Parish Membership: Every family and single adult to be considered active members of St. Bartholomew's Parish must be properly registered in the parish, receiving and regularly using the parish weekly donation envelopes. Only in this way can the parish issue documents attesting to parish membership and Catholic practice, e.g. a letter to be a Godparent or Sponsor. New parishioners are requested to visit the parish office.

Sick & Shut-ins: The priests are available to administer the Sacraments to those who are unable to come to Church. The Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick is part of the healing ministry of the Church, and should be received early in an illness or before a serious operation.

Baptisms: Please call the parish office to make arrangements.

Marriages: In order to provide sufficient time for the Marriage Preparation Course, please call the parish office and ask to speak with the pastor at least six months in advance of the wedding.

SACRIFICE YOUR OWN PRIORITIES TO HELP OTHERS

The ordinariness of the first three worlds of today's first reading—"When Peter entered!" (acts 10:25) - belie the import of the action they describe. An observant Jew of the time would not normally enter the house of a Gentile, which would have been considered unclean. Not only was Cornelius a Gentile, he was a Roman centurion, serving the government who ruled over the Jewish people. Yet the Holy Spirit led Peter to see in this upright person a genuine interest in Jesus Christ. By the end of this passage we see the Holy Spirit come down upon Cornelius and his household. The cultural and religious barrier was broken by both the Holy Spirit and Peter.



Often cultural and religious barriers are maintained by hate and violence instead of being bridged by love and tolerance. This is not a recent phenomenon; we can see in scripture that this goes back thousands of years. But scripture holds the answer as well. The Holy Spirit knows no barriers. It is up to courageous people like Peter to stand up to those who would refuse an open hand, to those who fear the other side, and convert the hearts of those who are satisfied with the world the way it is.

Today's Gospel holds the formula to finding complete joy. Jesus states it forthrightly to His disciples.: "love one another as I love you" (John 15:12). He says this so that the pure joy He feels may also be in them. And now in us. Joy comes from a selfless attitude, from selfless action. It comes from loving others as we are loved. It is no accident that the word love appears in today's second reading and Gospel a total of eighteen times. Self-sacrificing love, in imitation of Jesus, brings unparalleled joy.

I give you a new commandment: Love one another as I have loved you. John 13

Love one another. The greatest commandment, the simplest commandment — and if you've ever loved anyone, you know it's also the hardest.

I'm man enough to admit it. I've seen one or two of those cheesy Hallmark movies that are especially popular around the holidays. Boy meets Girl. Boy and Girl encounter a catastrophic roadblock to their relationship — they're coaches of rival high school volleyball teams, or he runs a dog kennel and she works at a feline rescue, so it could never, ever work out, right? But sprinkle a little movie magic over the whole situation and Boy and Girl find what Hallmark tells us is true love.

I could make a list of all the things that are inaccurate about these movies, and something I would put right near the top — maybe even above the sometimes-unbelievable storylines — is the idea that love is a feeling.

See, I'm not sure if it's accurate to call these movies love stories. Attraction stories, sure. But if you've ever forgiven someone who's hurt you, nursed a dying parent, gotten up for an infant's night feeding or let your kid have the last piece of cake, you know that real love is a verb. It's something you do. And it is almost always a choice.

Love one another. How often do we hear this? How often do we think about what it really means? How often do we take a moment to consider the action Jesus is asking us to take and the choice he is asking us to make?
