. On the third Sunday of the month, we will have our monthly potluck brunch. In order to keep this event from becoming stale, we will change up what we have, i.e. sometimes we will have breakfast items and other times we will have soup/sandwiches/etc. During the second and fourth Sundays of the month, we will gather for coffee and snacks, and then enjoy a time of small group and large group discussions on topics such as Advent and Lent. When there is a fifth Sunday of the month, we will try to offer a special activity in addition to coffee and treats.

In order to offer more people an opportunity to provide cookies, bars, etc. for our fellowship time, Berta is placing a signup sheet in the narthex. Each week will offer spots for two families to sign up. Each is asked to bring 2 or 3 dozen of their items. The items can be home-baked or store-bought - both are delicious!

I recognize that change is always unsettling, and I ask for your patience and goodwill as we try something different. My hope is that this will strengthen the bonds of our fellowship and attract others to join us. These gatherings will not exceed 45 minutes, and normally we will be finished in 30. Since Easter occurs on April 12th this year, we will move the third Sunday brunch in April to our traditional pre-service breakfast on Easter; and have coffee and snacks on April 19. I want to close with one of my favorite pictures of the Church: "They continued to hold firmly to the apostles' teaching and to the fellowship, to the breaking of the bread, and to the prayers." (Acts 2:42).

In the Event of Inclement Weather

This is to say, regardless of the weather, I will always be present to offer worshipers God's Word through Scripture reading and preaching, and the Lord's Supper. This does not mean that anyone else is expected to be present when weather conditions present serious challenges to your safe arrival.
