State Chaplain—Fr. Franklin Miller

Fr. Miller's Biography

I have been a priest for 24 years. I am currently the pastor of St. Cecilia's in Harvey and St. Anthony's in Selz. I am originally from Wahpeton, ND, attending St. John's parochial school and graduating from Wahpeton Senior High in 1975. I grew up on a grain farm south of Wahpeton along with my parents, whom are deceased, and two brothers, Steve and Dan. I am the oldest. They both farm today along with their families. My brother Steve was married; his wife Becky Boumont passed away last year. He has two daughters, Amanda and Alicia. Amanda was married at the end of August to Jason Fischer from Minot and Alicia married Gregory Holubok last January. My brother Dan is married to Lori Lenzmeier of Wahpeton and they have three children; Alex, Jack and Hattie. Alex and Jack are working on the farm and Hattie is a student at UND.

I had a call to the priesthood early in life; however, I did not answer the call until I was 28 yrs. old. I left the farm in 1984 and I entered Holy Apostles Seminary and College in Cromwell, CT. After five years of seminary studies I was ordained on May 27, 1989. Since then, I have been pastor in parishes in the Diocese of Fargo and served on the Presbyteral Council, Diocesan Fi-

nance Council, and Personnel Board, and as Vocation Coordinator. I have assisted seminarians at Cardinal Muench Seminary as spiritual direc-

tor. I am currently serving as the Dean of Deanery 6.

It has been a busy summer as usual and it comes to an end so quickly. I was honored with the opportunity to attend the State Officer's Conference in Belleville, Ill. It was a very helpful and rewarding conference, being able to meet so many dedicated and faithful Catholic Daughters from around the country.

During this "Year of Faith" we have looked to the Blessed Mother to help us grow on our journey of faith, so that we will respond to the voice to the Lord in our hearts. "Jesus said to his disciples: 'I have come to set the earth on fire, and how I wish it were already blazing!' (Lk 12:49). Let us pray that the blazing fire of the Holy Spirit to purify our hearts and sanctify our lives so that the voice of the Lord will reign in our hearts as it does in the Immaculate Heart of Mary.
