- The Salvatorian Mission Warehouse continues to collaborate with Southwest Medical Aid in Tucson (southwestmedicalaid.org). During 2018, three 16' containers filled with medical supplies were transported from SMA to SMW and sent to our missions.
- Lack of funding for care of the elderly and infirm has resulted in constant requests by the missions for adult diapers. Donations of adult diapers can be mailed directly to the Warehouse to be shipped out in our next container.

One of our many connections is with the women of Casa Ursulina in Chile.

Founded by an Ursuline Sister from the U.S., Sr. Mimi, and situated amongst government housing in urban Chillan, local women visit each day to learn skills such as sewing, knitting, weaving, painting, and cooking. Those who excel as students return as instructors. These skills translate into profitable jobs.





Sr. Mimi acts as translator between the Salvatorian Mission Warehouse and the Diocese of Chillan as containers are cleared.

Donations of clothing and fabric scraps from Lands' End made its way from a recent container to Casa Ursulina, where the women transformed them during their sewing classes!
